

SENATE BILL NOTE ON TARIFF BOARD

Agreement Is Made After Long
Filibuster, Democrats
Trying to Kill Time.

REPUBLICANS ARE WILLING

made futile attempts to induce Democratic Senators not to hold up supply bills. Among others he talked with Owen. It was not given out that his mission was on behalf of the President, but that was the impression given out by those with whom he talked.

The filibuster against the tariff board began as soon as the Senate met, coming from the Democrats, who said they would be glad to co-operate with the Republicans in passing the appropriation bills.

Owen of Oklahoma, however, would not be bound even by this agreement. He said he would do all in his power to force an extra session and desired several of the more important appropriation bills to go into that session.

It was 4:35 P. M. when the attempt to force the tariff board bill to a vote was abandoned. McCumber called up the pension appropriation bill. This had the effect of laying aside the tariff board bill indefinitely.

Service Pension Bill Killed.

The Democrats offered no objection to the pension bill, carrying \$150,000,000, until Smoot attempted to put the Sullyway general service pension bill on the appropriation measure as a rider. The Sullyway bill would add about \$50,000,000 to the annual roll and would grant pensions indiscriminately to all veterans of the Civil War who had served 90 days and had reached the age of 62.

Lodge saw trouble coming and made a point of order on the amendment, declaring it to be an attempt to put general legislation on an appropriation bill. While the point was pending, Curtis pleaded for the amendment.

Vice-President Sherman sustained the point of order and the regular appropriation bill was then passed. Following the passage of the pension bill, the Senate took up and quickly disposed of the diplomatic and consular bill, carrying about \$16,000,000, and the fortification bill, carrying about \$500,000. It had required just 15 minutes to get these three supply measures out of the way.

Speed Too Great for Owen.

This was too rapid to suit the plans of Owen and, when the military academy appropriation bill, carrying \$500,000, was called up he began a little filibuster. He insisted that he would not consent to have disposed with the first formal reading of the bill covering 31 pages.

Several Senators, both Democrats and Republicans, gathered about his desk and pleaded with him not to stand in the way of the supply.

"I want to fill an extra session," he told them. "This Congress has no moral right to pass these measures."

While the Senator was engaged in explaining his attitude, the reading clerk, "through pure inadvertence," overlooked about 15 pages of the bill and the first thing Owen knew the bill was being read a second time for amendment.

At 6 o'clock, when it was announced that a recess until 8:15 would be asked for, Owen said he would let the military academy bill pass.

"But," he added, "if these big bills are to be hurried through in this fashion, I shall insist that every item in each bill be separately read and separately voted upon."

At 8:15 the recess until 8:15 was ordered. Hale made the motion to take up the tariff bill, which the Senate met, his purpose being to carry out the agreement under which a vote on the Lorrimer case had been secured. Money insisted on giving appropriation bills precedence and opposed a suggestion to fix 12 o'clock tomorrow for a vote on the tariff board bill.

On Hale's motion the bill was then taken up and debate on it continued. At 9 o'clock, when Bankhead moved to take up the postoffice bill, this was lost by a strictly party vote, 24 to 24, but Shively then asked unanimous consent to take up the postoffice bill. Beveridge objected. Bacon then moved to take up the supply bills and was beaten. Similar motions were made until the Republicans at 4:35 finally gave in.

The postoffice appropriation bill was taken up when the Senate resumed business at 8:15 P. M. Owen indicated he would continue obstructive tactics. Under his demand the postoffice bill was ordered read. He tried also to obtain an explanation of the various items, but Vice-President Sherman said he had no power to compel members to make speeches.

"The Senator from Oklahoma is a member of the postoffice committee and if he is not familiar with the bill it is his own fault," sharply interposed Chairman Penrose, in charge of the measure.

The reading continued, and when Owen's attention was taken by conversation with one of his colleagues, the clerk managed to get through 10 pages in less than five minutes. When Owen learned of the clerk's rapid progress, he looked skeptical, but apparently he realized an objection would be useless.

Stone Reviews Filibuster.

The reading of the postoffice appropriations bill over, Stone, who has figured in several filibusters, took the floor to speak, arousing the anxiety of the Republican Senators who were uncertain as to his intentions. The amendment before the Senate was to increase the number of postoffice inspectors from 95 to 125.

Stone increased the fears of the other side when he began to talk, not about the addition of inspectors, but about the importance of the bill. He assured the Senate that no harm would come if the bill went over to the extra session.

Beveridge wanted to know if the Senator intended to defeat the bill. Stone replied that he did not intend to obstruct the passage of the appropriation bills; he merely wanted to assure President Taft that no harm would come to the country if the big supply bills were not rushed through with hasty consideration.

He assured the Senate he intended to perform his duty of scrutinizing the bill without asking any Senator's permission and not be a party to "dividing out the people's money with blinders on, and without asking questions."

Whole Democratic side appeared to be engaged.

Stone's Oratory Choked Off.

After roll calls for a quorum early this morning, Stone moved to take up the sundry civil appropriation bill. His motion received hardly a vote. Overman suggested the absence of a quorum. Fifty-one tired and sleepy Senators answered the call.

When Stone resumed, Beveridge objected to a question of personal privilege. This time on the bill during the legislative day.

"Has the Senator spoken twice on the bill?" inquired the reading clerk. "No, I have not made a speech before on this subject."

"The rule does not say so," declared the Vice-President. "Proceedings were interrupted while the record was searched. On the strength of the official reporter's reply, the Vice-President ruled that the Senator had spoken once before."

Stone demanded that "his speech" be read. The Vice-President refused. "I appeal from the decision," shouted the Senator.

"I rise to a question of personal privilege," he added, as the Vice-President began to put the appeal.

The Senator was told he could not rise to a question of personal privilege when an appeal was being put.

"Then I withdraw the appeal," responded the Senator.

Stone then claimed the floor on a question of personal privilege.

"I am justified in denying that I made a speech today on this bill at all. It is shown to me," said the Senator.

Overman inquired if the chair meant to say he would take the word of a stenographer before he would read of a Senator.

Stone shakes fist at Railing.

The Vice-President responded he had asked the Senator concerning the facts, and he could not remember. Having appealed to the reporter, the Vice-President said, he was bound to abide by his report.

"And I denounce the ruling as arbitrary and unjust," declared Stone, as he shook his clenched hand above his head.

"The Senator will be in order," said the Vice-President calmly.

"Arbitrary and unjust," repeated Stone, as he sat down. Overman entered the breach and addressed the chair first on the parliamentary situation and then on the bill before the Senate, allaying the feeling aroused by the scene with Stone.

Denial was made by Overman that the Democrats had promised not to oppose the tariff board bill when consent was given last night for a recess. He said he did not want an extra session, but that the blame would be on the Republicans if there was any.

"We can't pass the bill," he shouted. "We won't let it pass here. We want the appropriation bill to pass, and warn you if they are forced into an extra session, there will be material reduction in the bill."

At 4 o'clock Friday morning the Senate adjourned until 9 A. M., without finishing the naval appropriation bill then under consideration. Adjournment was taken upon the absence of a quorum was discovered.

WESTERN COAL INFERIOR

Tests on Battleships Show Eastern Fuel Lasts Longer.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 2.—(Special.)—Despite the secrecy which has been maintained by officers aboard the battleships Maryland and West Virginia, it was learned today that at least one of the comparative tests of Pacific Coast and Eastern coal made has resulted unfavorably to the Western fuel.

Steaming at the same rate of speed and under the same conditions, the West Virginia, with her bunkers filled with West Virginia coal, consumed 90 tons, while the Maryland used 200 tons of Washington and Oregon coal.

It was said that the Maryland on the voyage from San Francisco, burning Western coal was unable to make her usual speed and when she reached the Straits of Fuca
