

MAN FATALLY SHOT AT CHRISTENING

Tragedy Enacted on Porch as Preparations Are Made to Give Name to Babe.

VICTIM IS FOUND DYING

Within 50 Feet of Party of 40 Merrymakers, Mysterious Assassin Fires Twice and Gets Away, Leaving No Clue.

Bonnelli died from his wounds at 1:15 this morning, at St. Vincent's Hospital.

In a mysterious shooting affray at 575 Hood street, yesterday afternoon, a large party had gathered. The victim was shot twice, receiving wounds from which his death is expected to result at St. Vincent's Hospital. The man who did the shooting is at large and there is not the slightest clue so far by which he can be traced.

Man Whose Throat Was Cut Had Pockets Turned Out—No Weapon Found Near Scene.

NEED OF TIMES IS TOLD

Speaker at Advent Church Deplores Multitude of Doctrines.

"What Our Times Demand" was the subject of Rev. C. P. L. Stultz's sermon at the Advent Christian Church yesterday. He said, in part: "With the increasing influence of Spiritualism, Christian Science, Sociology, Universalism and all that these stand for, the sincere, inquiring mind is often bewildered in regard to the truth, hardly knowing what to believe. In view of the dangerous trend of these doctrines, it is not essential that the church be able to meet the demands of truth-seekers with the fundamentals of Biblical teaching. "Our times demand a doctrine of God in which justice and love are equally balanced. The age has gone mad over the love of God. He is good, they say, and good to everybody; there is no devil, and evil is a delusion. The idea of God is that of absolute equity. "Our times demand a doctrine of man which shall recognize man's need and at the same time provide an adequate supply for that need. It is a truth of God's word, and of experience, that man's helplessness to save himself. Our times demand a doctrine of Christ that shall properly emphasize his nature and work."

SCHOONER SINKS LUNCH

Police Investigate Why Drowning of Two Men Was Not Reported.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 25.—The police are seeking the owners of the lumber schooner "Comet" to learn why the fact was not reported that the vessel ran down and drowned two men yesterday. The case was brought to light after a 24-hour search for the launch John A. by the police boat patrol and several launches, after the boat was reported missing together with her engineer, Elmer Wagner, and Steno Leung, an employe of the California Shrimp Company. When John Patterson, a boy launchman, learned that the schooner "Comet" had lost the John A. he telephoned the company that Frank M. Furman, head of the Shasta Lumber Company, owning the schooner "Comet," had called him up yesterday, asking him if he owned the launch. Johnson then telephoned Furman and told the police that the latter admitted the "Comet" had run down the launch at 10:30 yesterday morning.

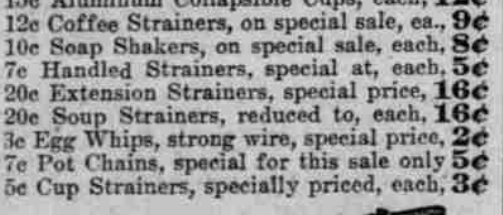
