

ONLY FOOD TO GO ACROSS BORDER

Decision on Export of Arms to
Rebel Capital Will
Await Events.

STEEVER'S ACTS UPHELD

Military Commander Allows No
Supplies for Rebels to Pass.
Many Americans in Mexico
Approve Taft's Policy.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—Officials in Washington were today engrossed in considering questions of international law relating to rights of insurrectionists to secure food and other supplies from neutral territory; the extent to which the Federal authority could go in controlling the exportation of arms and munitions of war to Mexico and what authority army officers may exercise in restricting movements of civilians, soldiers and rebels on the border. Actually there was no real question before the departments, after legal advice of the insurrectionary agent here had been told by the Treasury Department that the trade relations between El Paso and Juarez might proceed as heretofore. Thus at least food supplies and merchandise might be carried across the line.

Admission of Arms in Doubt.

No attempt was made to decide as to admission of arms, as that question has not been raised. Probably it will not be until an attempt is made to carry an invoice of rifles and ammunition through the United States Custom House.

Any decision as to importations in Juarez would apply to any Mexican border town the insurrectionists occupy. In answer to complaints to the War Department of the severe measures adopted by the United States military commander to prevent shipping supplies across the line, as well as the crowding of non-combatants, Colonel Steever's action in El Paso was upheld as fully within his instructions. He had required only that all supplies for Juarez be cleared through the El Paso Custom House as in normal times. Major General Wood will permit free passage across the international line of all persons, Americans or Mexicans, without arms and not carrying supplies.

Non-Intervention Approved.

Colonel Steever explained his course in the following telegram to the War Department:

"I am refusing to allow arms, ammunition, war materials and provisions for insurrectionists to be carried across the international bridge until I receive instructions to the contrary. I make exceptions of articles intended for the wounded."

President Taft's policy of non-intervention is bearing fruit. Director-General John Barrett of the Pan-American Union, who is closely in touch with Latin-American affairs, told the President today he had received hundreds of letters from Americans, Mexicans and foreigners in Mexico commending the Taft policy of hands off.

Thanking the President for his "firm stand against intervention," a telegram signed by a Methodist missionary, Butler, a Presbyterian missionary, Vanderbilt, and a Baptist missionary, Brewer, in Mexico City, was received in the White House today.

"Foreigners and natives whom we meet throughout the country are equally grateful," concludes the message.

Diplomats Prepare for Siege.

Ambassador Wilson informed the State Department of a gathering last night in the United States Embassy in Mexico City of the representatives of Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, Spain and Germany, to consider their action with a view to possible future contingencies. Mr. Wilson, who is head of the diplomatic corps there, called this meeting at the request of colleagues, the purpose being simply to exchange measures of safety for the embassies and foreign residents of the capital in case of a siege.

The coast insurrection is preparing to reap the immense practical benefits which they believe are bound to accrue through the possession of an international port of entry.

"We shall immediately appoint Custom-House agents, who will collect duties, and for that purpose will inspect all merchandise coming through ports in our possession," Jose Vasconcelos, the insurrectionist representative here, said tonight. "To avoid damage to public interests we will recognize invoices signed by consuls of the Diaz government, and our own consuls have been appointed and take office. The fact that our officers' services will have to be utilized by all shippers will establish de facto a situation that probably will lead to formal recognition by foreign governments."

BARON ROSEN IS HONORED

Ambassador at Washington Put at
Head of Russian Foreign Office.

BERLIN, May 11.—The Lokai Anzeiger today published a dispatch from its correspondent at St. Petersburg saying that Baron Rosen, the Russian Ambassador at Washington, has been appointed temporary director of the Russian Foreign Office.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—It is understood in the Russian Embassy here that the designation of Baron Rosen as temporary director of foreign affairs is caused by the continued ill-health of the Minister of Foreign Affairs. Baron Rosen is at present in St. Petersburg, where he has been since last December.

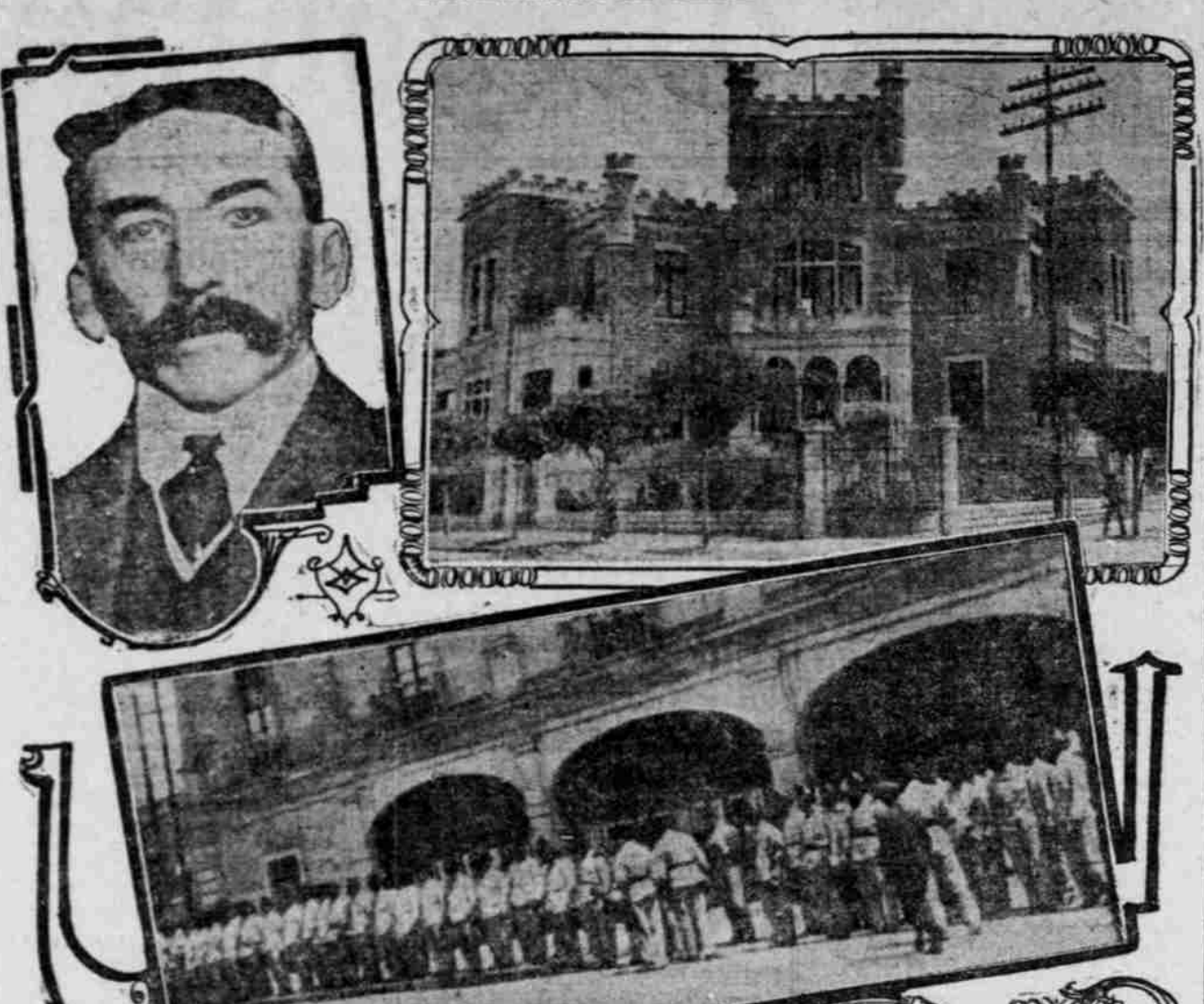
\$25,000 Paid Umatilla Reds.

PENDLETON, Or., May 11.—(Special.)—More than \$25,000 has been distributed among the Indians on the Umatilla reservation during the past few days by Major E. L. Swartzlander, the agent. This in turn has been distributed almost as rapidly among the merchants of Pendleton by the Indians. This is part of the money paid during April by the white renters of Indian lands. About \$15,000 of the April payment is held by local banks pending settlement of claims which are being disputed. Some of these cases have been in the courts for more than a decade. The annual rentals of the wheat lands on the reservation amount to about \$100,000. Half of this is paid in April and the other half in October. Not more than \$75,000 goes into direct circulation because of the hoarding disputes.

accede, they are ready to pursue the war most vigorously. The detachments of federalists under General Luque and General Rabago they feel can easily be defeated. Then the insurrectionist leaders want to take away from Juarez the bold army that wrested the town from the federalists, and march on Mexico City. All along the way, they claim to have thousands of sympathizers. The rebels now have a large amount of ammunition and artillery and likewise are believed to have sympathizers in Mexico City ready to assist in their behalf as an attack begins.

Free Commerce Desired.

Word was received here today of the establishment of revolutionist agencies in the United States Embassy in Mexico City of the representatives of Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, Spain and Germany, to consider their action with a view to possible future contingencies. As to the free passage of insurrectionists back and forth, Colonel Steever, in command of the American troops, has let it be known that he will not prevent their going across to the American side, but cannot, of course, guarantee them against arrest should the Mexican government order a provisional arrest, as it is empowered to do under the treaty with the United States, for at least 40 days pending the arrival of charges. Such possible complications are being carefully explained to the rebels to avoid trouble.

That the insurrectionist army is more than an armed mob was shown today in the complete absence of looting and intoxication, and the quickness with which the shattered city was cleaned of its dead and wounded.

Juarez itself contains tonight the larger part of Madero's original force of 190 men, augmented by several scores of volunteers who during the day enlisted under the banner of the victorious rebel army and were armed with captured rifles. The rebels captured about 450,000 rounds of ammunition, several machine guns and field pieces, about 700 Mauser rifles and enough ammunition belts and other equipment to make them an effective fighting force.

Federals Would Not Fight.

An explanation may be found in the expressions of federal prisoners. A number of the wounded expressed sympathy with the revolutionist cause, while others, wounded but disarmed, openly fraternized with the insurrectionists. "They simply would not fight," epitomizes the belief in the insurrectionist ranks. General Madero told an Associated

Press representative today that many American criminals, pickpockets and suspicious characters had arrived in Juarez, giving the impression that they are insurrectionists. He has ordered, therefore, that American secret service men be allowed to cross into Juarez and arrest any criminals whom they know.

OROZCO FORBIDDEN TO CROSS
Steever Prevents Rebel Officers
From Attending Banquet.

EL PASO, Tex., May 11.—General Orozco, commander of the rebel forces, had blood in his eyes as he stood at the international bridge and refused to permit anyone from El Paso to cross into Juarez, even though they had passes from Colonel Steever through the American lines.

It appears that General Orozco and his staff last night were invited to a banquet by Mayor Kelly, of El Paso, and the American troops would not permit Orozco and his officers to cross the line.

NOGALES EXPECTS ATTACK
Rebel Army Advances, While Federals March to Hermosillo.

NOGALES, Tex., May 11.—Five hundred Mexican federal troops, comprising the garrison which evacuated Agua Prieta yesterday, passed through Lomas Junction at 3 P. M. today on their way toward Hermosillo, which is besieged by rebels.

Fighting is reported today at both Cananea and Magdalena. A rebel force of 140 men was in possession of Lamas yesterday and later marched to Santa Ana, where 60 soldiers who had been garrisoning that town deserted and joined them. The entire force is marching toward Nogales, where an attack is regarded as inevitable.

SALINA CRUZ ALSO CAPTURED
Terminal of Tehuantepec Railroad
in Rebel Hands.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 11.—From reports brought by the American-Hawaiian liner Nebraska, which arrived here today from Salina Cruz, the Western terminal of the Tehuantepec Railroad, it appears probable that the rebels are in possession of that place.

HALL GETS GRILLING

Judge Tells Actor Hundreds of
Convicts Better.

PRISON TERM DESERVED

Charge of Wife Desertion Is Dismissed for Lack of Evidence,
but Desire Is Expressed to
Send Hall to Prison.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—(Special.)—Police Judge Edward F. Shortall, scathingly arraigned Thurston Hall, the former matinee idol, accused of deserting his wife to live with another woman, today. Even so, the court was forced to dismiss the case for lack of sufficient evidence. The magistrate spoke at length in the crowded courtroom, not heeding the embarrassment and bluster of the actor. Hall looked the judge full in the eye, but blushed noticeably as the grilling became more personal.

Mrs. Hall was in court and nodded assent to the words of the judge. The judge rose, looked upon the accused actor and said: "The facts of this case will not permit me to keep the law to hold this defendant for trial before the Superior Court on this charge, but I believe that the facts adduced in the testimony warrent me in saying that this man is of lower moral character than most men who appear before me in this courtroom. It has been shown that he has deserted his wife for a woman not his wife; that he deserted his wife in the East and came to this city with the other woman and introduced her as his wife."

"I cannot imagine a man sinking to lower depths than to perpetrate such an outrage. It is a distinct affront to keen-minded and right-thinking citizens."

"It would be a source of great satisfaction to me to send this man to the state penitentiary, where there are at this time hundreds of men incarcerated who are better men than he is."

BOURNE'S LEAGUE LEFT IN ILLINOIS

"Progressive" Republicans
Unite in Organization to Get
Ahead of League.

ITS PROGRAMME IS SAME

State League Started by 28 Senators
Ahead of Chicago Banquet.
Inspired by Fear of Democratic
Landslide.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 11.—(Special.)—Republican politics broke into sudden eruption today. Twenty-eight Senators, composing the "progressive" element that won control of the upper branch two years ago, banded together and launched a movement for the "rehabilitation" of the Republican party in Illinois.

They represent nearly every faction in state politics. They will serve as the nucleus of an organization to cover every county and city in the state in the avowed endeavor to make the state party of Illinois as militantly "progressive" as that of any other commonwealth in the West.

In launching the movement at this particular moment, the idea of the leaders was to forestall any active reason of Illinois by the National Republican Progressive League. By letter it slid off the ways almost on the eve of the \$1.50-a-plate banquet of the "progressives" at the Auditorium in Chicago Saturday night. The intention was to prevent the banqueters from getting a copyright in the title "Progressives."

The 28 Senators who signed have a long list of legislative deeds, to which they point with pride. They openly contend that on its record of the last two years the state organization is entitled to recognition as a "progressive" element in politics. They point out that there is hardly an item in the programme of the National Progressive League for which they have not already voted.

Merriam Forces May Be Absorbed.

They now propose a benevolent assimilation of Merriam forces in Chicago. Tonight they signed a call for a mass meeting soon after adjournment, to which they invite all Republicans who endorse "progressive" principles. The Deane administration is closely connected with the movement.

Conjectures that it may eventually absorb the Merriam "progressives" and unify the nonreactionary factions are floating around tonight, based upon the fact that Senator Walter Clyde Jones signed. He has been mentioned prominently as the probable candidate of the Progressive Republican League for Governor and he was the last to attach his signature.

Democratic Victory Feared.

Republican chiefs have entertained fears that a Democratic Governor might be elected. They have also considered the possibility of Illinois going Democratic on Presidential candidates as Illinois is regarded as a pivotal state. The promoters of the movement declare that, unless immediate and drastic steps are taken to consolidate the factions, the National campaign may be jeopardized by conditions in Illinois.

DAM SITES ARE INSPECTED

Final Decision on West Umatilla Extension Expected by July.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 11.—Engineers in charge of the Umatilla irrigation project report that all field work in connection with the proposed West extension will be completed by the end of May. Investigations at various dam sites indicate that with reasonable economy the structures can be built providing rights of way are not exorbitant.

Preliminary plans will be completed so that a final decision can be made, probably by the middle of Summer.

All the farms in the fourth Umatilla unit, opened to entry on March 22, have been filed upon and only five remain unentered under the third unit.

Many Corporations Inactive.

SALEM, Or., May 11.—(Special.)—Calling attention to the fact that useless time and money is wasted by attorneys and others in starting a new corporation in this state because they fail to make inquiries as to corporate names and the fees, Corporation Clerk Babcock has issued a warning.
