Japanese Merchants Preparing to Ship to Vancouver.

Japanese sugar merchants are preparing to ship Formosan sugar to Vancouver, where it will probably be refined by the British Columbia Reffining Company. It is estimated that Canada requires approximately 300.000 pounds of sugar annually. Some of this demand is supplied by the Fifi Islands, where British Columbia refiners have extensive augar-producing interests. The freight rates from Japan to Vancouver are slightly favorable to Formosan sugar produces, and it is expected that Canada will, barring trude opposition, take a considerably less than the price quoted for the Hawaiian product. 
