

RECENT SESSION BUSY FOR HAWLEY

Work in Behalf of Oregon Irrigation Projects Is Important.

WAR CLAIM ENGROSSING

Representative Indefatigable In Efforts to Have State Reimbursed for Money Spent During the Late Rebellion.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 13.—The three closing months of the first Congress were exceedingly busy ones for Representative Hawley. Being a member of the committee on agriculture, claims, labor and the special committee on the investigation of shipping subsidy lobbies, three of which have been active most of the three months, his time has been fully taken up with hearings, the preparation of appropriation bills, important legislation and the usual departmental duties of a Representative of a wide-awake Congressional district.

One of the most important matters with which he dealt during the session just closed was the allotment of sufficient funds to insure the proper construction of the various irrigation projects in Oregon, particularly the extension of the Umatilla project and the early completion of the Klamath project. After making a careful presentation of the merits of the work in Oregon, Mr. Hawley was assured by the Secretary of the Interior that there would be sufficient funds provided to insure the prompt completion of the Klamath project, as well as other work in the state, \$600,000 being set aside from the special reclamation fund for this purpose, which will be supplemented by revenues from other sources.

War Claim Important.

Another very important matter is the payment of the money Oregon spent during the Civil War at the special request of the United States in the raising of volunteer troops to take the place of the regular soldiers, which were withdrawn to aid in suppressing the rebellion of certain Southern states. There have been numerous attempts made to secure the repayment of these moneys, all of which have failed up to the present time because of certain technical questions involved. Senator Fulton had the matter referred to the Court of Claims for a finding of fact during his closing year in the United States Senate; Attorney-General Crawford drew up a contract with a firm of Washington attorneys to prosecute the case in the Court of Claims, which was done, and a finding made favorable to the state. Mr. Hawley then took the matter up during the second session of the 60th Congress and had a provision inserted in the general deficiency bill providing for the payment of the claim; it was then sent to the Treasury Department, who also reported against the payment of the claim, but the Secretary of the Treasury sent the audit to Congress with the recommendation that the State of Oregon be reimbursed for the expenditure of \$195,548. The committee on appropriations did not include the item in the general deficiency bill of the third session of the 61st Congress, and Mr. Hawley moved an amendment to the bill providing that the above amount be paid to the State of Oregon. A point of order was raised against the appropriation and after argument by Mr. Hawley the chairman sustained the point of order on the ground that the appropriation could not be made in the general deficiency bill for the reason that the finding of the Court of Claims was not a judgment. Mr. Hawley has been indefatigable in his efforts to secure the payment of the claim and intends to make further efforts in the next Congress.

Efforts Are Renewed.

He again renewed his efforts in behalf of the original entrymen on the former Siletz Indian Reservation and when Congress convened introduced another bill for their relief, secured a report on the same and passed the bill through the House without objection. In behalf of Samuel J. Brown, one of the original entrymen whose claim had been canceled and an adverse ruling made by a contestant, he introduced a bill permitting him to make a second homestead entry, and the department reported on the same, granted Mr. Brown the right desired by the bill and disallowed the filing of the contestant.

DRIVER IS BEATEN

Several Are Stoned by Strike Sympathizers in New York.

INSANITY WOMAN'S PLEA

MRS. MELBER'S LAWYER WANTS HER SENT TO ASYLUM.

He Declares to Jury He Would Not See Slayer of 4-Year-Old Boy Set Free.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 13.—Mrs. Edith Melber, on trial for the murder of her four-year-old boy, sat almost without movement for an hour in court today while her attorney, John H. Dugan, told the jury why he thought she should be sent to an insane asylum, rather than to the electric chair.

"This poor, defenseless, mindless woman," was the way Mr. Dugan alluded to her. "I wouldn't, if I could, have this woman go from this room to freedom. I believe she should be sent to an asylum, there to spend under merciful treatment what days remain to her. We will show you that her mother and husband died from consumption and that the same disease has laid its grip upon her."

He charged the prosecution with unusual haste in proceeding against Mrs. Melber, who was indicted three days after her arrest.

The first witness for the defense was John J. O'Hara, who produced a map of the scene of the tragedy to show that the boy's body was left in a comparatively open spot, although there was an abundance of wooded cover.

Then Wilbur Johnson, Michael Connors and Rev. Uriel H. Graves, who visited Mrs. Melber while she was in the poorhouse with her husband, testified that her actions caused them to think she was irrational or unreasonable.

LOS ANGELES STAR PITCHER IS SHOT

"Bill" Tozer Wounded and Race Track Plunger Is Held Assailant.

HURTS NOT DANGEROUS

Player Will Be Out of Game Indefinitely, However—Circumstances Surrounding Brawl Rather Mysterious.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 13.—(Special.)—"Bill" Tozer, pitcher of the Los Angeles baseball club, was brought here from Riverside today, suffering from two gunshot wounds, said to have been inflicted by a 25-caliber rifle in the hands of "Flo" Israel, a well-known race-track plunger. The shooting occurred at midnight last night at Murietta Hot Springs, where the Angels are in Spring training. Lou Guernsey, a newspaper man, received a bullet in the foot. The wound is not serious. Upon his arrival here Tozer was taken directly to the California Hospital, where it was said he is doing well and that the wounds are not regarded as dangerous, but it is probable they will impair Tozer's usefulness to the Los Angeles team indefinitely. This will be a serious blow to the prospects of the team, as Tozer was regarded as a mainstay in the box.

Tozer in Los Angeles.

Immediately after the shooting, Tozer was placed in an automobile and rushed to Riverside, where he was given treatment. This morning he was placed on the 6:30 train and brought to Los Angeles.

One of the bullets struck Tozer in the left arm and the other took effect in his right shoulder. Reports of the circumstances surrounding the shooting are conflicting. According to one of these, Tozer and Israel had serious trouble prior to the shooting, but this is denied by Tozer.

Trouble Is Denied.

"There had been no trouble between Israel and myself," said Tozer. "In the contrary, we had been kidding each other considerably. Israel, I think, had been drinking."

Yesterday the team played a game in which Israel acted as umpire. Several of the players were walking around the hotel last night, having a jocular time and when they arrived in front of his room they engaged Israel in a colloquy. According to one version of the affair Israel went into a room and picked up a repeating 25-caliber rifle and returned to the porch, began firing at the men on the ground below, wounding Tozer and Guernsey. A friend of Israel, occupying a room near him, is said to have disarmed the latter.

Israel was arrested by the Sheriff, according to word from Murietta and taken to jail at Riverside. No charge has been filed against him, it is understood.

Murphy Fails to Reach Albany.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 13.—Plans for a conference on the Senatorial situation tonight between Governor Dix, Mayor Gaynor, of New York, and Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany hall, were upset by the failure of Mr. Murphy to reach Albany this afternoon as he had planned, and as a result the three will not meet until tomorrow.

SOLDIERS BEING DISARMED

Army in Honduras Carries Out Provisions of Peace Pact.

TEGUCIGALPA, Hon., March 13.—The Government troops under General Gutierrez, Salanueva, Lara and Matute have arrived here and are now being disarmed, in accordance with the agreement arranged by the peace conference at Puerto Cortes.

The revolutionary force under General Ferrari and Marini, which for a time threatened Tegucigalpa, is now on the road to Yucatan, a few miles southeast of here, and it is said the insurgents also will disarm.

Kaiser to Visit Francis Joseph.

BERLIN, March 13.—It is announced today that Emperor William would visit Emperor Francis Joseph at Vienna on March 24, while en route for Corfu.

Lafferty Names Postmasters.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—The Post-office Department has notified Congressman Lafferty of the failure of Joseph Shoemaker to qualify as postmaster of Brownlee, Baker County. The office will be discontinued unless another nominee is soon presented. Lafferty has recommended the appointment of John T. Disney as postmaster of Lenora, Crook County.
