POSTAL BANKS HAVE WON

Hitchcock Says Experiment Succeeds and Proposes Extension.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 .- "If the neces sary appropriations were available. I would establish a postal savings bank tomorrow in 500 additional cities and towns of the United States."

This statement was made last night by Pestmaster-General Hitchcock in view of reports of the first month's operation of the postal system. The reports are most gratifying to Mr. They are regarded as demonstrating

that the new system has already passed the experimental stage.

The total deposits in the 48 existing postal banks for January will approximate \$60,000. This is an average of about \$1200. Assuming that this average will be maintained throughout the age will be maintained throughout the year, the aggregate of annual deposits will be close to three-quarters of a million dollars. It is assumed by officers of the system that the deposits will be correspondingly greater when the service is extended to first-class offices.

Hichcock has recommended to Congress the appropriation of \$1,000,000 to be immediately available for the extension of the postal savings system to a considerable number of postoffices, the patrons of which are clamoring for
