

WILCOX SKYSCRAPER WORK IS DIRECTED BY PHONE.

FEVER CAUSES QUARANTINE. When Physician Thinks F. L. Brayton, Superintendent of Construction, Has Contagious Disease, He Installs Phone by Bed.

Quarantined in an East Side private sanitarium for several days last week, after he had exhibited symptoms of scarlet fever, F. L. Brayton, in charge of the construction work on the 12-story Wilcox building, being erected at Sixth and Washington streets, installed a telephone beside his bed and continued his work of superintending by telephone.

The first difficulty which Mr. Brayton encountered when he asked for a telephone was the unwillingness of any one to install it in his room because of fear of contagion. He had the wire and other apparatus sent to the sanitarium and made the necessary connections himself. During the time he was in quarantine a large part of the foundation of the building was completed, the base plates for the steel columns and the delivery of steel on the ground was commenced.

"Monday night" said Mr. Brayton, "two doctors told me that I was in for a sleep of scarlet fever and insisted that I go into quarantine. Tuesday morning a rash broke out though I did not feel ill. The physician told me in seclusion and put me on a diet of milk. I hollered for beefsteak, but it was no use. It was Sunday afternoon before I was able to convince the doctors that I was perfectly well."
