### Invermay Held Back, Export Grain Total Dwindles.

Six wheat ships, one carrier loaded with flour, were February's contribu-tion to the cereal exports of the present season, the movement aggregating 334.732 bushels of wheat, valued at \$772,543, and 45.735 barrels of flour worth \$138.344. In February, 1310, no wheat or flour was exported. In January but three wheat ships and one Oriental liner cleared and in March one wheat ships and two liners sailed. In wheat ship and two liners sailed. January of this year ten wheat car-riers and one liner got away with 1,282,374 bushels of wheat. However, should the present month not develop a large fleet, the third quarter of the real year will be far in excess of the

same period last season.

BILL IS REPORTED SIGNED

### Local District Gains New Appropriations for Improvements.

It was unofficially reported yesterday that President Taft had affixed his signature to the rivers and harbors bill that sets aside \$350,000 for the completion of the south jetty at the mouth of the Columbia River, which will be enough to commence operations on the north jetty. From Portland to the sea is provided, \$20,000 additional Willametta above Portland, for the Willamette above Portland, \$2000 for the improvement of the Columbia at Vancouver and \$400,000 for the Cellio Canal. From ite mouth of the Snake River to Cellio \$25,000 is made available and \$15,000 for the Snake River proper, with \$5000 for the Cowlitz and Lewis rivers. On outside projects \$50,000 is included for the Riuslaw River, \$40,000 for Coos Bay and \$5000 for Tillamook Bay.


