DAMAGED SUIT HEARD—Taking of testimony in the case of Mrs. Sarah E. Blair against the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company was completed at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The plaintiff is suing the company for \$25,000 damages, alleging that she was thrown from a car, receiving serious bodily injuries. The accident is alleged to have taken place in October, 1908. The company's witness testified that the plaintiff had stepped from the car before the motor man had time to stop it for her. The opening argument by Henry St. Raymond, attorney for Mrs. Blair, was concluded when the court adjourned at 5 o'clock.

WATERS ARE IN LIGATION

IRRIGATION AND LAND COMPANIES IN COURT. Right to Flow of Willow Creek in Question—Right of Way for Ditches Is Wanted. The right to the use of the waters of Willow Creek, in Malheur County, is involved in the suit of the Willow River Land & Irrigation Company against the Eastern Oregon Land Company, which went to trial on its merits before Federal Judge Wolcott yesterday. The Willow River company is seeking to condemn an aggregate of 67.5 acres, made up of a large number of strips, which it says it must have for constructing its ditches and flumes. The plaintiff alleges further that it has constructed three large reservoirs at great expense and that there is enough water in the reservoirs to irrigate the land susceptible of irrigation. Little of the land wanted for flumes and ditches, says the plaintiff, is fit for agricultural purposes, because it is too steep and rocky. The Willow River company wishes to pay \$1.25 an acre for the land. The Eastern Oregon Land Company, on the other hand, says it owns title to Willow Creek, a perennial stream which flows through its land, and that it needs all the water of the stream for its own irrigation purposes, alleging that its land would be worthless if it did not have the water. It says further that it is making surveys for the construction of reservoirs in which to store the waters of this creek and that of Burnt River, which it is planned to convey to the reservoirs through what is known as the El Dorado ditch. The Willow River company, it alleges, has no right to use the water of Willow Creek, although it is alleged it intends to use it to irrigate land not adjacent thereto. Of the land which the plaintiff company wishes to appropriate 14.3 acres are in section 2, 16.4 acres in section 15, 1.3 acres in section 21, 22.7 acres in section 31; this for the main canal. The plaintiff desires to use 5.9 acres in section 15 for laterals, 2.7 in section 21 for laterals and 5 acres in section 15 for a siphon line.

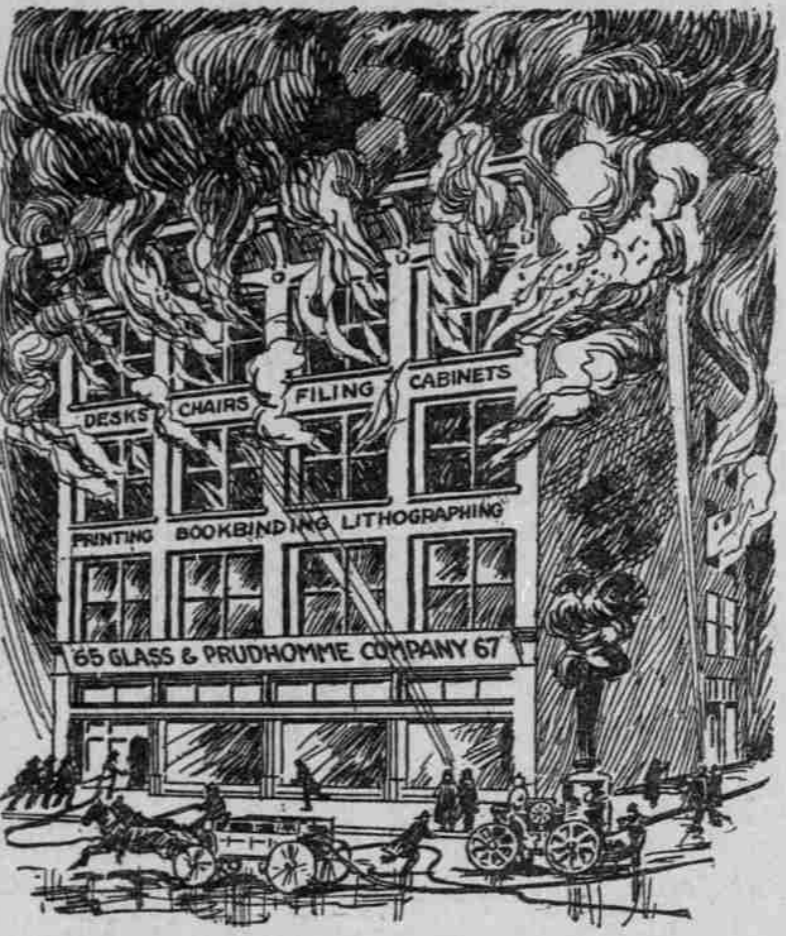
LOCAL FIRMS GIVE \$55,000

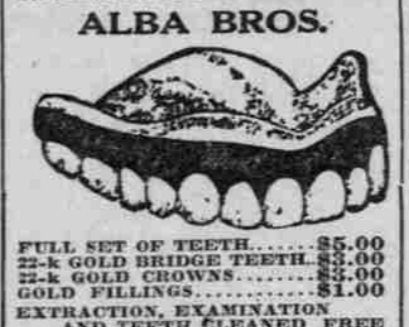
