

The second baseman does not get the signal, so when the pitcher turns to throw the ball to second he finds the basemen off their guard, and decides not to throw. The umpire calls a balk and gives the runner third base. Is that right?

Answer: No. 1-A wins. No. 2-It is at the discretion of the umpire according to his interpretation of the rules of "balking." They are as follows: Rule 34, section 1, any motion made by the pitcher while in position to de-liver the ball to the bat without delivering it, or to throw to first base when occupied by a base runner without completing the throw; section 2, throwing by the pitcher to any base to catch the base runner without stepping directly toward such base in the act of making the throw.
