******************* NEW PORT OF PORTLAND COM-MISSION ASSERTS ITS POSITION.

New Commissioners of the Port of Portland yesterday refused to accede to the request of the Security Savings Trust Company that all checks be signed by officers boiding office and these appointed by Governor West. Appointees authorize officers to sign potton directed to board that they be placed in possession of all property and records.

Motion carried that County Treasarer be informed that new Commission will demand from him funds be-langing to the Port of Portland. New board will not sanction diver-sion of funds at present for construc-

Even though not in possession of steamers, dredges and other equipment, and realizing that while armed with official commissions from Governor West that they face the dilemma of being barred from the actual performance of administrative functions until the courts pass on the legality of the new Port of Portland act, there was a business-like seesion of the new offi-cials gesterday morning. One thing was made strongly apparent, and that was that litigation will be started within a week, unless the incumbents of office under the administration in power see fit to abdicate.

LUMBER TRADE IS IMPROVING

March Movements to All Ports Best of New Season.

March closed with total credits for coastwise and offshore lumber movecoastwise and offshore lumber move-ments of 14,845,301 feet, which is the best showing for the new year, but below the business of March, 1910. There was moved coastwise 10,006, 842 feet, against 8,465,000 feet in March of last year, but the exportation reached 4,239,459 feet, as compared with 15,015,823 feet for the same period last

In the foreign fleet was but one ful In the fereign fleet was but one full carge, that of the British tramp North-umbria, which cleared for Shanghai with 2,321,575 feet, and loaded more on the lower river. 
