

FRIEND PILFERS ARMOUR FORTUNE

Woman Protege of Rich
Widow Takes Sum of \$105,-
000 From Bank.

FRIENDSHIP NOT BROKEN

However, Guilty Girl Is No Longer
Executrix of Benefactor's Will.
Desire for Art Treasures
Behind Peculations.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 6.—With a craving for the possession of valuable works of art which her own purse did not permit of buying, a young woman, the close friend and companion of Mrs. S. B. Armour, widow of the millionaire pork packer, took securities worth \$105,000 from Mrs. Armour's strong box in the New England National Bank, sold them and spent the money.

This fact became known today, although the name of the young woman has been withheld because, despite her actions, she seems still in the good graces of Mrs. Armour. However, when the young woman's transaction was discovered, Mrs. Armour made a change in her will, which had previously named the young friend executrix.

Mrs. Armour Sees Friend.

The young woman was one of the few intimate friends Mrs. Armour would receive at her home on Warwick boulevard today. What transpired when the two women met is not known.

Many of the art treasures purchased by the young woman remained in the shops for weeks and were then removed to a storeroom. It is understood that all of them have been turned over to Mrs. Armour.

One firm of brokers is said to have handled about \$50,000 worth of the bonds. All of them the young woman brought to the office personally. She represented that Mrs. Armour wished the securities sold as soon as possible.

Knowing the close relations existing between the young woman and Mrs. Armour, the broker accepted the commission without suspicion.

Mrs. Armour Notified.

Another broker familiar with the young woman's transactions is said to have reported them to Mrs. Armour's banker. This banker immediately told Mrs. Armour. She is said to have been astonished, and at the time refused to believe in the dishonesty of her young friend. It was not until later that she changed her will. One of those closely connected with the case said this morning:

Everything in this affair shows an abnormal state of the young woman's mind. What did she do? Money rolled in by the thousands of dollars. Did she put it away? Not a bit of it. She evidently had a taste for the artistic. She never had been able before to gratify that taste. By some means she had come in contact with valuable rugs, pictures and jewels. She yearned to have such things of her own. And she did. She went into the shops and bought without regard to price. It is a strange case, and one worth the study of a criminologist.

On one occasion, being questioned by a tradesman about her extensive purchases, the young woman explained that a wealthy friend was sending her money, and that when she had accumulated \$50,000 from her brother's gifts she intended to "retire."

RABBI SMUGGLES GEMS

Montreal Preacher Found Guilty of
Uncut Diamond Deal.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., April 6.—Samuel Goldstein, a rabbi of Montreal, was indicted by the Federal grand jury here today on a charge of smuggling 101 uncut diamonds into the United States at house of Point, Mar. 14 last. The diamonds were in Goldstein's possession when he was arrested.

The prisoner pleaded guilty this afternoon and Judge Ray sentenced him to the Federal prison at Atlanta for one month and fined him \$500. If the fine is paid by tomorrow, the sentence will be modified.

LAMATH HENS AHEAD

Harrytown Record Beaten by 15
That Lay 256 Eggs.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., April 6.—(Special.)—The man who won \$2000 because his 60 hens laid 1909 eggs in February, or an average of 17 eggs a hen, has been beaten here. Harry Caden's 15 ordinary Lamath County hens laid 256 eggs last month. Six of the hens are pullets and do not begin to lay until after the first of the month.

HENRY CHASE ENDS

Police Cannot Arrest Woman,
They Suddenly Discover.

SHE IS STILL IN HIDING

Seattle Judge Never Signed Divorce
Decree So Search for Fair Kid-
naper Is Illegal—It Has
Also Been Futile.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—(Special.)—Search for Mrs. Albert J. Henry, divorced wife of a Seattle banker, and her two children, whom she kidnapped Monday night, came to a sudden end today.

Although there is no further need on her part of hiding, the pretty divorcee still remains in seclusion and the efforts of a score of detectives have failed in locating her.

It was discovered this morning by Detective Kavanagh, in charge of the search, that the Seattle judge who granted an interlocutory decree of divorce to her husband had failed to sign the document. The police accordingly pursued by a score of detectives, Mrs. Henry has eluded capture for three days. A warrant for her arrest and writs of habeas corpus have been issued against her, but those to whom the documents were intrusted for service have failed completely to find a trace of her. She disappeared Monday night after kidnapping her two children from an apartment-house at Jones and Clay streets. Attorneys for Mrs. Henry assert that their reason for her remaining in seclusion except her own personal preference. The police have no authority to arrest her, they declare.

"If I had had this with me in Washington I should have had less trouble with the Senate," Mrs. Henry is still in the city or has taken her children to the Mexican border in the hope of escaping further trouble, the police are unable to say. They were unable to find her and have now completely abandoned the search.

"So far as I know the police department will not work on the case any more," said Detective Kavanagh. "We discovered that the judge failed to sign the decree of divorce, so there is nothing we can do. Even should we find the woman, we have no right to arrest her, but there doesn't seem to be any chance of finding her. She has eluded us completely."

sort and the other that I should fill any public office so long as it was sufficiently remote from New York."

Roosevelt Ought to Know.

Mr. Roosevelt said that as he was at the height of the generation of his family and born in New York, he had reason to know some of the "salient shortcomings" of his native city.

Several thousand people waited outside the hall to greet Mr. Roosevelt as he passed, standing in an automobile and bowing on his way to the Press Club. At the club he made a brief humorous address. Seizing the big fir stick that rested on the arm of his chair he exclaimed:

"If I had had this with me in Washington I should have had less trouble with the Senate."

From the Press Club Mr. Roosevelt went directly to his special car which will be attached to the regular train for Spokane leaving at 7:15 in the morning. Only the regular stops will be made and Mr. Roosevelt will deliver as few speeches as possible. The train will reach Spokane at 9:30 tomorrow night.

Crowds Wait Long.

Long before the hour for Colonel Roosevelt's arrival here the downtown streets through which the automobile procession was to pass were jammed with people. The crowd was jammed and when the ex-President passed through the streets he was greeted by continuous applause.

When Colonel Roosevelt, with his party, arrived at the University he donned a cap and gown and went to the outdoor amphitheater, where an audience of 15,000 was gathered and the students directly in front of the platform.

Colonel Roosevelt spoke on "Good Citizenship," addressing himself espe-

cially to the students. He predicted the early adoption of an amendment to the Constitution providing for popular election of Senators.

"Why," he exclaimed, "the New York Legislature after balloting for months chose as Senator a man whom no human being had ever heard of as a candidate for Senator. Iowa is balloting yet."

"So is Colorado," someone shouted. "Yes, there are several vacancies in the Senate," replied Colonel Roosevelt. "There ought to be more," several persons cried.

Cries From Crowd Answered.

"Several vacancies have recently been made which we can afford to bear with equanimity," remarked Colonel Roosevelt.

"There ought to be one from Illinois," cried someone.

"A small majority of the holdover Senators decided that they would prefer not to sit with Mr. Lorimer, but ten Senators, whom the voters had decided to permit to resume their occupations in private life, voted that Mr. Lorimer was a proper Senator."

TACOMA STADIUM THROGGED

30,000 Hear Roosevelt Speak at
City of Destiny.

TACOMA, April 6.—On his arrival in Tacoma early today, Theodore Roosevelt was greeted by a committee of citizens which directed his movements for the few hours he spent in this city. Mr. Roosevelt attended a private breakfast when he left his car, going from the hotel on an automobile trip through the city, in the course of which he reviewed the Grand Army men and the Veterans of the Spanish War. Among the guests at the breakfast were three members of his old regiment, the Rough Riders, and to these Mr. Roosevelt was particularly cordial.

The principal address Mr. Roosevelt delivered here was shortly before noon at the stadium where fully 30,000 people were gathered to greet him. The ceremonies at the stadium were opened with a drill by 1000 school boys in the "setting up" exercises of the United States Army.

As Mr. Roosevelt mounted the stand prepared for him, a pistol shot sounded the call for silence and perfect quiet followed. Mr. Roosevelt opened his remarks with an outline of his views on good citizenship. He said that the future of the Nation rested upon the honesty of the individual citizen and his performance of his duties at home or at the polls.

CHAPMAN THANKS ROOSEVELT

Official Grateful for Forest Fire
Warning in Speech.

C. S. Chapman, of the Oregon Forest Fire Association, wrote ex-President Roosevelt a letter yesterday, thanking him for what he said in his Army address about forest fires and their prevention. The letter reads:

In behalf of the Oregon Forest Fire Association, an organization whose aim is the protection of the state's greatest resource, I wish to express our appreciation of the manner in which you called to the attention of citizens of Oregon the need for preventing forest fires.

The government, state and private owners are fully alive to the need for forest protection, and are spending large sums of money yearly to bring this about. But their joint efforts can only result in the greatest benefit through the cooperation of all the people. The necessity for care in the use of fire and the fact that as a commonwealth Oregon is interested in every stick of timber in the state can be best brought home to our citizens through the utterances of those in a position best to judge of our needs and responsibilities.

Your remarks will have a far-reaching effect and greatly stimulate the efforts of those endeavoring to put down an evil which threatens our prosperity.

Councilman in this city and two terms as Mayor. He was the first Mayor elected in Dallas. He also served as a

County Clerk of Polk County for two terms. Mr. Ellis was a member of the Masonic order.
