CHICAGO, May S.—Fear of drouth damage counterbalanced to fay with wheat speculators an idea that the Government report would prove decidedly bearish. As a matter of fact, the document turned out less discouraging to the builts than had been expected, but the result was not known until after Board of Trade hours. 


