In doing so, the Governer said that he hoped the "other three members," meaning William D. Wheelwright, J. C. Alnsworth and C. F. Adams, would qualify. If they did not do so by Menday, he said, he would appoint three recommended in their places. But Mr. Wheelwright and Mr. Ainsworth said last night that they would not accept the Governor's appointment. Mr. Adams is in California. Mr. Wheelwright said:

"It seems strange to me that some persons do not appreciate that certain members of the old Port of Portland Commission are advised by their counsel that they still constitute the comset that they still constitute the comof the Port of Portland Commis-

Commission are advised by their coun-sel that they still constitute the com-mission, that the law under which the Governor appoints them is unconsti-tutional. The three members of the old board say they are still in office without accepting the Governor's ap-pointment, not because they want it, but in order that the question may go to the Supreme Court that the law may be construed. If I should attend a meeting I would never attend one exto the Supreme Court that the law may be construed. If I should attend a meeting I would never attend one except to resign. The business of the port must go on, you know, and we are taking this position to give the people opposed to us a chance to come up and oust us from office. Not one of the seven members of the old Commission wants to stay there a minute."

"I wrote Governor West I did not think it best to act on the old board and on the new board also before the legality of the old board's position is determined." said Mr. Ainsworth, "and that we would have to consider ourselves members of the old board until the legality of the new and old are determined. I think we can have a decision within 30 days. Before any of our proceedings will be legality of the act of the Legislature providing for the new board."


