

LOS ANGELES WILL
SEEK EARLY TRIALBut Accused Dynamiters'
Lawyers Will Fight for
Change of Venue.

THEY REACH CITY TODAY

Hilton Says Three Men Were Kid-
naped, Frederick Says Removal
Is Legal—Mrs. Ingersoll
Hidden by Prosecution

LOS ANGELES, April 25.—John T. McNamara, secretary of the International Bridge and Structural Iron Workers' Association, and his alleged confederates, James McNamara and Orville McManigal, are expected to arrive here tomorrow to face the charge that they dynamited the Los Angeles Times newspaper plant and killed 21 men last October, while engaged in a conspiracy of wholesale destruction.

Attorney G. M. Hilton, of Denver, arrived at noon from his winter home at Pomona, Cal., to look over the situation from the viewpoint of the labor union. Mr. Hilton took part in the defense of Steve Adams at Grand Junction, Colo., two years ago, and labor leaders say it is practically certain he will be added to the list of counsel for the defense. He has been sent here by the Western Federation of Miners.

District Attorney Fredericks said that the men would be permitted to see their attorneys directly upon their arrival. Then would follow an arraignment in the Superior Court and the trial as soon as possible after that, probably before Presiding Judge Walter Bordwell. Mr. Fredericks said he was ready to go to trial immediately, but would wait for the convenience of the defense.

Change of Venue to Be Asked.

According to Attorney Hilton, a motion for a change of venue is likely, and the first desperate fight in court may be waged upon this point. It will be alleged that Los Angeles is prejudiced against the accused men.

"This will be the most Titanic struggle between capital and labor in the history of the courts," said Mr. Hilton. "All this mystery," he declared, "all this chaining of prisoners, kidnapping and finding of dynamite plants has but one object—the inflaming of public opinion, so that it will be impossible to obtain an unbiased jury."

"These drastic effects have been achieved by the detectives as a part of the plan to secure the legal slaying of innocent men. It was the same in the case of Mayer, Haywood and Pettibone, and it was the same when they tried to slay Steve Adams at Grand Junction."

"I ask the public to withhold judgment until the facts are before the court. Even then the people must be sure that such facts are facts. The huge rewards in this case made it impossible for the man-hunters to give up the search before they found a quarry. The same thing was done in the case of Adams. The detective there not only produced the body of the non-union victim of murder, but they brought into court the revolver with which the deed was done. Then at the end of it all, one of the detectives confessed that the body had been 'planted' by themselves and Adams was acquitted."

No Kidnaping, Says Fredericks.

The District Attorney declared that the alleged kidnaping of the accused ironworkers' official was not illegal, and was the usual method of procuring prisoners from another state without the delay that might be created "by pettifoggish lawyers."

Mr. Fredericks further stated that he anticipated few preliminary legal bouts on technical points. "The prisoners undoubtedly will have competent counsel, and real lawyers realize that technicalities only procure small delays," he said. "Therefore I think they will leave technicalities alone and get right down to the business of trying the case before a jury."

Union officials without exception asserted today that they intended to stand by the men charged with the dynamiting until they are proved guilty.

Unions Stand by Accused.

J. E. Timmons, of Indianapolis, sent here as resident representative of the International Association of Bridge & Structural Iron Workers, of which John J. McNamara is secretary, declared that it was the duty of union men to stand by their comrades until it is absolutely certain that they are guilty. A similar position was taken by Godfrey Dawson, of Cincinnati, resident representative of the Patternmakers' League of North America, affiliated with the Metal Trades Council. The two men constitute a press committee appointed by the Metal Trades Council and are the only persons at present authorized by that organization to make statements to the public.

Apparently to avoid being interviewed and at the instance of the prosecuting attorney, Mrs. D. H. Ingersoll, of San Francisco, who is said to be able to identify John J. McNamara as J. B. Bryce, who lived in her San Francisco establishment, changed her hotel shortly after her arrival here today and is lost from the public view.

play" on the part of labor organizations.

Five witnesses were examined by the grand jury today. Superintendent of Police Hyland and Captain of Detectives Hollis were the first summoned, and it is intimated that the grand jury purposes to leave it to the police officials and Police Judge Collins to exercise their authority in the part they took in the arrest and extradition of McNamara. It is said evidence will be produced to show that the two police officials had no jurisdiction in the case and that the requisition for McNamara honored by Governor Marshall should have been served by the Sheriff of Marion County. Attorneys for labor leaders say the extradition case should have gone before a judge of the Circuit Court, instead of being heard before Police Judge Collins.

Girl May Tell Secrets.

Attorney W. C. Appleman was the next witness called, probably to learn the whereabouts of a Miss Mary C. Dye, formerly private secretary for McNamara. According to the attorney, the girl is being held in the payment of a legal claim of \$200 against McNamara, told Appleman that she had important information about McNamara and the iron workers' organization which he

Graff has said he gave McNamara permission to construct the compartment in the basement in which the dynamite was found last Saturday night.

UNIONS MAY AID
Portland Labor Bodies Likely
to Raise Defense Fund.COUNCIL TO MEET SOON
Organized Workmen Not Inclined to
Express Opinions on Alleged
Dynamiters—Some Believe
Arrests Are Unjust.

It is probable that union men and sympathizers in Portland will contribute toward a defense fund for J. J. McNamara, international secretary of the Structural Ironworkers, J. W. McNamara and Orville McManigal, who are being charged with murder for the alleged dynamiting of the Times building.

The Central Labor Council of Portland will meet Friday night and at that time ways and means of contributing to the defense fund will be discussed, said D. W. Robinson, secretary of the Central Labor Council. The method of raising money may take the form of assessment on union men or it may be decided to call a mass meeting to interest the public generally.

Will H. Daly, president of Oregon Federation of Labor, said that the executive committee of that organization will meet in Portland Wednesday night, but he declined to discuss the probable action to be taken in the way of raising money for the defense of the McNamaras and McManigal.

Local union men generally are not inclined, with the exception of Mr. Robinson, to express their opinions as to the guilt or innocence of the men accused. All are a unit, however, in declaring that if the men are guilty no reflection should be allowed to rest on organized labor, arguing that union leaders discourage violence for the reason that they are aware it will react on their organizations.

The arrest of these men is merely a sequel to the Moyer-Haywood-Pettibone affair in Idaho a few years ago," declared Mr. Robinson. "Big rewards were offered for the conviction of the men guilty of the alleged dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building. The money attracted detectives who would sell their own mother for a five-cent piece."

"It might also be well to remember that Harry Orchard, who confessed a revolting series of crimes, has not been hanged. I am personally acquainted with J. J. McNamara. I know him to be a more than ordinarily conservative man and I sincerely believe in his innocence. Labor leaders do not and never did countenance violence. It would be the height of folly for them to do so."

J. F. Cassidy, secretary and business agent of the Portland branch of the Structural Ironworkers' Union, believes that the evidence against J. W. McNamara, J. J. McNamara and Orville McManigal was manufactured. He declares that J. W. McNamara is not the type of man who would undertake dynamiting.

DEBATE OPENED
ON FREE LIST BILLUnderwood Says It Will Help
Farmers and Reduce Cost
of Living to All.

MANN FINDS MANY FLAWS

Harvester Trust's Implements Made
by Pauper Labor in Europe May
Compete With Americans.
Dates of South Spared.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The Democratic free list bill, characterized by the Republicans as "political soothing syrup," was roughly handled in the House this afternoon by the Republican side.

Underwood, Democratic chairman of the ways and means committee, introduced it in an hour's speech shortly after the session convened at noon. It is now left to the members of Mann, leader of the Republican side, and what Mann said about it in the two hours he held the floor gave both sides a foot for much debate, comment and criticism.

Underwood, in explaining the proposed measure, acknowledged that it would mean a reduction in Government revenue by at least \$10,000,000 a year, but declared that this would be more than met by Government economies.

Aim to Help Farmers.

"This free list bill is not offered as a compensation to the farmer for products of his that were put on the free list in the reciprocity bill," said Underwood, "because we do not believe the passage of the reciprocity bill will in any way affect the farmers' income. One of the objects of this bill is to remove from the protected list those implements that the farmer uses in producing his crops. The other purpose is to reduce the cost of living to the masses by putting their food products on the free list."

Underwood announced that this was only the beginning of the Democratic revision of the tariff. "We purpose to revise the tariff schedule by schedule," he said. "That, in our opinion, is the only proper way to handle the tariff question in Congress. The Democratic party does not stand for the wiping out of the customs-house, we realize the expenses of government must be borne by a judicious system of duties. But by lowering and adjusting prohibitive duties we can fully maintain the amount of customs revenues."

Underwood charged the Republicans with making the Payne tariff law so that it left a tariff tax on everything that the farmer used, while reducing many of his protective duties.

Politics, Says Minority.

The minority report, signed by all of the Republicans on the ways and means committee, declares that the measure represents a "transparent attempt at the manufacture of political capital." It asserts that Congress was called together specifically to pass the Canadian reciprocity bill.

"The interests of the farmer and of everybody else will be subserved," says the report. "If the country is spared further exploitation and further tariff legislation at the present time and if adjustment is taken promptly after the reciprocity bill shall have been finally acted on."

Mann said the free-list bill, introduced by the Democrats as the first of their tariff measures, was drawn inaccurately, indefinitely and with such general language that it might be stretched to include almost half the imports on which the United States now collects tariff.

The free-list bill puts agricultural implements "of any kind and description" on the free list. Mann demanded to know what agricultural implements would come under the provision. He expressed the belief it could be stretched to include the free entry of saws, axes, forks, garden hose, hay knives and almost everything else that a farmer, horticulturist, gardener or tiller of the soil uses.

He said the bill was so drawn that it would admit free the leather from which the farmers' shoes were made, but would exclude that from which his life's shoes were made. It put a premium on foreign labor, he said, by permitting these special kinds of leather to come in free when they were partly made up.

In putting agricultural implements on the free list, said Mann, the Democrats would let the International Harvester company dump into the United States the implements it made with foreign labor in France, Germany and Russia. Chairman Underwood and other Democrats did not attempt a reply to the attack upon the bill.

South Handled Tenderly.

Gardner of Massachusetts attacked the measure and the Democratic policy of promising to "reduce the cost of living without reducing wages paid in the United States." He asserted that, in putting articles on the free list, the Democrats had discriminated against the farmers and manufacturers of the Northern states, while leaving protective duties on tobacco, sugar, rice, oranges and other articles produced in the Southern states.

Adair of Indiana, Russell of Missouri and Adamson of Georgia spoke in favor of the bill. Adamson said after Mann's attack upon the bill he had gone to Underwood to see if he intended to call a Democratic caucus and fix up the measure, but that Underwood had assured him the bill was all right.

HARMON BOOM LAUNCHED
Senator Pomerene Names Committee
to Boost Governor for President.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The Presidential boom for Governor Harmon of Ohio was formally organized today when Senator Pomerene announced the personal of the committee on ways and means to support Harmon's candidacy for the Democratic nomination in 1912.

The former committee is headed by Representative Cox, while Representative Deener is chairman of the resolutions committee. Other members of the Ohio delegation in Congress complete the personnel of the two committees.

CHICAGO, April 25.—An Italian murder trial which has been full of dramatic situations during the four days it has been in session came to a sudden halt today, when, simultaneously with an impassioned vow of vengeance on the part of the victim's daughter and the discovery that one of the jurors was an ex-convict, the jury was dismissed.

Jennie Gambino, daughter of the man killed, who was a witness to the shooting, accused the criminal court when she took the witness-stand. Without waiting to be questioned she shouted at Salvatore Martino, the defendant: "You killed a father of eight children. I, his daughter, will avenge him with blood. Your own life will be taken in payment."

The prosecutor then announced he had leaped one of the jurors and been a convict and the dismissal of the jury was granted.

This trial was halted previously by an explosion of gunpowder in a cuspidor in the courtroom.

SORE SPOT IS SPARED
CORONATION PAGEANT OMITTED
LEST AMERICA OBJECT.

Canada Induced to Abandon Representation of Her Victory in War of 1812.

LONDON, April 25.—It was learned today that it was in consequence of communications between London and Washington and hints to the Canadian committee, of which Lord Strathcona is president, that a decision was reached to eliminate from the coronation programme Canada's principal contribution to the pageantry, "Festival of Empire."

The piece, which has been in course of preparation at the Crystal Palace and which called for 300 performers, is entitled "Chateau Gay," where Canada was held for the "Empire," and was intended to represent the defeat through strategy of the invading American force in 1812 by a handful of Canadians.

After consideration it was thought that the pageant might wound the susceptibilities of American visitors to the coronation and might endanger the conclusion of the proposed Anglo-American arbitration treaty.
