M. G. Munly Declares Chamber of Commerce "Mafia" Made Port Member Quit.

WHEELWRIGHT DENIES IT

Committee of Fifty Leader Investigates Charge Alleging Intimidation to Expose Accused Men to Public.

M. G. Munly proposes to find out if men high up in the Chamber of Commerce are responsible for the resignation of Captain Grove from the Port of Portland Commission.

Captain Grove was absent from home yesterday and will not return until tonight. Nothing more in the way of explanation of his resignation has been given out by him other than his formal letter to Governor West, resigning his position.

"I have been told," said Mr. Munly, "that Captain Grove had been warned by men high in the Chamber of Commerce, that unless he resigned from the Port of Portland Commission, they would take steps to ruin his business."

"When asked if an effort would be made to have Governor West appoint a new member to the Commission to take the place of Captain Grove, Mr. Munly said he did not think such action would be taken."

"Not True," Says Wheelwright. "Tommyrot," said William D. Wheelwright, when informed of the charge.

"So far as I know there is not a word of truth in the assertion that Grove resigned on account of pressure brought to bear by the 'high-ups' in the Chamber of Commerce," said Mr. Wheelwright.

"Mafia Charge Called Slap. "As to a Mafia in the Chamber of Commerce, I regard that as a slap in the face of an able and conscientious business man of the city."

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RISES IN PAY FOUGHT

COUNCILMAN BURGARD, NEW MEMBER, IS CAUTIOUS.

"Where Is Money Coming From?" Is Question That Holds Up Several Applications.

Councilman Burgard, who joined the City Council recently, stood out yesterday against increasing any more salaries until such time as he can be shown where the funds are coming from to pay them.

"I do not say that I am opposed to any one of these proposed increases," said Mr. Burgard, "but I must know how the money to pay the salaries is coming from. I believe in paying all that an employee is worth, but I must know first about the money."

"If the funds are not at hand, some means should be created to get them," replied Councilman Baker. "In my business I am not averse to the idea of raising the money to pay the salaries."

Over the question of a proposed increase in the salary of Mrs. Rachel D. Shatto, the members of the committee had considerable talk. Councilman Cellars declared that he would like to see many more such cases as Councilman Rughlind had said that a nurse in private life is paid \$4 a day.

"I am paying a nurse who is on duty 24 hours a day," said Mr. Burgard, in reply. "She is on call whenever wanted."

Councilman Baker said he did not believe in such a plan, that he once employed a nurse and that she worked as much as he was, but that he was not paying her more than \$5 to \$6 a month, but Mr. Burgard held out against granting it and he was supported by Councilmen Cellars and Waller.

Among the applications for increases were those of O. Buchtel, sealer of weights and measures, who asks \$150 instead of \$125 a month; his deputy, who asks for an increase from \$100 to \$125; F. D. Smith, city milk chemist, who asks a rise from \$135 to \$150, and 11 patrol sergeants in the police department, who want an increase from \$125 to \$135.

The general fund is running low, and it is because of this that the more conservative members of the Council are careful in considering Mayor Simon's proposed granting any more rises, and showed his disapproval of the proposals being made on the general fund by allowing the last salary ordinance to go into effect without his signature.
