Pressed for a definite announce-ment as to the probability of his be-coming a candidate for Mayor, Dr. Harry Lane yesterday said be expect-ed to reach a decision before the end of the week. Further than to make this admission, which is the only con-

this admission, which is the only concession the Sphinx-like ex-Mayor has
made during the campaign, he refused
to be questioned.

Whether Lane will get into the race
is more than even his closest friends
will predict. In political matters he
always has been a conundrum to his
most intimate associates, and he has
a habit of doing just about what he
decides to do and then only when he
gets good and ready. That is the reason nobody will wager his reputation as a prognessicator in attempting
to f tell Lane's course.

#### Rivals' Chance Considered.

Despite the fact that it has been repurliated by both Lane and Rushilght,
the impression still prevails that an
understanding exists between them by
which neither will oppose the other
in the pending contest. For this reason, it is suspected that Lane will not
become a candidate so long as he bethevas Rushilght can win in the Republican primaries. In these circumstances, entrance of Lane into the
fight for the Democratic nomination
in opposition to George H. Thomas
would be accepted by many as a conviction on Lane's part that Rushilght
will not be able to carry off the Republican nemination.

By these same voters Lans is not expected to come out for the Democratic nomination.

They believe he will prefer to await the result of the Republican primaries. If Rushlight should win, then Lane is not expected to enter the contest. Should either Werlein or Lombard be neminated, friends close to Lane are satisfied he would become a candidate. Lans is said to feel that his service of four years is all that should be asked of him in the Mayor's chair, and he is averse to looking for further trouble, aithough his friends are most persistent in demanding that he coment to rus.

#### Rushlight Announces Platform.

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Councilman Rushlight yesterday made a formal announcement of his candidacy, and at the same time issued a platform on which he will ask nomination and election as the Republican candidate. Mr. Rushlight pledges himself to an economical administration, and promises to effect a reduction in the constantly increasing burden of taxes in municipal affairs. He opposes strest vacations, except when the city is duly compensated; favors a municipal paving plant; declares that the City Engineer's office should be conducted for the benefit of those on whom the burden of improvement falls, and not for the paving combines, and promises to compel corporate interests to contribute more largely toward meeting the expenses of municipal administration.
