TOT'S TESTIMONY FAVORS FATHER

Ray Moorhead, Charged With Murder of Woman, Is Defendant.

OWN SON STATE WITNESS

Little One Disappoints Prosecutors, Telling Story of Killing Showing Self-Defense Was Father's Motive.

TACOMA, Wash., May 15.—(Special.)—While the 7-year-old son of Ray Moorhead, charged with murdering Mrs. Sadie Buchanan, a mother who almost instantly refused the testimony which the state had put him on the stand to give, the 6-year-old son of the dead woman refused absolutely, through the testimony of the state and the prosecuting attorney's office today saw its most important witnesses cast aside in the trial now in progress. The defendant's son, Ralph, told a story which aided his father greatly in his fight for life.

The two boys were the only eyewitnesses of the death of Mrs. Buchanan on the lonely beach near Gig Harbor and all attempts by force or coaxing to get the little Buchanan boy to testify failed. A review of ten minutes was taken at one time to give the little fellow a chance to regain his composure and accustom himself to the crowd.

Child Laughs in Court.

During that period Deputy Prosecutor G. C. Nulty playfully shook him, slapped him and told him stories which made him burst in loud peals of laughter, but when court was called again these were found to have had not a bit of effect. Hardly a dozen awful words were spoken by the boy the entire time he was on the stand.

When little Ralph Moorhead, upon whom the state depended particularly to give testimony which would send the defendant to the gallows, entered the courtroom he made a dash at once for his father, who was kept from being embraced by his parent by a court officer, and then was put upon the stand. He took the oath and the attorney began at once. Instead of flinching as he had seen his father hit, Mrs. Buchanan with an ear and then told her under the water as was ex-

pected, he declared that the woman was the aggressor and his testimony went directly to show that Moorhead had acted in self-defense.

Boy Sticks to His Story.

This made the prosecuting attorneys at once turn upon him in an effort to confuse him and make his statements contradictory. The Deputy Prosecutor read a statement purporting to have been made by the boy to a neighbor in which he incriminated his father, but the boy at once denied the statement.

He clung to his direct testimony, and practically removed all elements of murder from the case unless testimony can be brought later which will show the boy told a falsehood, which will be a difficult matter.

The last hour of the day's session was devoted to a legal battle between the state's attorneys and Louis I. Lefebvre, counsel for the defense. Judge Chapman ruled again and again in favor of the defense when Lefebvre interposed objections to the prosecutor's attempt to show that the Moorhead boy had been influenced to alter the story which he is alleged to have told to a number of witnesses. Little Jimmy Buchanan probably will be put on the stand again tomorrow morning.

UNIFORM SLIGHT HURTS

TWO ARMY OFFICERS TO SUE RINK OWNER.

Captain Major, Jr., Commanding Barracks at Prescott, Ariz., and Companion Resent Ejection.

TUCSON, Ariz., May 15.—Captain Duncan K. Major, Jr., 18th Infantry, temporarily in command of Whipple Barracks, Prescott, Ariz., and Captain E. O. C. Ord, U. S. A., retired, have signified their intention of bringing suit in the United States District Court at Prescott against the manager of a Prescott skating rink who denied them admission to the place because they were in the uniform of United States Army officers. United States District Attorney Morrison, of Tucson, will be asked to prepare the complaint.

The incident has been reported to the War Department and the action will be brought under the law passed at the last session of Congress, "an act to protect the dignity and honor of the uniform of the United States." This law was passed at the urgent request of President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt.

Captain Major is one of the best-known officers in the Army and is now under orders for duty at the Army War College in Washington. It is understood that both officers will have the support of the War Department in a vigorous prosecution of their suit.

The manager of the rink in refusing the officers admission to the floor informed them that nobody in the uniform of the United States Army, whether an officer or an enlisted man, could skate at his rink.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL REBUFS OLCOTT

Crawford Contends That Fight to Oust State Printer Is Personal With West.

SECRETARY IS INSISTENT

Official Declares He Will Start Action to Rout Duniway From Capitol Only After Olcott Gives Written Order.

SALEM, Or., May 15.—(Special.)—Secretary Olcott said today that he intends to take action toward routing the state printing plant from the State Capitol. This statement was preceded by a wordy battle between him and Attorney-General Crawford, which Mr. Crawford made the open allegation to Olcott that he believed the whole fight waged about the State Printer question was on purely personal grounds between Governor West and State Printer Duniway. For that reason, he said, he "did not believe it proper for him to interfere in his official capacity."

Secretary Olcott denied this, declaring that the fight was being carried on by him alone and that he intended to have action taken and insisted that the Attorney-General start the action when Olcott is ready to proceed. The Attorney-General finally agreed that he would start an action if the Secretary of State would submit in writing what he desired to have done.

Ouster Proceedings Due.

Secretary Olcott refuses to say when he will start proceedings. It was suggested at the conference that proceedings be started by an attorney other than the Attorney-General and the name of the District Attorney was mentioned. The Attorney-General advised Secretary Olcott that an action of this kind might be instituted by the Secretary, the Secretary paying for the cost of the proceedings out of his private funds, but Secretary Olcott resented such a conclusion.

Governor West says he intends to take no part in the fight, declaring it is up to Olcott entirely.

Olcott is guarding the contents of a number of opinions he has received from attorneys in various parts of the state. It is understood that some of them advise him that the State Printer has a right to maintain an office in the Cap-

itol, but not his plant, while he has been advised verbally by other attorneys that the law is against the Secretary in his attitude.

Janitor May Go, Too.

Another change promised soon at the State Capitol will be the request of Secretary Olcott to Chief Janitor C. H. Rockwell to resign. Arrangements were made whereby Rockwell would have remained until June 1, but Secretary Olcott said he had unearthed an alleged scheme between Rockwell and Charles Lechter, a negro employee, whereby Lechter was to receive more pay for his services than for time actually devoted to work for the state.

Secretary Olcott has discovered that Rockwell turned in six and one-half days' time for Lechter when in reality Lechter only worked three and one-half days. Rockwell declares that overtime figured in making out the bill and that he is in no manner guilty of attempting to perpetrate a fraud.

Corey's Time Short.

Another move which will be made about the first of June will be a request that Chief Clerk Corey discontinue his work at the office. Some time ago Olcott tendered Corey the position but Corey refused, declaring that he intended to become a candidate himself in 1912. Corey has been assisting Olcott in becoming familiar with his post, but was desirous of remaining for some time, but suddenly the Secretary conceived the idea of allowing Corey to leave and will probably take charge of the office alone.

POLITICIAN KILLS SELF

Benjamin Beall, of Central Point, Uses Shotgun in Suicide.

MEDFORD, Or., May 15.—(Special.)—Benjamin Beall, for years one of the Democratic leaders in this county and twice candidate for County Clerk, killed himself at his Central Point home Sunday, shooting himself through the heart with a shotgun. Three years ago he fell and injured his head and has been a sufferer from intense headaches since. He was born in this county and was unmarried, living with his mother, who came to Jackson County in 1852.

Alderman to Visit Schools.

SALEM, Or., May 15.—(Special.)—Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman will leave this week for Oak Grove and Toledo and from there will go to Eastern Oregon. He will make addresses at Troutdale, Stanfield, Hermiston, La Grande, Cove, Fernside and Milton.

WOOL TARIFF TOPIC

Democrats in House Are Drafting Bill on Schedule.

REVENUE IS REAL ISSUE

Indications Are That Majority Will Favor Merely Reduction of Tariff So Government Will Not Lose Heavily.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Democratic members of the ways and means committee of the House today under took the task of drafting a bill revising the wool schedule. The committee debated without attempting to reach a decision whether the bill shall place raw wool on the free list or reduce the tariff, 50 per cent or more.

The paramount issue in revising the schedule is revenue. To put raw wool on the free list would cut off at once \$1,000,000, while the entire wool schedule brings in more than \$40,000,000 in duties.

By cutting the duty on raw wool to 5 or 6 cents a pound and making provision for a sliding reduction annually of 1 cent, some Democrats figure the importations would increase sufficiently to cause no disturbance in the revenue.

It is probable that in ten days the tentative bill will be submitted.

SENATE DEADLOCK STILL ON

Attempt to Elect President Dropped After Two Ballots.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Continuation of the deadlock in the attempt to elect a President pro tempore of the Senate was apparent today when the first ballot resulted in no choice. Senator Gallinger, the Republican caucus candidate, polled 33 votes, his Democratic opponent, Senator Bacon, the same number, while six progressive Republicans voted for Senator Clapp.

A second ballot was similar to the first, and despairing of breaking the deadlock, the Senate took up for consideration the joint resolution providing for the election of United States Senators by direct vote.

SALOON FRONTS CHANGED

Oregon City Resorts Now Required to Have Glass Facings.

OREGON CITY, Or., May 15.—(Special.)—In compliance with provisions of an ordinance passed recently by the Oregon City Council, saloonkeepers today began tearing out the fronts of their places, which are to be replaced by glass windows. The alterations must be completed by June 4.

The entire fronts must be of glass with the exception of four feet from the floor. The ordinance also abolished free lunches, card playing in rear rooms and dice throwing for drinks.

A petition to the Council and Mayor for the adoption of an anti-renting ordinance is being circulated.

Ex-Soldier Sentenced for Burglary.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 15.—(Special.)—Frank Harris, formerly a soldier in Vancouver Barracks, was sentenced to from one to 15 years in the State Penitentiary today, when he pleaded guilty to burglary. Harris almost made his escape from the City Jail and was caught removing bricks from the County Jail on Saturday.

Oregon City Holdup Suspect Held.

OREGON CITY, Or., May 15.—(Special.)—Benjamin Greenwood, 21 years old, who was arrested in Portland Sunday, was brought here today by Deputy Sheriff Frost to be tried on a charge of holding up Vernon L. Heathman, who conducts a store at Jennings Lodge. Mr. Heathman was robbed of \$17 on Main street, near the suspension bridge here, the evening of March 31. Chief of Police Shaw suspected Greenwood, who went from here to Tacoma.

Elgin Pioneer Dead in South.

ELGIN, Or., May 15.—(Special.)—Word has been received of the death of J. T. Galloway at the home of his brother in Candier, Fla. Mr. Galloway came to Oregon from Iowa 33 years ago and had been a resident of Union County until a year ago when he went to Florida to live. His body will be interred in the Elgin Cemetery. Mr. Galloway was a prominent Mason. His widow, three daughters and a son survive him.
