

HILL ROADS WILL PROMOTE JACKSON

Great Northern District Traffic Agent Called to St. Paul to Confer With Kenney.

OFFICIAL'S RISE IS RAPID

Friends Believe He Will Be Made Assistant Traffic Manager to Fill Position Left Vacant by Kenney's Advancement.

Called to St. Paul by an urgent message from officials of the Great Northern Railway, H. A. Jackson, district freight and passenger agent of the Great Northern in this city, has started on a journey that is likely to mean his promotion to a high position in the traffic department of that road in consequence of the resignation of W. W. Broughton, the veteran traffic manager, which took effect March 1.

Mr. Jackson is in direct line of promotion if the Great Northern continues its established custom of elevating its officials and employees from one end of the line to the other in case of a vacancy.

Following Mr. Broughton's departure last week, Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern, issued an order placing W. P. Kenney, assistant traffic manager, in active charge of the office, although not appointing him to the position of traffic manager. A few days later Mr. Jackson received a message from St. Paul urging him to go there at once for consultation with Mr. Kenney.

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Mr. Jackson has been at the head of the traffic in this district, which comprises all Oregon and part of Washington and Idaho, for nearly two years.

His rise from the ranks has been rapid. Starting as a clerk in an out of the way office he advanced steadily through several minor positions until he entered the Seattle office. He also served for a time in the office at Astoria. Although still a young man his position here is one of the most responsible in the district. He has the utmost confidence of both James J. Hill and of Louis W. Hill, and the latter official, whenever he comes to Portland, generally makes Mr. Jackson's office his headquarters. A firm friendship has developed between them.

FATHER AWAY; CHILD DIES

9 CADETS ON HONOR ROLL

Hill Military Academy Names Promotions in Student Corps.

Nine cadets of the Hill Military Academy were placed on the roll of honor for the first term, which means that they have obtained for the four months and the quarterly and mid-year examinations an average of not less than 90 per cent in their studies, and 100 per cent in deportment.

Huson, of Portland, leads the academic department with an average of 95 per cent. Cadet Color Sergeant Frank O'Brien of San Francisco, follows with 93 per cent; Cadet Captain and Adjutant Wendell Keigh Phillips of Vancouver, Wash., with 91 per cent; Cadet Second Sergeant Errol Briggs, of New Westminster, B. C. with 91 per cent; Cadet First Sergeant Leroy Verne Halbrook, of Portland, with 90 per cent; and Cadet First Corporal Dean Covert, of Portland, with 90 per cent.

The preparatory department is led by Cadet George Hyland, of Portland, with an average of 94 per cent; next follow Cadet Edward McKinley, of Twin Falls, Idaho, with 92 per cent; and Cadet Henry Erben, of Edmonds, Wash., with 91 per cent. These cadets obtained their high grades notwithstanding the fact that they are carrying an average of six subjects, with the general average of studies at the academy is five subjects per cadet.

Huson, of Portland, and Edgar Moran, of Toppenish, Wash.; Cadet corporals—J. R. Coon, of Portland, and Lynn Banke, of Payette, Idaho; Cadet second corporals—Edward Hampe, of Butte, Mont., and C. F. The weekly public battalion and company drills, to which the patrons and friends of the academy are cordially invited, will be given at the academy armory every Friday at 8 o'clock. The first drill of the series will take place Friday, March 10.

DANCES FROWNED UPON

PORTLAND HEIGHTS RESIDENTS WILL MAKE PROTEST.

Committee Named to Ask Council Not to Grant License for Council Crest Pavilion.

Residents of Portland Heights are strenuously opposed to the holding of public dances on Council Crest. Hearing that A. Duchamp had applied to the City Council for a license to hold dances at the Crest pavilion, a meeting was held last night to plan opposition to the granting of the license.

A committee of five was accordingly appointed, whose duty it will be to appear before the Council and induce them to vote against the granting of the license. The members of the committee are George C. Flanders, Charles J. Schnabel, J. A. Curry, George W. Hoyt and M. C. Banfield.

Those present at the meeting last night said they had heard the dances Mr. Duchamp proposed to conduct were to be "invitation affairs," but they believed they would eventually be as bad as those conducted last summer, when the City Council stopped the money and the Crest because of disgraceful scenes enacted on the streets and around the dances and in the neighborhood.

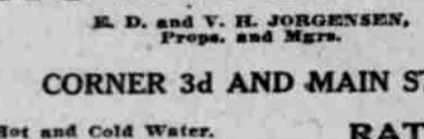

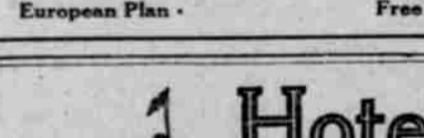

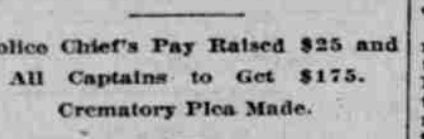
