# AIRSHIP WRECKED TRIAL FLIGHT

Aviator Walsh Has Narrow Escape From Death at Twelve-Mile Park.

#### WIND PROVES UNRELIABLE

Attempt to Turn in Teeth of Breeze Renders Steering Gear Useless and Aeronaut Takes Chance With an Orchard.

One thousand wildly excited people saw a Curtis aeroplane, driven by Edward Walsh, wobble like a wounded bird at a height of 75 feet at Twelve-Mile Park Sunday afternoon and go crashing downward like a catapult into the topmost branches of an apple tree. The airship was badly wrecked, but Aviator Walsh fortunately escaped infury.

The accident occurred less than a mile south of the race course, when Walsh, on his second start attempted to turn with the wind and found himself helpless in the teeth of a treacherous gust from the west. With steering gear useless and with fences and forests ahead offering no signs of relief, the daring aviator determined to take his chances with the ground, and down he plunked into an open apot on the plunked into an open spot on the mmit of a small knoll.

#### Machine Bounces Like Ball.

The aeroplane hit the ground all right, but bounced off like a rubber ball, crashing down the declivity through a picket fence at a 20-mile gait and into an orchard. Osman, owner of the orchard, whose home was less than 50 feet from the scene of the near-fatality.

The wind was puffy and the machine refused to respond," said Walsh, after his jarring experience. "The framework of the aeropiane was badly smashed and the wings torn to shreds, but I don't think the actual damage will exceed \$50. Mr. Manning has eaked me to make another flight tomorrow and I expect to do so, either with this machine, if it can be repaired in time, or with my other. The engine is intact."

#### Walsh's Drop Comes Suddenly.

Nearly 100 automobiles lined the roadway when Walsh essayed his first trip down the speedway at 2:15. He skimmed closely along the ground for a half mile, testing his engine, and the machine was then brought back for the final flight through the heavens. By 2:05, when he waved to his helper to "Let 'er go," the number of suice along the route had trebled, and breathless expectancy followed the gradual rise into the atmosphere.


