

GREETINGS SENT BY IRISH LEADERS

Prospects of Home Rule Are Bright, Redmond Tells Compatriots.

PEACE NOW IS HIS DESIRE

Heads of Three Progressive Elements in Ireland Send St. Patrick's Messages, Telling of Outlook for Erin.

LONDON, March 16.—In honor of St. Patrick's day and the near approach of home rule for Ireland, several Irish leaders tonight issued formal statements and greetings on the occasion of the National anniversary. These included John J. Redmond, chairman of the Irish Parliamentary party and chairman of the United Irish League of Great Britain; William O'Brien, member for Cork and leader of the Independent Nationalists, and Lord Dunraven, president of the Irish Reform Association.

H. H. Asquith, Prime Minister, and A. J. Balfour, ex-Premier and leader of the opposition in the House of Commons, declined to make any comment on the probability of home rule, refusing to break the long tradition against Cabinet members giving an interview.

In a speech at the St. Patrick's banquet tonight, Mr. Redmond referred to how, amid a long list of valuable Irish reforms achieved during the last 12 years, they had met each year at the festival almost despairing of achieving the great goal of their aspirations.

Peace With England Sought. "Now, at last," he said, "we meet with the light of victory shining on our country and our cause. The struggle between England and Ireland has joined hands against the common foe of both, in defense of the people's liberties and rights.

Lord Dunraven says home rule will be constructed out of the wreck of the constitution. He accuses the Radicals of killing the land purchase act.

Woman Is Shocked. If this was a shock to friends of Mrs. Burke-Roche, then Mrs. Batonyi, it was a greater one to that lady herself, for she has extravagant tastes and was used in other days to spending \$50,000 a year on gowns alone, and amounts as large as \$15,000 on one entertainment.

However, after she had secured her freedom from Batonyi, her father's bitterness gradually subsided and when his fatal illness came, she found herself back in the old home, administering lovingly to the needs of her aged parent. It is expected that his will provides liberally for her.

GOULD FOILS STANDARD OIL

He Fights to Keep Railroad System Intact and Wins.

NEW YORK, March 16.—Frank J. Gould, who announced last night his intention to issue a statement of alleged effort by Standard Oil to force the corporation's wishes on the management of the Missouri Pacific, issued another statement today, explaining why he had sided with the minority stockholders in the meeting at St. Louis.

"The tendency," he said, "recently has been to undertake projects which were made to correct not only such an impulsion, but to put the management of the company into hands which would protect the integrity of the system. The result was that the directors have indicated that they will stand together in preserving their property intact."

ANOTHER OF GANG CAUGHT

Crider Accused of Complicity With Maybray, Arrested.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 16.—Another arrest of an alleged member of the famous Maybray gang, indicted in the Crider-Cramer case, is on charges of working a gigantic scheme through

the United States mail to defraud, was made here today in the person of W. L. Crider, 44 years old, who claims to be a commercial traveler. Crider came here five months ago with his wife and two children from Denver. He was found today in a residence on West Fifth street. The specific charge against Crider is swindling a Louisville, Ky., man out of \$1000.

DAVIES PAYS LIGHT PENALTY

Confessed Maybray Swindler to Testify Against Others.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., March 16.—Judge Smith McPherson, in the Federal District Court this morning, sentenced to six months in the jail at Red Oak Ia., Thomas Davies, of Oklahoma, who yesterday pleaded guilty to the fraudulent use of the mails in connection with the Maybray fake sporting events. It is understood that Davies has consented to give testimony for the Government in some of the other cases and for that reason received a light sentence.

SLAYER TELLS OF DEED

LOUIS SALAZAR CONFESSES THE MURDER OF AH FOOK.

After Hiding for Four Months With Fear of Arrest, Man Gives Up and Recounts Details.

HOUQUAM, Wash., March 16.—(Special.)—Oppressed by his terrible secret, which he feared to tell any one, Louis Salazar, accused of the murder of Ah Fook, a Chinese gardener here, four months ago, has told the entire story to the officers of the Sheriff's office, according to Deputy Sheriff Col. McKenzie, who brought the man to the county jail at Montesano last night.

Salazar took the first opportunity he had after he was captured and knew that he was at last in the grasp of the law, and told McKenzie the entire story, stating that he committed the murder for only \$5, that being all the money he would find in the celestial cabin. He said he had crept into Ah Fook's cabin, McKenzie states, and struck the Chinese twice on the head with a hammer. The victim, he he fell, gave a piercing shriek and Salazar seized a hatchet and slashed his victim on the throat. He then dragged the body to the river, about 100 feet away, and threw it into the water, the tide being high at the time. He returned to cabin, according to his story, but was unable to find more than a \$5 gold piece.

Salazar had been hiding in a fisherman's cabin on the Fraser River since Christmas. He knew that was wanted soon after the crime, he saw a Houquam paper and made out two words, his own name, misspelled, and "China-man." Fearing to tell even his own countrymen of his deed, believing they would give him up to the officers, he had brooded over it until he sought an opportunity to tell McKenzie the full details as soon as he knew that escape was impossible.

TRIAL MADE DRAMA

Camorristi Vehemently Deny Charges in Indictment.

ACCUSED PRIEST SPEAKS

Dreary Task of Reading Charges Is Enlivened by Protests From Men in Dock—Erricone Spits in Photographer's Face.

VITERBO, Italy, March 16.—The rules for criminal procedure in Italy make possible frequent dramatic incidents, and it was due to this that today's session of the trial of the Camorristi held a lively sensation for the crowd that occupied every available square foot in the old Church of San Francisco.

When court opened the clerk resumed the reading of the long indictment of the thirty-six prisoners, and this took up the whole forenoon, the monotony of the recital, however, being broken by interruptions from the prisoners' cage or by others in the room whose interests were in some manner involved.

During the description of the murder of Geniaro Cuocolo and his wife, Maria, "the beautiful Sorrentina," Mariano de Geniaro, who is charged with having been one of the actual assassins, rose from his place in the steel pen greatly agitated. The reading clerk paused a moment and the prisoner, placing his hand over his heart and addressing his wife, who was among the spectators, said: "I swear to you I am innocent."

On another occasion, De Angelis and Amodeo protested their innocence and demanded redress for having been falsely imprisoned. These men were able to prove that the priest had testified falsely, but they were held as members of the Camorra. In court they protested vehemently against having been detained, since their apprehension was due to assertions by a fellow prisoner which were known to be false.

When Erricone's picture was snapped today for a paper hostile to the Camorra he spat in the face of the photographer and in a rage swore that he would kick this man until he was dead. Erricone's shackles prevented the execution of this threat.

Spittorf's magneto store, the flames spreading rapidly to five other automobile supply stores, destroying the contents of the buildings. The total loss on the stocks of the six stores was probably close to \$100,000. The buildings were of an estimated value not exceeding \$20,000.
