SAVIOR OF "HAVANA" IS RED-HEADED BOY

James T. Powers, Who Has Leading Role in Own Musical Comedy at Helix, Tells How Final Touch of Color Made Re-Written Piece Possible.

A LITTLE red-headed boy is responsible for the success of "Havana," the attraction at the Helix this week. James T. Powers, who rewrote the musical comedy and the lyrics, and plays the leading role, says so, and he is considered authority in view of the fact that he is the most vitally interested of any in the production, because he receives a royalty in addition to other compensation. "I have rewritten many plays and made them successful," said Mr. Powers yesterday, "but this is the first one from which I received a royalty. Havana had a lot of hard knocks before it became a success two years ago in New York. I took the play, rewrote it, and had it turned down by every theatrical manager in New York. I firmly made up my mind to quit the stage and my wife and I had agreed to it. Then the venture was made and the success is known. This simply illustrates how the best managers are sometimes unable to judge how a show will take with an audience. Sometimes in dress rehearsals the show is so funny that it is difficult to rehearse, and then it falls like a pall over an audience. Again, rehearsals to managers and actors appear so flat that all become faint-hearted but the audience goes wild. So it was with the rejuvenated 'Havana.' Failure was predicted on every side, but it took.

EUGENE GETS WATER BOARD

City Council Gives Committee Full Power to Act.

EUGENE, Or., Feb. 22.—(Special.)—At a meeting Monday night the City Council passed an ordinance creating a Water Board of five members, to have charge of the entire water system of the city, including the newly completed power plant. The ordinance provides for the appointment by the Council of the members of the board and their election thereafter by the people. The appointees are: E. U. Lee, M. Svarverud, C. Frank, R. M. Day and H. E. McKinney. This board holds office for five years and takes the place, so far as the administration is concerned, of the present board.
