

REBELS SUMMON JUAREZ TO YIELD

Madero's Army at Outskirts of City, Gives a Day's Warning of Attack.

ARMY IN MOOD FOR FIGHT

Garza Gets Passport to Carry Message About Peace to Madero, but Delays—Juarez Fortified in Readiness for Attack.

EL PASO, Tex., April 19.—A formal demand was made tonight upon General Juan Navarro for the surrender of Juarez to the insurrecto army of Francisco I. Madero within 24 hours. The demand reached General Navarro's headquarters while he was inspecting the fortifications for the city's defense. This was confirmed by Gonzales Garza, secretary-general for the insurrecto party, who said:

"Formal demands of the insurrectos for the surrender of Juarez within 24 hours has been made upon General Navarro, commanding the federal garrison of Juarez. The note was sent from El Paso by a messenger to American Consul Edwards in Juarez, to be transmitted by him to Navarro. No reply has been received."

Later it was learned that Consul Edwards delivered the note at Navarro's headquarters while the latter was on a tour of inspection. At 8 o'clock tonight General Navarro said:

"I have received no notice asking me to surrender. He turned on his heel and walked away."

"But, General, the insurrecto secretary says the demand has been made," he was told.

"I have received no such notice," he replied again, and walked away.

Rebels Surround Juarez.

An Associated Press representative left El Paso in an automobile this afternoon in an attempt to locate Madero and get the latest news of the proposals. He found the entire army had left Baucha and Sapello.

Garza declared, when asked about the troops.

"Everybody knows the insurrecto forces have Juarez surrounded. I do not know when they will attack. I have delivered the messages from Dr. Gomez to Mr. Madero, but I have no orders from Gomez to Madero to cease fighting."

"Madero himself is the only man who can give orders to stop the fighting. He is somewhere in the vicinity of Juarez."

At Bancho the Associated Press man found twelve insurrectos guarding a train of 20 cars, with a locomotive, steam up, ready to depart if necessary. The insurrectos said the entire rebel army had passed north and was in the ravines and mountains west and southwest of Juarez, between that point and the border city. Baucha is only 12 miles out from Juarez.

Rebels Keyed Up to Fight.

Secretary Garza received passports in the course of the day, he said tonight, permitting him to cross the line to visit Francisco I. Madero and lay before him the plans of Mr. Gomez at Washington, for an armistice to discuss peace terms. Garza declared at 3 o'clock that he probably would not go as he did not know exactly where Madero was and the insurrectos were keyed up to fighting pitch.

The town is now fortified inside and out with masked batteries commanding its approaches. On top of the priests' house, adjoining the old mission in the center of the city, is a mortar that will sweep the main street. Across the railroad yards, which were cleared today of bonanza and locomotive, timber fortifications have been built. Leopoldes have been out in the walls of Cowboy Park, commanding several streets.

REBELS TAKE ZACATECAS TOWN

They Make Band Play, Loot Treasury and March Away.

EL PASO, Tex., April 19.—News to the Herald from Guadalupe tells of considerable insurrecto activity in the state of Zacatecas. In Fresnillo the rebels entered the town and released all the prisoners in the jail. Several federal and insurrecto were killed.

At Nocheblanco the insurrectos took the place without opposition, and ordered the musicians of the place to play an all-day concert. Refugio Elizalde, jefe politico of the town, wired to Governor Zarate for aid when he heard the rebels were approaching, but the Governor had no troops, and sent only arms and ammunition. The jefe could secure no volunteers, and shipped back the arms to keep them out of the rebels' hands. The rebels took \$200 in cash from the municipal treasury.

After occupying the town a day, the federals came, and there was a battle in which both sides lost, and the insurrectos left, declaring they had no desire to hold the town, as it had no more funds nor any arms.

At San Luis Potosi the children, under the direction of Rev. Father Eulasio Puente, held prayer service for peace on Sunday, praying for the Virgin Guadalupe to free them from strife.

REBEL FORCE IS WIPED OUT

Under American Chief It Fights Two Days in Durango.

TUCSON, Ariz., April 19.—A special from Mazatlan, Sinaloa, Mex., says: "Mail advices from the state of Durango, say that in a sanguinary battle between a force of rebels under command of an American, William Collins, and national troops, which raged for two days, 49 rebels, including Captain Collins, were killed, and 150 wounded."

Ramon Turbe, another rebel commander, escaped by disguising himself as a woman.

The government troops greatly outnumbered the insurrectos, most of whom were either killed or captured, according to the reports which come from government sources. The federal casualties are not known.

The national force engaged was the Seventh Battalion, Mexican National Guard, augmented by rurales.

CAVALRY PATROL STRONGER

Americans at Douglas Reinforced and More Cavalry Going.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., April 19.—American cavalry is now strung out along the border four miles east and four miles west of Douglas. The troops to the

west are to keep under inspection territory for a distance of several miles beyond the point to which their patrol extends.

These orders have been issued by Colonel F. W. Sibley, Fourteenth Cavalry, now commanding officer here. Two of the six troops are constantly kept on patrol, the four being held in reserve.

Colonel Sibley was notified today that the Sixth Cavalry had entrained at Des Moines for the border, the first squadron will be stationed in Douglas; the second at Nogales, and the third at Fort Huachuca. Colonel Charles O'Connor, commander of the Sixth, will probably relieve Colonel Sibley, who is under orders to join his regiment in the Philippines.

Robert Harrington, the American switchman killed by a stray bullet Thursday, was buried today. The authorities were unable to get trace of his relatives.

Pedro Garcia y Uriguiz, secretary to the Mexican Consul here, and G. G. LeBlanc, editor of El Industrial, a Spanish pro rebel newspaper published here, engaged in a bloody fist fight on the streets during the morning. They were taken in custody by the city civil authorities.

FEDERALS FOLLOW UP REBELS

They March Out to Attack Cabral, Who Nears Agua Prieta.

AGUA PRIETA, Mex., April 19.—(Via Douglas).—A detachment of 275 federals, 238 infantry and 40 mounted, left Agua late today, under orders, it is believed, to attack Juan Cabral's band, reported to be south of Naco and preparing to attack the city. The federal column marched directly west of the city.

The fear of a renewal of insurrecto efforts to capture Agua Prieta, a city still in the hands of the rebels, led to the decision to send forward a larger force.

That the rebels have not moved far from the town was indicated this morning when a small band of them broke through the federal lines and set fire to the Nacostril Railroad station, which was destroyed together with three cars loaded with provisions, miscellaneous supplies and machinery. In the ensuing skirmish several were killed.

Colonel Diaz, commanding the federal garrison, has issued an order permitting the resumption of trade relations between this city and Douglas.

Owen Savage, a member of Troop K, First United States Cavalry, is a prisoner in the bull ring. His eagerness to get into the fight was too great for his loyalty, and he deserted, taking with him an Army pistol, to fight with the rebels. Tied and roped, he was brought today before American Consul Dye, of Nogales, together with Tim K. Sullivan, an American from Bridgport, Conn., the Consul having requested to see them.

The federals had kept Sullivan for several hours so tied with knots down or stand up. Sullivan saw service with the Boers in Africa. Savage asked the Consul not to inform his family of his fate.

REBEL ARMY MARCHING NORTH

Madero With 1940 Men Will Soon Attack Juarez.

INSURRECTO CAMP, Town of Madera, Chihuahua, Mexico, April 19.—Francisco I. Madero, Jr., is marching on the City of Juarez at the head of 1940 insurrectos, divided into five columns, one under the direct command of Madero and the others under the rebel generals Orenco, Blanco, Villa and Salazar.

Abraham Gonzales, as called Provincial Governor of Chihuahua, received a report from the insurrecto chief today reporting 25 federals killed in a brush between the advance guard of the forces moving on Juarez and a detail of troops sent south by General Navarro in Juarez. At Baucha, on Sunday, seven of the 160 insurrectos were killed, it is reported here.

Francisco I. Madero, Sr., heading a peace mission, spent last night here, the delegation proceeding north this morning, hoping to reach the younger Madero Thursday. A gap of 75 miles in the railroad will be covered on horses.

REBEL BAND HARD PRESSED

It Commits Depredations in One Town Flees From Another.

TOLUCA, Mex., April 19.—Hard pressed by General Leyva's troops in Morelos, a band of 300 rebels yesterday crossed into this state and today four detachments of troops, numbering about 400, are attempting to surround them in the hills near Santiago Tianguistengo.

The rebels yesterday entered Jalisco, where for some hours they burned public records and committed other depredations. Leaving the town they started for Santiago Tianguistengo, but learning that volunteers were garrisoned there, they changed their course and spent last night in the hills.

The company of volunteers from Santiago Tianguistengo, another band of volunteers from Ixtahuaca, a detachment of troops from Toluca and Metepec, a company of infantry and a company of cavalry were sent today to engage the rebels.

ZION'S SAINTS ARE SPILT BY FACTIONS

Close Election Is Marked by All Methods of Unregenerate World.

BATTLE FOUGHT AT POLLS

Independent Elected Mayor, but Voliva Will Contest—Stealing of Ballots Charged and Voters' Lives Menaced.

ZION CITY, Ill., April 19.—(Special).—The uttermost strenuous yesterday's municipal and Aldermanic elections has not yet passed over. Today both sides set the necessary machinery in motion to contest the election.

The Independents, or the party opposed to Mayor Glenn Voliva, the predecessor to John Alexander Dowle, allege that between 10 and 40 ballots were stolen election night. After the first count it appeared that the independent candidate for Mayor, J. H. Goudie, had won over the Voliva candidate, W. Hurd Clendenin.

The Independents immediately started a celebration and, while the merry-making was at its height, the Voliva followers, it is charged, stole a number of ballots.

On the other hand, Voliva will contest election of the board that 36 of his followers, some of them old residents of the city, were challenged, refused the right to vote and thrown bodily from the polls. Voliva also declares he will cause the criminal prosecution of two election judges.

Recount May Change Result.

As the count now stands, Clendenin has been elected Mayor by a plurality of five votes, but what a recount will bring forth no one is prepared to say, as the ballot box is locked up in a vault of the First National Bank. The alleged disappearance of the package of ballots was discovered when the count showed that the actual number of ballots was about 40 less than the number of names registered by the clerks of the election.

Voliva declared tonight that the election was the rottenest ever held anywhere in the country and that his opponents resorted to the lowest and most contemptible tricks of the trade.

The election yesterday gave the little town more excitement than it has seen since the late John Alexander Dowle was mayor. Dowle was a prominent member of the Christian Catholic Church. Over 200 policemen were on duty and a big force of deputies was also on the ground. The election was held at the city seat. At no time during the day was the election a tame affair, the presence of the police being constantly required at the polling places.

Factions Battle at Polls.

The climax of the day came when a body of Independents attempted to break into the ballot box, and the Voliva followers put up a stiff fight, but the Independents with the help of several deputy sheriffs drove the Voliva followers out of the box. The missing ballots were not found. The polling places were then searched without results. Finally as the election was about to close, a crowd of the local bank and locked up for safekeeping.

An attack is said to have been made by police upon an epileptic who was waiting to cast his vote. The man was seized with a fist later. The officers were arrested in connection with the attack.

Hanley Threatened With Judge.

John Hanley, an independent election judge and an especial target for the Voliva followers, was guarded by 25 men while he slept last night. There had been numerous threats against his life and detectives employed by the anti-Voliva crowd stated the story that, if Voliva's men did not win, it would not be safe for Hanley to tarry in the vicinity.

Who the actual situation is still in doubt, Voliva's candidate for city clerk was given a tie vote and he succeeded in putting three out of five aldermen across.

to enter a nolle prosequi as to this case.

The announcement found the packed courtroom unprepared for its purpose. Judge Bash quickly accepted it and discharged the jury. Kettbach, the defendant, smiled with happiness as he received the congratulations of his counsel and friends in the courtroom.

The defense had said prior to the motion that it would make a statement to the jury, but the statement was not made. It is said that it would introduce evidence to unfold an alleged plot on the part of the Government agents acting concertedly with the Voliva followers, and Chapman to send the defendant to the Federal penitentiary and permit the three men responsible for the heavy shortage, Chapman, Robnett and Pickering, to go free, the condition being that if they joined with the Government they would be offered immunity.

"I would have had to charter a special car to take my witnesses back home had the case continued," said Kettbach tonight. "I expected to use their testimony to impeach Government witnesses who testified about one occasion said to have been held with me."

GIRLS NOT SAFE ALONE

Miss Gage Tells Y. W. C. A. of Needed Protection on Streets.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 19.—Asking the delegates to the Young Women's Christian Association of America, in an address today, if they believed "girls could walk with security, without a walk with Pickering, in the streets of our towns," Miss Frances C. Gage of Seattle, Wash., secretary of the Northwestern Territorial Commission, answered her own question in the negative.

She added that the duty of the membership of the association had been made plain to the women of America.

and outlining the preliminary peace negotiations in which he had engaged, had been received by General Madero, but that confusion as to the code used



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had made it impossible for the rebel leader to read it.

A messenger, therefore, according to advice here, was dispatched from El Paso, Tex. He will pass through federal lines without molestation and will explain to General Madero not only the initial messages concerning peace proposals, but the fact that Dr. Gomez is awaiting orders for the armistice agreement.

The armistice idea was suggested simultaneously to the Mexican government and to the head of the revolutionists here by a friend of both sides, and thus far the Mexican government and Dr. Gomez have been in communication only through a third party.

It is believed that, with the approval of the Mexican government, reported from Mexico City last night, and the favorable attitude of the revolutionist agency here, direct communication will be instituted as soon as Dr. Gomez receives instructions from his chief.

BORDER TO BE PEACEABLE

Mexico Sending Assurances That Lives Will Not Be in Danger.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Development today indicated to President Taft that peace in Mexico may not be a dream and there is reason to believe the Mexican authorities will adopt a "definite, restrictive policy along the border" to prevent conflicts.

Senator Manuel De Zamacoa, the New Mexican ambassador, was presented to President and declarations of friendship were exchanged. Information was given out at the White House that the rough draft of Mexico's formal note to the State Department's demand that American border towns be not endangered by Mexican battles has been placed in the hands of Ambassador Wilson at Mexico City.

Mr. Wilson reported that the note as drafted was satisfactory, and it is expected to reach the State Department in final form soon.

A sub-committee of the House committee on foreign affairs tomorrow will confer with the President and Secretary Knox on the Mexican situation.

Delegate Ralph Cameron, of Arizona, said he had received a letter from a business man at Douglas, saying Mexican, both federal and insurrecto, who were wounded at Agua Prieta, were "be-

ing put to death" by the victors. The Red Cross has no confirmation of this report.

In a speech to the President, Senator Zamacoa said peace would be declared in Mexico soon. The President, in a few words, said he was glad to hear that. He assured the new Ambassador that this government was not crouching on the border ready to spring upon Mexico. His telegram to Governor Sloan, of Arizona, the President said, explained his attitude.

Mexico Compensates Conductor.

GUADALAJARA, Mexico, April 19.—James A. Cook, the American conductor arrested some time ago as an accomplice in the robbery of freight cars on the National Railway near here, has just received a check for \$1556 as compensation for the time he was in prison. This is his salary from the railroad for the time he was locked up. The Order of Railway Conductors adjusted the matter.

Wilson's Election Reform Wins.

TRENTON, N. J., April 19.—Governor Woodrow Wilson won a hard-fought victory today when the House of Representatives passed the bill providing for radical reform in election methods in New Jersey.
