W. Du Bois, was married to First Lieutenant Roy F. Waring, of the Second Field Artillery, of Vancouver Barracks, at 3 o'clock tonight, Rev. O. E. Gray, pastor, and Rev. Charles Du Bois, officiating.

Supper Follows Ceremony.

On leaving, the bride on the right arm of the bridegroom, the couple marched slowly down the aisle to the orchestra playing Mendelssohn's wedding march, followed by the best man, First Lieutenant Donald Robinson, of Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia. Supper was served for the bride party at the home of the bride, at Ninth and Washington streets, and a reception for the family and friends followed.

The bride was charmingly gowned in white puffed-crepe trimmed in rose point and Duchess lace, heirlooms of the family. The bride's veil was caught with a wreath of orange blossoms, and she carried a gorgeous shower bouquet of bride's roses and lilies of the valley.

The bridegroom wore a military full-dress uniform, resplendent with gold braid and buttons, and carried his sword. All of the ushers and the best man also wore military full-dress uniforms. HUNT DEPICTED ON FILM

Stirring Pictures of Lassoing Wild Animals is Shows.

Action, excitement and danger enough to soothe the passion of even the most adventuresome is shown in the motion picture show at the Star Theatre this week in the presentation of Buffalo Jones' daring lassoing of wild animals in the African jungles. The pictures were taken in the same part of Africa in which Colonel Roosevelt hunted last year.

The film shows the start of Jones' expedition from Nairobi, the lassoing of the plains into the game country and the chase, lassoing and capture of many wild beasts. Among the animals lassoed by Buffalo Jones were the wart hog, harebeest, eland, giraffe, rhinoceros and lioness.

The captures of these ferocious beasts are plainly seen in the pictures and show frequent danger to the American roping expert. The peculiar habits of the native carriers is also shown. Altogether that portion of the film shown last night was interesting and educational.

The film which Jones brought back with him was extra long and it has been necessary to show the pictures in two parts. The second half will be shown the latter part of this week and Sunday. The largest attendance in the history of the Star Theatre was reported yesterday, because of this picture. When shown before ex-President Roosevelt, at the New York Press Club, the pictures met with his approval.

Other features of the Star programme are "What Shall We Do With Our Poor?" a pathetic picture full of realism, and "The Show Girl's Stragem," a film depicting society life. These, too, are interesting.

HELP IS PLEDGED

Methodist Men's Union to Aid Willamette University.

BANQUET HELD IN CHURCH

Dr. Homan Emphasizes Importance of Moral as Well as Intellectual Education—Half Million is Only Beginning.

The Methodist Men's Social Union, at a banquet at Taylor-street Methodist Church last night, pledged itself by a unanimous vote to support Dr. Fletcher Homan, president of Willamette University of Salem, in his campaign for the raising of \$500,000 for the institution. The banquet was given in his honor and that of the trustees of the institution.

James J. Hill has given Willamette University \$50,000, with the understanding that \$250,000 additional is to be raised, making an endowment fund of \$300,000. R. A. Booth has given \$100,000, with the understanding that \$400,000 additional is to be raised, making an endowment fund of \$500,000. An effort is now being made to raise the required amount. A part of it has been raised, but the amount was not announced last night.

Morals Must Be Educated.—The address of the evening was delivered by Dr. Homan, who told first of the struggles of Jason Lee, the pioneer of Methodism on the Pacific Coast, in establishing Willamette. He then spoke a word for Christian education.

"It is scientific to educate a man both intellectually and morally," he said. "It is unscientific to educate him either in childhood or young manhood without educating both his intellectual and moral forces. The time will come when, basing our education upon this scientific view, there will not be a university or educational institution in the land which will not develop intellect and morals side by side. This is the solution of the educational problem."

Half Million Fund is Step.—"Mr. Hill believes in denominational instruction because they develop character as well as intellect," continued Dr. Homan. "He did not give this money on the spur of the moment. Andrew Carnegie, who put millions into education by the founding of libraries, he believes in education, if not in Christian education. But we haven't heard the word from Mr. Carnegie yet. You never know what a man may do until he has made his will. Willamette has only begun its career. This Coast will be peopled with millions. Great Oriental activity will be manifested. With a \$500,000 endowment fund, it is but another step to a fund of \$1,000,000. Circuit Judge Galtens voiced the same sentiment as Dr. Homan. "You may teach your boys and girls to be fine scholars," he said, "but unless you put the word back of it, the education amounts to but little."

Other speakers were Dr. H. F. Wilkinson, Rev. C. O. Kimball, B. F. Irwin, C. P. Bishop, John F. Carroll, J. P. Newell, Dr. Benjamin Young, E. H. Todd and Dr. A. E. Eaton, founder of Eaton Hall. T. S. McDaniel was toastmaster.

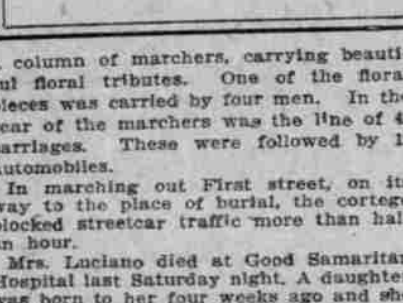
