SAN FRANCISCO, April 28. - (Special.)-A permanent organization, to be known as the Industrial Feace Asso-station of the Pacific Coast, with branches to be established in all the principal cities of the Pacific Coast States and British Columbia, was perfacted last night at an executive se of delegates to the Industrial Peace Convention at the Bellevue Hotel. Rabbi Jacob Nieto, president of the

Convention at the Bellevue Hotel. Rabbi Jacob Nieto, president of the San Francisco branch, was unanimous-ly chosen president, with the follow-ing elected vice-presidents: Rev. A. J. Brice, British Columbia: Father J. E. O'Brien, Seattle, and Rev. Benjamin Young, of Portland. The opening session of the initial conveption of the Industrial Peace As-sociation was held in the Y. M. C. A. building, with Rabbi Jacob Nieto pre-aiding and with delegates from every part of the Pacific Coast in attend-ance. In welcoming the delegates to San Francisco Mayor McCariby ex-pressed the hope that "the association will gever have occasion to meet in a city that needs your assistance less than does San Francisco." He told of "the peaceful industrial conditions that have prevailed in San Francisco since April, 1905," and prom-ised to assist the association in its work and concluded by saving: "I am glad that the initial convention of this association has been held in a city whose people have demonstrated that they can maintain peace."


Negative, Wins in Debate.


