

COLWELL TURNED DOWN BY SENATE

Bourne and Chamberlain Get Senate to Uphold Their Personal Objection.

BREACH WITH TAFT OPEN

Rejection Also Awaits Malcolm and Bourne's Hostility to Taft Will Obstruct Approval of New Men Taft May Appoint.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 6.—At the joint request of Bourne and Chamberlain, the Senate today rejected the nomination of Elmer H. Colwell as United States Marshal for Oregon, thereby ending it necessary for President Taft to pick a new man for this office. Who that man will be, the President has not yet indicated, but he has stated that he would not act upon the recommendation of Bourne.

Whether, in view of today's action, he will reconsider his purpose, is yet to be determined. The President will not be notified of Colwell's rejection until tomorrow.

Colwell was rejected simply and solely because the Oregon Senators represented in writing to the judicial committee that his appointment was "personally objectionable" to them. When the judicial committee met this morning, the joint letter was read. Chairman Clark reported that the President had declined to withdraw Colwell's nomination and the committee thereupon, in conformity with the unwritten rule, ordered the adverse report. This unwritten rule, which forms part of what is known as "senatorial courtesy" prescribes that a nomination of the President shall not be confirmed if the appointee is "personally objectionable" to the Senators from the state from which the appointee hailed.

Many Indorsements Ignored.

Notwithstanding the fact that the committee had before it letters and telegrams from the Federal Judges, the United States District Attorney and others in Oregon attesting Colwell's qualifications, it followed this unwritten rule and recommended his rejection. In doing so, it followed the same procedure that prevailed in the case of Collector of Customs Harper, of Seattle, who was recently rejected on motion of Miles.

Formal rejection of Colwell's nomination was without incident. The report of the committee was read. It was explained that the Oregon Senators asserted Colwell was personally objectionable and out he went.

Malcolm's Fate Also Sealed.

In the light of today's action it now seems certain that Collector of Customs P. S. Malcolm will suffer the same fate. Bourne has filed with the committee a memorial protesting against his nomination, and it is expected that the committee will follow by rejection by the Senate.

Chamberlain stated today that he had made and would make no objection to Malcolm's nomination, as he had done in the case of Colwell, but under the Senate rule objection of one Senator is sufficient to prevent the nomination from being followed by rejection by the Senate.

Bourne Fighting Taft.

But for this practice, it might have been difficult for the Oregon Senators to explain wherein Colwell was personally objectionable, and equally troublesome for Bourne to make such a showing as to Malcolm. The Senate is not at all concerned over the fact that President Taft has been standing loyally behind Colwell and Malcolm. It looks upon the protests made as a fight between Bourne and the President. As the responsibility for rejection rests largely upon Bourne, it is expected that he will quarrel with the President, the Senate is willing he shall do so and take the consequences.

Postal Clerks' Salaries Raised.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 6.—Representative Hawley was advised today by the Postmaster-General that two clerk promotions have been ordered in the Portland and Ashland postoffices, the salary of one clerk being raised from \$1100 to \$1200, and one from \$1000 to \$1100. This is in reply to a recent criticism against withholding promotions to the detriment of the service.

MacVeagh Would End Sinking Fund.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Repeal of the existing law requiring the maintenance of a sinking fund for the redemption of the United States debt and substitution of discretionary authority to use the surplus money in the treasury from time to time in the purchase or redemption of outstanding interest-bearing obligations, was recommended to Congress today by Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh.

Wells Fargo Transfers Banking.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—The first step in what is regarded as a general move of the banking field came today with the transfer of the business of the Wells, Fargo & Co. Bank of New York to the National Park Bank. The Western branch of the Wells-Fargo banking business is not included in the transfer.

Commerce Court Meets.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The new United States Commerce Court had its first meeting today in the office of Judge Martin A. Knapp, former chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission. Permanent quarters for the court have not been selected.

White Slaver Gets Long Sentence.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Samuel Rubin,

a sallow-faced youth, was sentenced to not less than 10 years nor more than 17 years and six months imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$1 today in the Court of General Sessions. Rubin is the first person convicted under the new white slave law, which makes it a felony for a man to subsist on earnings of a woman of the underworld.

GREED TEMPTS TO PERJURY

Claimants to \$1,000,000 Estate All Declared to Be Frauds.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6.—That 100 persons have committed perjury in an effort to obtain a portion of the \$1,000,000 estate of the late Julius Friedman, a pioneer merchant of this city, was the allegation made in an affidavit submitted today to the Superior Court. The affidavit asks the court to procure a deposition from Dr. Leo G. Goldberg, of Brooklyn, who is said to have acknowledged that perjury had been committed to substantiate the claims of the various alleged heirs.

CASE OF MEXICAN REFUGEE MAY LEAD TO GENERAL INVESTIGATION.

C., Feb. 6.—(Special).—Out of the case of Juan Sanchez Azcona, Mexican political refugee, may come an investigation by the State Department of the charge that refugees in this country are persecuted by the Mexican government. Azcona was held in jail here 23 days, on charges preferred from Mexico. Finally Justice Claybrough refused to turn him over to the Mexican authorities.

Representative Wilson, of Pennsylvania, has introduced a resolution calling upon the State Department to report on the number of similar persecutions being carried on by the Diaz government.
