

DR. LANE DOES NOT WANT TO BE MAYOR

Decision to Allow Name to Be Used Now Said to Be Regretted.

SUCCESS IS NOT CERTAIN

Personal Feelings, However, Friends Say, Are Leading Influence in Determination — Thomas Appeals to Party.

Dr. Harry Lane probably will not be a candidate for the office of Mayor, after all. He admitted as much last night when asked the direct question. He declined, however, to give his reasons.

"I do not think I shall run," was the terse reply Dr. Lane gave to a direct question.

"Why?" he was next asked.

"Oh, I shall give my reasons in writing, over my own signature. If I finally decide not to run," he said.

From close friends of the ex-Mayor, however, it was learned that he does not, in reality, want to be Mayor again; that he prefers to remain in private life and that he does not regard the prospect with satisfaction. It is said that he does not care to put in another term because of the turmoil and strife that the position entails.

Earlier Decision Regretted.

It is believed, also, that Dr. Lane regrets that he ever allowed his friends to persuade him to announce himself for the office; he feels that he yielded to their persuasions against his own judgment and that he should now firmly determine to keep out of the race.

With Dr. Lane out of the race, George H. Thomas, chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee, is the only avowed candidate for Mayor on the Democratic ticket. He has already filed his declaration and is making an active canvass for votes. He is lining up party war horses and his rally cry is "party loyalty."

Mr. Thomas and Dr. Lane are political enemies and while Thomas is standing on a rock-ribbed party platform, Dr. Lane appeals to all parties. It is because of his non-partisan attitude that he has been the target of many staunch party men during his tenure of office. These men have not forgotten that he appointed Republican, as well as Democratic, brethren, to office, and they are now "out with the knife" for him.

It is also believed by many that Dr. Lane's chances of election are not promising; that support was not forthcoming from certain quarters where he had hoped for advantage and that, taken altogether, the outlook is not bright. It is urged, however, by his warmest friends that it is the fact that he does not want the office that prompts him to withdraw at this time.

Rushlight Is Friend.

There is still another feature to the situation, which finds favor with a large number. It has been learned from the outset that Dr. Lane and A. G. Rushlight, a Republican candidate, would not oppose each other; that they represented the same later, and that one of them would make way for the other. If the campaign developed the necessity.

Mr. Rushlight supported Dr. Lane cordially during Lane's two terms of office, and Dr. Lane refused to be a candidate for a third term largely because Rushlight was out for the place. It is known that Dr. Lane regards Rushlight with favor and believes him to be a "safe" man for the position. Both Dr. Lane and Rushlight cater particularly to the labor element and are classed as "people's" men.

The elimination of Dr. Lane makes the Mayoralty race much more of a Republican affair, as George H. Thomas is playing largely for Democratic votes, and it is regarded as certain that he cannot win over the Republican nominee. The race in the Republican primaries lies between Rushlight, City Treasurer W. H. Leland, and City Councilman, thus far, out for the place. Candidates having filed applications. It is believed that none will file.

Rushlight Works Quietly.

Rushlight is managing his own campaign, and is slipping around quietly, seeing the voters. He has declined to make public issues with W. H. Leland and Lombard.

Lombard, who resigned from the City Council to become a candidate, is lambasting certain members of the Council, is calling for a "new deal" in that body and is appealing to all classes for support.

W. H. Leland is working a small army of his supporters in a precinct organization and is making some speeches, too. He challenged his two opponents, to a series of debates, which he has accepted. The first debate will be held in the Masonic Temple the evening of April 24. W. H. Leland is to open with a talk of 30 minutes; Lombard will follow with a 20-minute talk and W. H. Leland will close with a ten-minute talk.

MONTAG BELDING'S OPPONENT

Councilman Has Hard Contest for First Time in Seven Years.

Having been endorsed at a non-partisan meeting of Sixth Ward voters as a candidate for Councilman from that ward, John Montag, Democrat, yesterday filed with the City Auditor an announcement of his candidacy. Mr. Montag will seek to succeed Councilman Belding, whose term will expire July 1. For the first time during his long period of service in the Council, Belding is this year confronted with an active opposition. At a meeting last week, attended by Republicans and Democrats residing in the Sixth Ward, Mr. Montag was induced to become a candidate. Through the organization of the ward with the precinct as a unit, the opposition to Councilman Belding hopes to replace him with Mr. Montag.

MEDFORD UNIONS BALK

COOKS AND WAITERS WALK OUT AND GRILL BOYCOTTED.

Central Labor Council Will Ask City Authorities to Use Only Union Labor on Streets.

MEDFORD, Or., April 12.—(Special.)—With all of the trades in Medford organized, and with the Nash Grill boycotted because it refused to accede to the demands of the Cooks and Waiters Union, and with general agitation for a closed town in labor matters, Medford seems to be on the verge of a labor war.

A number of other institutions in the city are said to be contemplating standing out against a closed-shop policy, and the Medford labor leaders declare they will fight to a finish.

It came known last night that a committee from the Central Labor Council will call upon the City Council at its next meeting and demand that all of the present work being done by the city be placed upon a union basis. This is said to include the work being done on the streets by paving contractors as well as the companies who are laying water mains and sewer mains. The committee from the labor council will demand that an eight-hour day be enforced, and that no foreigners be employed.

Expression from the Councilmen indicate that they will be willing to place the work done directly by the city on such a basis, but they state that, after letting a contract for the other work to different firms, they have no further control in the matter. The labor leaders, however, say that they will not accept this as a final answer. The contractors say that the demands cannot be met, as they cannot secure American labor but are forced to use foreigners.

The laboring element is represented on the City Council by George H. Millar, who was elected in January on a Socialist ticket. He has pledged himself to lead the fight for them.

The Nash Grill has been boycotted by the Waiters Union, as the management refused to sign up with the Cooks and Waiters Union. During the height of the dinner hour Monday evening all of the union labor employed in the place walked out and left it with only a half force of waiters and no cooks.

A number of local cement firms are taking a stand against the unionizing of their plants and are expected to be drawn into the fight.

TALE OF ALLEGED SLAVER IS TOLD

Man Accused of Bringing Disorderly Woman to Portland Is on Trial.

MRS. RENFRO IS AFFINITY

William E. Dunlap Testifies That She Left Husband in Denver.

Prisoner Is Restaurant Employee and Gambler.

William E. Dunlap, restaurant employee, gambler and alleged violator of the white-slave law, was placed on trial before a jury in the Federal Court yesterday for the alleged transportation of Mrs. Anna Renfro from Los Angeles to Portland for illicit purposes.

In his cross-examination by Deputy United States District Attorney Maguire, Dunlap said that after arriving in Portland, the woman gave him her money to keep. He told of numerous expenditures he made, and said he had only \$14 when he came to Portland. During the three weeks before his arrest in February he did not work, he said.

Husband Left for Him.

He was questioned about his first acquaintance with the woman, and said he met her in Denver, where she separated from her husband. They went from there to Cheyenne, Wyo., he said, thence to Hot Springs, thence to Salt Lake City, and thence to Los Angeles. There they remained for three months.

Asked regarding diamonds he purchased in Salt Lake City, he said he obtained some of the money gambling at the ball games. He said also that he and Mrs. Renfro conducted a rooming-house.

Earl Busse and J. A. Winn, Los Angeles policemen, arrived on the Shasta Limited yesterday afternoon, and hastened at once to the Courtroom.

Woman's Record Bad.

They testified that the woman was arrested several times in Los Angeles, where she was known as Mrs. Dunlap. Dunlap worked at McCormick's poolroom, they said, and either McCormick or Dunlap, called "Mrs. Dunlap" out of jail.

Dunlap tried to make it appear to the jury that he was solicited by Mrs. Renfro to conduct himself properly, and that it was only upon her promise to do so that he consented to purchase tickets for them to come to Portland. He said he intended to obtain a divorce for her.

LIQUOR SELLING IS CHARGED

Trio Arrested as Dealers in Intoxicants to Redmen.

Jim George, Ed. Williams and Doc Jones, charged with selling liquor to Indians, were arrested and brought to Portland yesterday from Klamath Falls by Deputy United States Marshal Hammett. George was released on \$200 bail, Williams on \$250 and Jones on \$100.

O. T. Anderson was arrested by Deputy Hammett for the alleged purchase of Government land allotted to the Indians, contrary to law. He was released by the United States Commissioner at Klamath Falls on \$1500 bonds.

Ed. King and Max To Portland, bartenders, went out fishing and failed to extinguish their campfires. They were arrested on a charge of setting off fires in the Rogue River reserve and were released on \$100 bail each.

James Cline of Medford was arrested by Deputy Hammett for the alleged falsifying of an affidavit in filing upon land. He was released upon a \$1000 bond.

Lou Wilson and Joseph Jackson, John Cole and Lucy Prezoo and Jim Brick and Sarah Weeks, of Klamath Falls, were arrested on statutory charges. Their bonds were fixed at \$250 in each case, which they gave and were released.

Alleged Counterfeiter Arrives.

Lorenzo Ronaldi, alleged passer of counterfeit notes, was brought to Portland from Fresno, Cal., arriving yesterday. Deputy Marshal Durbin, of Los Angeles, brought him to Portland, arriving with him at 2:40 on the Shasta Limited. Ronaldi and Americus Martindale are alleged by the Federal grand jury to have passed a note of the Merchants & Metals National Bank of New York City on Ludie McCoy February 12.

BANKERS' VIEWS CHANGED

Pendleton Man Tells of Changing Attitude Toward Advertising.

BAILEY SET FREE

Indictment of Food Commissioner Held Invalid.

PROSECUTOR WILL APPEAL

Court Sustains Contention of Defense That Omission to Allego Chemical Tests Were Made Is Vital to Case.

J. W. Bailey, State Food Commissioner, was set free of the indictment against him yesterday by a verdict under instructions of the court. He was charged with failing to publish a monthly bulletin giving the results of the analytical tests made in his office. The verdict was ordered by the court on motion of John Manning, one of Bailey's attorneys, following a ruling of the court to have read a note of the indictment against Bailey was invalid, inasmuch as it failed to allege that any chemical analysis had been made in his office.

As soon as the court ruled that the indictment was technically invalid, Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald announced that he would appeal from the ruling of Judge Morrow to the State Supreme Court.

Deputy District Attorney Dennison, who was aiding in prosecuting the case, filed a motion with Judge Morrow late yesterday afternoon, asking for an order to rebuttal the case to the grand jury. The order probably will be acted upon today.

New Indictment Possible.

Should the court refuse to allow the case to go back to the grand jury, it is asserted by members of the District Attorney's office, Mr. Bailey may be indicted on a new charge, that of having failed to publish the bulletins since the original indictment was found against him.

That the indictment was not valid was set forth by Bailey's attorneys, John Manning and Samuel White, when an attempt was made to prove that analytical tests had been made in Bailey's office. To support their contention to this effect, the attorneys cited various cases of a similar nature, three of which were decisions of the Oregon Supreme Court.

Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald cited various authorities in support of his contention that the allegation in the indictment concerning the analytical tests would be immaterial. One of these was almost identical with the case at issue. It was decided by the Supreme Court of Arkansas.

The Arkansas case was that of the state against Moose, a County Clerk, who was indicted for failing to publish a result of his periodical accounting with another county official. The indictment failed to state that Moose had any accounting, and therefore it was charged that the indictment was invalid.

Court Decisions Conflict.

When the case was taken to the Arkansas Supreme Court, it was held that the allegation concerning the accounting was not necessary in the indictment. The case was so much like the case in which Mr. Bailey was involved that it seemed conclusive, but the ruling of the Oregon Supreme Court was in almost direct opposition, and the

court held with the Oregon court in preference to that of another state.

In ordering a directed verdict, Judge Morrow expressed regret that the case could not be tried on its merits, but he held that the prevailing rule of law was that Mr. Bailey had not been legally indicted, and it was necessary to bring the issue to an end.

If Judge Morrow orders the case back to the grand jury, it is expected that the grand jury will take the matter up without delay. If a second indictment is returned, the case will probably have to be tried by a jury other than the court calendar, and it will be several weeks before it can go to trial.

Courthouse Notes.

Alleging desertion, J. E. Brady sued Teena Brady for divorce yesterday. They were married in Washington, D. C., January 25, 1898.

A. P. Bateham filed a suit yesterday against the East Coast Fruit and Vegetable Company and some of the directors of the company, asking for a receiver on the grounds that he had not been paid \$483.94 due him for salary as general manager of the company since April 1, 1908. Bateham set forth in his complaint that he owns nearly half of the stock in the company, but that it is not in financial condition to meet its obligations, amounting to a total of about \$25,000.

It took Ella E. Gibbon 25 years to enter the divorce court to free herself of the curse she placed on a divorce complaint filed yesterday she has endured that time from John S. Gibbon. Since 1886, which was one year after her marriage to Gibbon, the plaintiff says she has suffered constant cruelty at his hands. It is stated in the complaint that Gibbon is a contractor, earning \$1000 a year, and that he possesses property valued at least \$10,000.

Martha J. Kaye sued John Kaye yesterday for divorce on the grounds of desertion. They were married at Cable, Wis., August 5, 1897.

H. G. Stiles filed suit yesterday against John T. Moe for \$3750 for injuries to his car, he claimed, by being run over by an automobile operated by Moe on Union avenue, at Russell street, March 3, 1911.

Harry J. Bassett charged with complicity in the killing of Mrs. Frances Roberts, September 15, in performing an illegal operation, went to trial yesterday in Judge McGinn's court.

Frank Kierma filed notice yesterday that he would appeal his case against the sale of the Broadway bridge bonds to the Shawmut National Bank of Boston, to the State Supreme Court.

Judge Gantenbein will decide today the case involving the contract for improving the Macadam Road with Haslam pavement. The case is interesting property owners throughout the city.

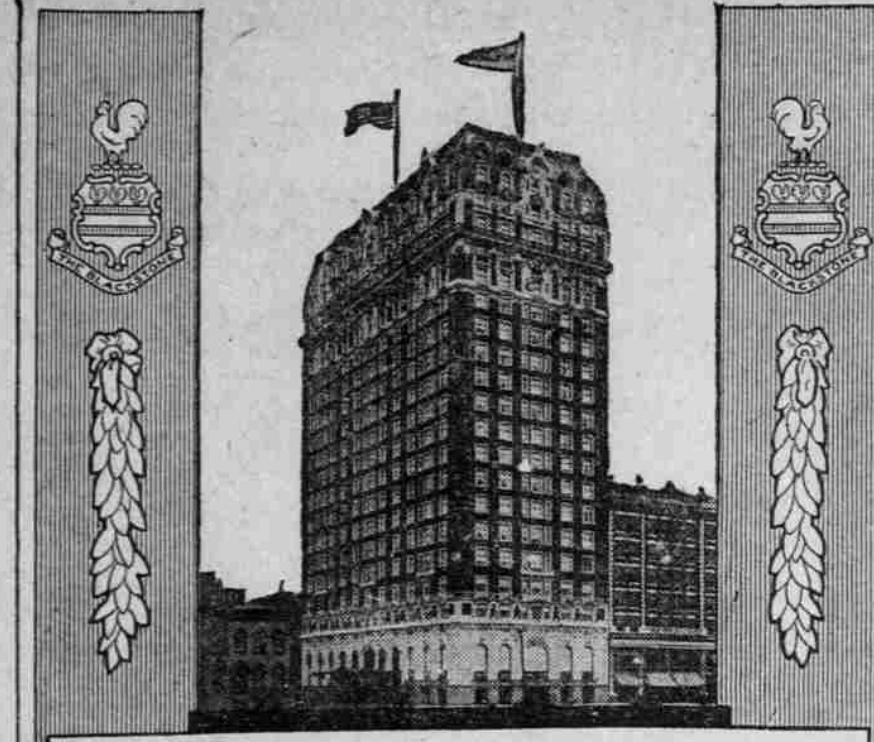
