KILLINGS ONLY IMAGINARY

Only Six Mon Hurt in Strike Against Negro Firemen.

CENCINNATI. March 16.—Reliable re-ports received today show that there is no truth in the rumors of numerous kilf-ings in connection with the atrike of the firemen of the Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific Railroad.

The facts show that only six men have been injured. Five of these are not seriously hurt, while the other man is reported to have a chance for recovery. The railroad issued a notice tonight suffining its position in regard to the strike. The notice points out that the road's agreement with the firemen applies to all firemen, both white and black it says that no negroes are employed as engineers on the road and that negroes will not be promoted to engineers under any circumstances.

At Kings Mountain, Ky. last night, a Chicago strikebreaker known as "William Powers" was beaten by a crowd which afterward tied a rope around his neck and dragged him about the railroad yards. He is in a hospital at Somerset, Ky.

VANCOUVER, Wash, March 16.—A shutdown of all the coal mines in the Crows Nest district of British Columbia, employing 1880 men, is expected to take place soon. The big strike of two years ago was settled by a board of conciliation, and the agreement reached then will expire by limitation April 1. Negotiations for renewal of the agreement have been fruitissa. The union men insist upon the closed shop and concessions in wages.

A struggle of any duration would result in closing the smalters in the West Kootenay, as they are dependent on the Crows Nest for coke. It might also affect a few of the smelters in Montana. The railway companies are the largest consumers of Crows Nest coke, more particularly the Canadian Pacific Railway, Great Northern, Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific and the Chicago, Milwaukes & Puget Sound Railway, it is said that the Canadian railways have sufficient coal in store to keep their trains in operation for six months in the territory served by the Crows Nest coal.

March 1.—That there will be no deviation from their attitude of neutrality was the decision of officials of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, who have been in conference here regarding the firemen's strike on the Queen & Crescent system. The decision of the engineers to remain loyal to the company is considered a hiow to the cause of the firemen.

LOUIS SALAZAR CONFESSES THE MURDER OF AH FOOK.

HOQUIAM, Wash., March 18.—(Special.)

—Oppressed by his terribie secret, which he feared to tell any one, Louis Salagar, accursed of the murder of Ah Fook, a Chinese gardener here, four months ago, has told the entire story to the officers of the Sheriff's office, according to Deputy Sheriff Colin McKenzie, who brought the man to the county jail at Montessano last night.

Salazar took the first opportunity he had after he was captured and knew that he was at last in the grasp of the law, and told McKenzie the entire story, stating that he committed the murder for only E, that being all the money he dould find in the colestial's cabin. He said he had crept into Ah Fook's cabin, McKenzie states, and struck the Chinese twice on the head with a hammer.

The victim, he he fell, gave a plercing shrick and Salazar seized a hatchet and sinshed his victum on the throat. He then dragged the body to the river, about 100 feet away, and threw it into the water, the tide being high at the time. He returned to cabin, according to his story, but was unable to find more than a 15 gold piece.

TRIAL MADE DRAMA

Camorrists Vehemently Deny Charges in Indictment.

ACCUSED PRIEST SPEAKS

Dreary Task of Rending Charges Is Enlivened by Protests From Men in Bock-Erricone Spits in Photographer's Face.

VITERBO, Italy, March 16 .- The rules for criminal procedure in Italy make possible frequent dramatic incidents, and it was due to this that to-day's sension of the trial of the Camorri-ts held a lively sensation for the crowd that occupied every available square foot in the old Church of San

When court opened the clerk resumed the reading of the long indict-ment of the thirty-six prisoners, and this took up the whole forenoon, the monotony of the recital, however, being broken by interruptions from the prisoners' cage or by others in the room whose interests were in some

room whose interests were in some manner involved.

When the clerk read the passage referring to the priest Ciro Vitorni, the aged prisoner was visibly affected, and at the words "although never condemned. Vitorni morally is a criminal," he raised his eyes and murmured: "I offer my sufferings to relieve souls in purgatory."

During the description of the murder of Gennaro Cuccole and his wife, Maria, "the beautiful Sorrentina," Mariano de Gennaro, who is charged with having been one of the actual assassina, rose from his place in the steel pen grenily agitated. The reading cierk paused a moment and the prisoner, placing his hand over his heart and addressing his wife, who was among the spectators, said:

"I swear to you I am innocent?"

On another occasion, De Angelis and Amedeo protested their innocence and demanded redress for having been falsely involved by priest Vitorni. Their arrest was due to a declaration to the police by the priest and in aid of Erricone, the alleged brains of the Camorra.

De Angelis seemed more upset by the accusation than Amodeo did. as the former already has been condemned for crimes of bloed, and it so happened that at the time of the murder of the Cuoccoles he had a fresh knife cut on the hand, and at his home bloodstained garments were found. These men were able to prove that the priest had testified faisely, but they were held as members of the Camerra. In court they protested vehemently against having been detained, since their apprehension was due to assertions by a fellow prisoner which were known to be false.
