SAN FRANCISCO, May 9.—(Special)—Playing San Francisco for the first time this season, with Henley in the box after a full week's rest, Walter McGrede today saw Benny Henderson, one of his twisters, indignantly batted out of the box, and then withdrew in silent agony while the Seals went along gathering in more runs off Fullerton.

Henley was just enough trouble all the way to keep the game interesting, but until Tommy Tennant started the eighth by dropping a throw across the diamond, the San Francisco right-hander was not scored on. 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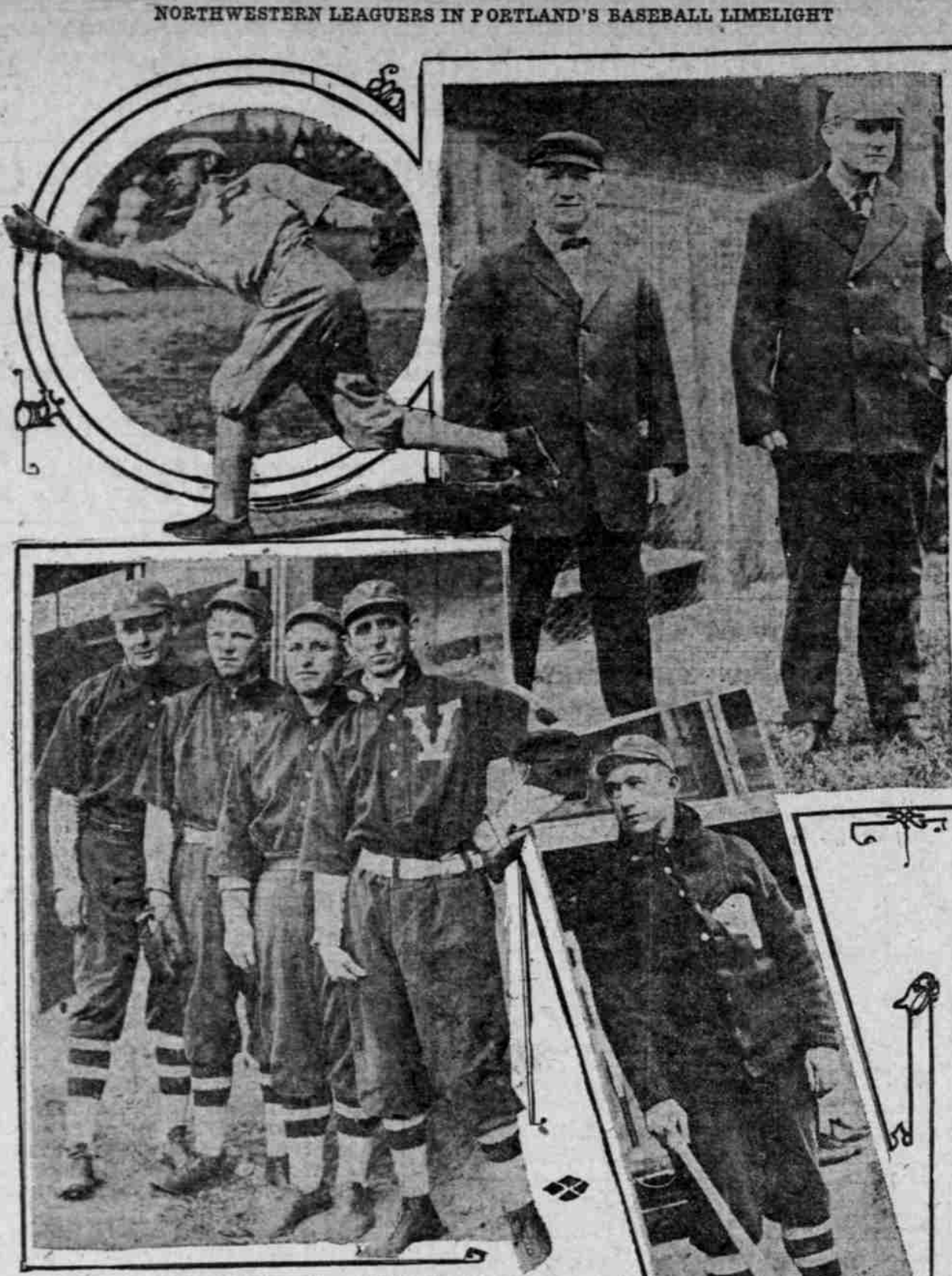

Rusie was with Cincinnati for a few weeks in 1900 and then retired from the game.

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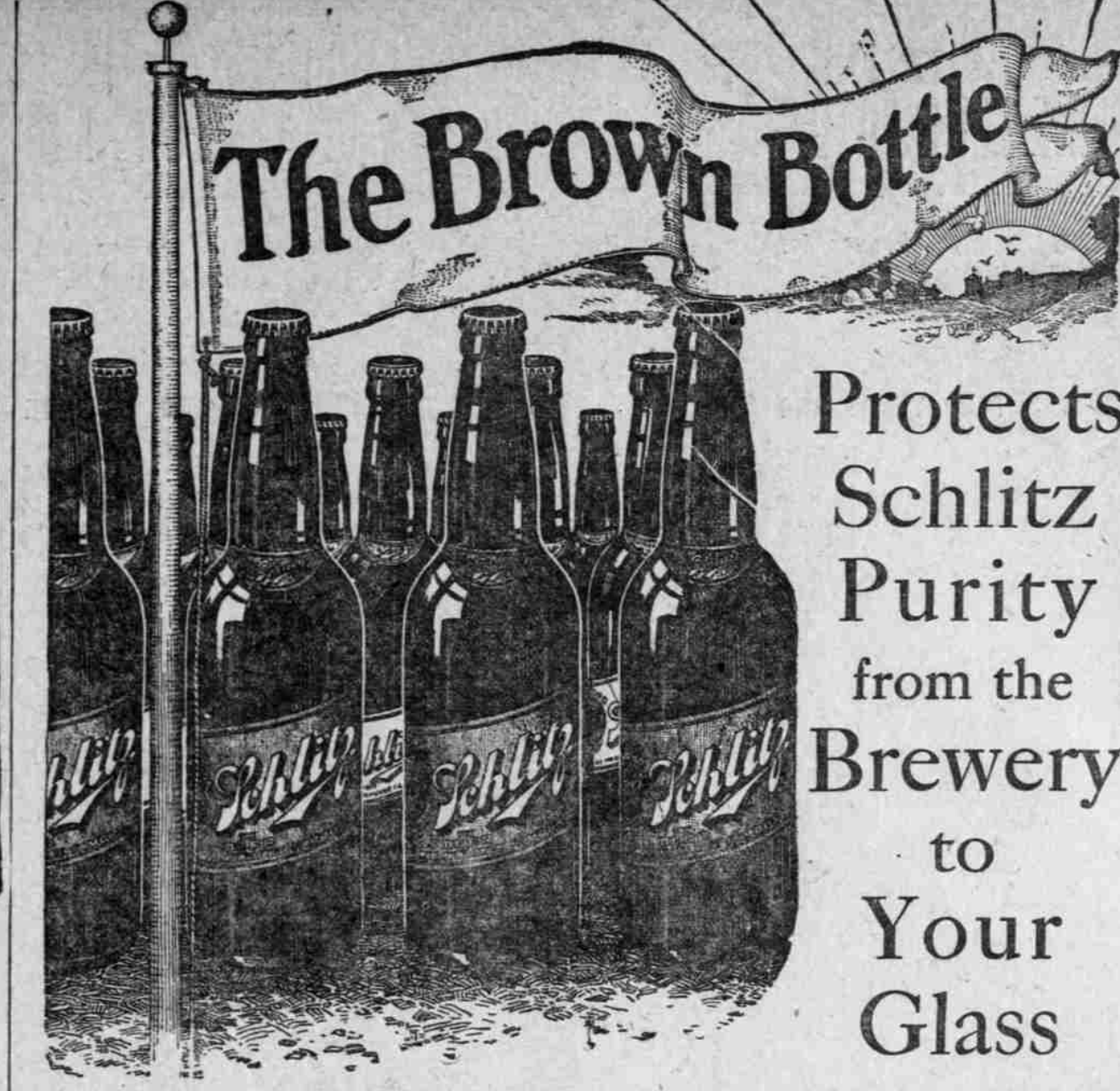
