

ORANGE STOCK

Local Market Advances 25 Cents a Box.

SHIPMENTS VERY SMALL

Heavy Rains in California Check the Output—Only Three Cars Known to Be in Transit to This Market.

Local orange prices were lifted 25 cents a box yesterday because of the small amount of the crop on hand. It has been raining more or less for three weeks in that state and yesterday there was a powerful down, according to wires received. Local quotations were put out at \$2.25, \$2.50 and \$2.75 per box. So far as can be learned, only about three cars of oranges are in transit to this market. Stocks here are small because of the active buying of the last few days.

It is unfortunate for the Los Angeles shippers because such weather conditions prevail at the beginning of the season. The interest displayed at the latest sales, however, indicates that when the growers can put out a heavier supply the market will become an active one. The stockholders and officers of the auction company are well satisfied with the results so far obtained and say that if the auction company in Los Angeles can sell from 8 to 10 cars a day at their tri-weekly sales (which hereafter will be on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, they will establish a market on oranges which will affect every market in the United States.

WHEAT IS HELD IN STRONG HANDS.

Buyers forced to pay the limit to obtain supplies. Extreme firmness prevails in the Oregon wheat markets. The demand, particularly from the South, is urgent and as farmers are very bullish in their views, purchases can only be effected at top prices. The amount of business passing, so far as can be learned, is limited by the unwillingness of holders to let go. Millers on the Sound claim that they do not need much wheat. The principal area being to get the fruit to market as rapidly as it can be disposed of.

CHICAGO WEAK AND LOWER
