WORK FOR CHILDREN TOLD AT SOCIETY'S MEETING.

Parents Discouraged From Lightly Discarding Parental Burdens, Says Superintendent.

Reports submitted by the officers of the Boys and Girls' Aid Society at the 18th annual meeting in the parlors of the First Congregation Church last elight showed that 532 children were under the direct care of the society. Of that num-ber, 255 were received in the past year. The average daily number of children at the reciving home during the year was 60. The report of J. C. Ainsworth, trea-

The report of J. C. Alnsworth, treasurer of the society, showed a cash balance on hand of \$500.25. Dishursements for the year aggregated \$15.79.68 and were distributed among the following Maintenance of receiving home, \$603.92

Maintenance of receiving home, \$603.22; field work, placing and visiting children and conducting investigations, \$608.19; property expenses, \$1208.41; playgrounds and manual training equipment, \$567.05; payment of claims in the matter of estates where the Boys and Girls' Aid Society were the sole devises and amounts paid on note, interest, etc., \$167.40.

W. T. Gardner, superintendent, in his report told of the progress the society has made during the 15 years he has been in charge of the work. Mr. Gardner told of the management of the re ceiving home and the treatment of the re-ceiving home and the treatment of chil-dren. He also explained the field work that is done by the society in behalf of dependent children. "Our field work is directed by three agents," said Mr. Gardner. "Mrs. Mary

J. Graham attends to visiting wards of the society who have been placed in family homes in Fortland. Miss Myrtle E. Pease has charge of investigations and wards in Southern Oregon and J. G. Kilpack looks after the same work for the society in Eastern and Western Gre-

the society in Eastern and Western Oregon.

"These agents carefully investigate all reports of ahuse and neglect of children in their districts and cause them to be brought before the proper authorities. Many are the difficult problems presented to them. Our workers do all in their power to keep the family together, but when that is impossible we see that the children receive proper attention. Above all, parents should be discouraged from lightly shaking off their parental obligations."
