

CORONATION WILL BE BIG PAGEANT

Ceremonies in England Expected to Eclipse All Those of Past.

2,000,000 ARE EXPECTED

Hotels Promise Not to Charge More than Double Rates—Dr. Davidson Will Crown George V in Westminster Abbey.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Since the beginning of the reign of Victoria the British court has been busily engaged in preparations for the coronation of George V, which will surpass in pageantry and historical interest all former coronations of the character.

While the ceremony of crowning the King and Queen in Westminster Abbey June 22 will be almost identical in form with that which has been followed since the coronation of William IV and Queen Adelaide, the auxiliary functions are expected to exceed in pageantry and magnificence anything the nation has witnessed in the past.

Many Functions Planned.

These will include the progress of the court through London the day after the coronation and a visit to the Guildhall, with a reception to the King and Queen by the city authorities there, a naval review, a performance at the opera, with minor celebrations and pageants, among which will be a "festival of empire" at the Crystal Palace.

London business men and transportation companies count on an influx of nearly 2,000,000 visitors during the coronation season. A large portion of these will be foreigners, colonialists probably predominating.

The best places at the hotels are being reserved for regular patrons, and managers say prices will not be more than double the regular rates.

Boarding-house keepers are likely to be less reasonable in charges to visitors who have not made arrangements for accommodations in advance.

Stands Will Be Put Up.

There is every indication that the erection of stands for witnessing the procession in the Abbey and the progress through the city will be on a scale more extensive than for the coronation of King Edward in 1902. Owners and tenants are asking the highest prices ever quoted for building sites and windows.

Rates to the ordinary applicants for seats, which usually are sold at the highest possible price until a few days before the event, are apt to go down with a rush on the eve of the coronation, when speculators will be frightened away by the public. A lively insurance business has been begun at London against the death of the King, any event necessitating the postponement of the coronation and against bad weather.

Dr. Davidson, the present Archbishop of Canterbury, will officiate in the Abbey, in succession to the aged Archbishop Temple, who crowned King Edward.

The recently-appointed dean of Westminster, Dr. Ryle, who is at present Bishop of Winchester, will assist the archbishop in placing the imperial mantle, which is being embroidered.

Abbey Will Be Closed.

From the end of this month to the coronation Westminster Abbey will be closed to visitors and workmen are preparing the building for the ceremonies.

Galleries for the peers will be erected in the north transept and for processions in the south, and special accommodations for other official classes, the seating capacity of the abbey being about 2000.

Special chairs, uniformed attendants with the royal arms will be provided, as at the last coronation, and those who occupy them may purchase them at cost price for subsequent use.

A carpet of striking design, to cover the nave, is being woven. Royal blue will be the foundation color; the ornamentation will include emblems of the Order of the Garter and other heraldic devices, with the pattern on such a scale that the design is matched only once in each 20 feet.

Several of the highest officials of the state, constituting the court of claims, have been sitting in solemn convocation, considering their uniform robes of state with orders to pass upon the rights of the various noblemen and others to perform certain parts in the ceremony.

Rights Are Proscribed.

The dean and chapter of Westminster have the right to retain the robes and ornaments of the Earl of Shrewsbury to carry a white wand as lord high steward of Ireland, the Duke of Newcastle to provide a glove and support the King's right arm, while holding the scepter by virtue of the tenure of the Mayor of Works, and Bishops of the cinque ports to bear canopies.

Various other hereditary rights were claimed by the coronator, to many of which appropriate fees, such as five yards of scarlet cloth to the clerk of the crown and 40 sili of crimson velvet to Earl of Carlisle, the lord great chamberlain, whose fees for occasional appearances at coronations of state amount to some \$100,000 a year.

Three Seek Spurs.

Three claimants appeared for the right to carry the great spurs—the Earl of London, Lord Grey de Ruthyn and Lord Hastings. Sir Martin Lloyd makes claim to carry the King's silver harp as lord marshal of baronets of Kinross, a position held by his ancestors through a thousand years, and James Thorne Roe de Morley wishes "to bear the royal standard of England and receive fees."

The former claims are under consideration and the last was voted. The request of the Earl of Terrol to walk in the procession as lord high constable of Scotland and have a silver baton of 12 ounces weight, with the King's arms in gold on one end and his own on the other, was graciously allowed.

"But who is to provide the baton?" the Earl asked, anxiously.

On the subject of providing a sword, the lord chancellor, who is to carry it, replied the lord chancellor.

Guardsmen Attend Services.

OREGON CITY, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—Two interesting services were held at St. Paul's Episcopal Church this evening. At 8 o'clock Company B, Oregon National Guard, attended services at St. Paul's in a body, and Rev. Mr. Robinson spoke from an appropriate subject.

Later, at 9:30—the church was filled to overflowing with the Red Men and the Degree of Pukabutas, a branch of the same order. The services in both cases were made impressive and instructive.

TALK HALTS ACTS

T. P. O'Connor Sees Small Chance for Veto Bill.

MEMBERS ARE AMBITIOUS

Young Men in Makeup Now Desirous of "Making Good" Are Inclined to Prolong Debate Which Delays Legislation.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The forces are gradually ranging themselves for the great coming fight. The sense of the gigantic importance of the issues is deep down in everybody's heart in England. The supreme issue really is whether or not we are about to see the destruction of feudalism after its thousand years of supremacy from the Norman conquest.

"Both sides realize this," I once said to Lloyd-George, discussing his budget some months after it had sent all England into flame, that he had bulldozed better than he knew.

"I think I knew what I was doing pretty well," he said with a smile in his glittering eyes.

Now, the present House of Commons consists largely on the Tory side of well-groomed young men who are all desirous to make their way, and the temptation to them to filibuster with that object will be enormous. The veto bill is a brief one, but who can say that on a measure so momentous there is not plenty of reason and plenty of opportunity for all kinds of discussions?

The bill will be attacked, of course, on the ground that it does not carry out the promise of the preamble, that is to say that this proposal of limiting the existing power of the House of Commons is not followed up by some scheme for that reform of the assembly to what the preamble commits the government.

I need scarcely point out that if the government were to enter upon the morass of a reform scheme for the House of Lords at this moment and before the abolition of the Lords had given them a weapon to do so, they ought to be in a lunatic asylum.

The policy of the Tories, on the other hand, has been for the last year to pose as dying with anxiety to reform the House of Peers. Every reform they have hitherto proposed has been a sham reform, but nevertheless there is a certain number of timid people in this country who are so afraid of a single chamber government that they are liable to be taken in by these sham proposals.

Then, of course, there will be an attempt to bring in the referendum, especially on Ireland. I believe the Liberals could have got their proposals at the dead conference accepted by the Tories if they had only been willing to except Ireland from their veto bill. To their credit they refused peace on any such terms. But that will not prevent the Tories from renewing the proposal in the coming debates, and thus we shall have a preliminary diablogue on home rule a year before the home rule bill is seen. These are the uncertainties of the future. They are nothing beyond the difficulties that every government and every movement the Tories have to confront. They may all disappear before the steadiness and the unity of the force behind the government, and under pressure from the adherents of the King for a peaceful coronation. But, as I began by saying, it is impossible for anybody to forecast the immediate future.

POSSE IS ON TRAIL

Men and Bloodhounds Seek Murderers of 4 Ranchers.

FEELING RUNNING HIGH

Victims of Atrocious Killing, Unarmed, Shot Down and Bodies Piled in Cave—Rustlers Thought Guilty Ones.

ALTURAS, Cal., Feb. 12.—With a company of well-mounted gunfighters, several Indian trailers and a pack of bloodhounds, the Sheriff of Washoe County set out today on a manhunt for the murderers of the four wealthy sheep men of this county whose bodies were found in a cave near Denio, Nev.

Even without the dogs, the Sheriff believes his Indians will put him within gunshot of the quarry despite a three-weeks' start.

So intense is the feeling here against the murderers that it is freely said they will never reach a jail even if taken alive. All the victims, except Cambron, left families.

Details of the murder of Harry Cambron, J. B. League, Peter Ecranuape and B. Indiana received here today show the tragedy to have been one of the most atrocious crimes in the history of this region.

The men were all unarmed and intent on a peaceable mission at the sheep camps near Denio when they were shot down, stripped of clothing and valuables, their bodies consigned by the miscreants, who rode away on the fine horses of the ranchers after shooting their own half-starved mounts.

CANNON'S DISTRICT IS FOUND PUTRID

Edgar and Clark Counties About to Plunge Into Purification Bath.

BALLOTS ARE QUOTED HIGH

Prices Paid Much Better Than Those Given in Speaker's Home Town. Aid of Leaders Is Sought in Investigation.

BY HAL M. LYLE. DANVILLE, Ill., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—The whole of Speaker Joseph G. Cannon's political "backyard" in the 18th Congressional district will be swept clean, its dirt and litter if the "vote fraud" investigation, now being conducted by the Vermillion County grand jury does not end disastrously.

Edgar and Clark Counties, directly to the south of "Uncle Joe's" home county, are on the verge of plunging into "purification baths."

Strenuous efforts are being made to get the party leaders to co-operate to expose the lamentable conditions. If these counties join with Vermillion in "cleansing houses," the entire Congressional district will be involved.

No Grand Jury Called.

Circuit Judge Thompson will open the February term of court tomorrow at Paris, in Edgar County. No grand jury has been summoned, but Judge Thompson says that he will call a special "honorary" body if the political leaders will get together. He feels that unless the leaders co-operate and agree to a wide-open non-partisan exposure, the starting of an investigation would be useless.

States Attorney Dyer, of Edgar County, said tonight: "I do not intend asking Judge Thompson for a special grand jury, but if a 'vote fraud' investigation is started I will do my duty."

Conditions in Edgar County are even worse than in Vermillion. The latter county's "come-back ticket" vote-buying system, at \$5 to \$25 a ballot, has become more "bids" play" alongside of Edgar County's system of \$25 to \$50 a vote, with those bought "registered by an elaborate bookkeeping scheme."

The Vermillion County election probe reopens in the morning with renewed vigor. More than 100 witnesses will be awaiting the call into the chambers when the grand jury convenes. A majority of them are politicians and "ward workers."
