WHOLE BLOCK SOLD

Furniture Firm to Build Six-Story Warehouse.

SITE IS ALONGSIDE GULCH

Henry Jennings & Son May Go Into Jobbing Business—Nucleus of New Factory District on Railroad Probable.

Henry Jennings & Sons, furniture dealers, yesterday announced the purchase of a full block on the East Side from the Oregon Real Estate Company for \$200,000.

The block is bounded by Grand and Union avenues and East Flanders and East Gowan streets.

The property is known as block 111, Wheeler's Addition, and lies partly on a side hill, extending from the high ground on the East Gowan street side, down to the railroad tracks.

The buyers already are making plans for leveling the ground to get it ready for a building site. There is direct access to the railroad main line from which a spur can be built without trenching an establishment in connection with the wholesale business.

"Our plans for the building are yet indefinite, except that it will be a fireproof structure of reinforced concrete, six stories high," said Mr. Jennings yesterday.
