YNCH RUSHES TO PROTECT UMPIRE

Tacoma Manager Drives Back Mob of Angry Fans Attacking Shackleford.

FIRE OF CUSHIONS RAPID

Baseball Official Has to Retreat to Escape Missiles-Throng Charges on Him at Close, but He Is Finally Rescued.

TACOMA, Wash., April 30 .- (Special.)-Infuriated fans came near mobbing Umpire Shackleford this afternoon in the ninth inning of the game between Vancouver and Tacoma. The umpire was doing well, but in a couple of close decisions he aroused the ire of the "bugs" and they started hurling cushions. Had it not been for the presence of mind of Mike Lynch, manager of the Tacoma club, Shackleford might have been seriously injured, as the mob swarmed down the field and started to do personal vio-

lence to the indicator-handler. The trouble started in the eighth inning, when Abbott was called out on thrown strikes. He was hit by a slow ball and Shackleford refused to allow

him to take his base.

The crowd hooted and started throwing cushions. By the time the Vancouver players had started to bat, there couver players had started to bat, there were a dozen cushions in the field. Shackleford stopped the game. Quiet was restored through the pleadings of Lynch and Rockenfield, and the game

In the ninth inning Shackleford was again a target, and in the middle of the last haif of the inning the field was again dotted with the cushions. The game was stopped and the umpire started to talk to the fauatic bleacherites. He was met with a cloud of cushions and driven to run to the center of the field to get out of range.

When the last man was put out, the mob swarmed out of the bleachers and, although Shackleford made a run for the visiting players' bench, he was soon surrounded by angry fans, who threw more cushions and pulled and shoved the frightened umpire. Several blows were strucks when Mike Lynch rushed out of the grandstand. He and Charlie Swain, of the Vancouver club, came to the assistance of the umpire, and Swain used a bat to good advantage.

There was a sharp fight City Detective Brady got into the fray and the "bugs" were finally driven back. Shack-leford managed to get into the box office, where he was forced to remain for an hour after the game, under the protec-

hour after the game, under the protection of a detective.

"The fans had no kick coming and I don't understand their action," said President Shreeder. "Shackleford made a couple of bad guesses, but there was no cause for such a demonstration. I will see there is more police protection in the future. The fans were incensed because of the action regarding the Lynch case, but they had no reason for today's demonstration except personal malice. I greatly regret the occurrence and will see that it is not repeated."

The only Tacoma player that rendered assistance was Charlie Schmutz.

Mike Lynch had been in the grand-stand back of the Tacoma bench. About this time he showed up on the field.

"Get back!" said Lynch to the crowd, and pusheds his way in to the umpire.
