MINISTERS FOR SIMON

MAYOR CAPTURES MEETING INTENDED FOR THOMAS.

Portland General Association Members Praise Incumbent—Pastor Cites Charity of Official.

Members of the Portland General Ministerial Association held an informal secret meeting at the Young Men's Christian Association yesterday to discuss the political situation. The meeting was called by Rev. W. P. Reagor, president of the association, to

induce the ministers to endorse George H. Thomas, the Democratic candidate for Mayor, but it turned out that many of the ministers are in favor of the re-election of Mayor Simon, believing he has given Portland an efficient administration in every way. The result was that no resolution endorsing either candidate was called for by Rev. Mr. Reagor, who favors Mr. Thomas. The name of A. G. Rushlight, who is running against Mayor Simon, was not mentioned.

Rev. J. E. Snyder, pastor of Piedmont Presbyterian Church, told the ministers he had known Mayor Simon for years, and that he intends to vote and to work for him. It was Mr. Simon, he said, who was instrumental in breaking up gambling in Portland. Mr. Simon also aided in the establishment of the People's Institute, a Presbyterian denominational mission in the North End, said Rev. Mr. Snyder. He went on to say that Mayor Simon owned

a building which he was renting for \$115 a month.

"I went to him and told him of the work I was interested in, and that we could not afford to pay more than \$50 a month for the building," said the minister. "Well, it's for a good cause," was Mr. Simon's answer. "You can have it for \$50 a month."

Rev. Charles E. McPherson, pastor of Epworth Methodist Church, also spoke in Mayor Simon's favor, saying he did not wish to modify anything he had said in an interview last week. "I think all the Christian people of the city ought to unite upon Mayor Simon and assist in re-electing him, because he is the best, most capable man for the place we can get, and he knows his business."

Rev. Mr. Reagor opposed Mr. Simon. Rev. T. H. Walker, pastor of Calvary Presbyterian Church, said: "We have passed the time when we can do anything effective, and are just

on the eve of an election. We are just about to hit out like an angry man who finds he has been worsted in the encounter. I don't propose to do anything of the kind. I think it is for us to get in and give this city a good commission form of government."

The ministers passed resolutions endorsing John E. Hall and Bruce Wolverton for Councilmen in place of George L. Baker and Ralph C. Clyde.

Water Turned Into Canal.

WEST STATTON, Or., May 22.—(Special).—Water was put into the first mile of the Willamette Valley Irrigation and Land Company's canal today. Everything was satisfactory and while work has been stopped temporarily on account of the inclemency of the weather, only a few more weeks' work will complete the canal to West Statton.

PUBLIC HALL APPROVED

KENILWORTH CLUB INDORSES AUDITORIUM IDEA.

Advantages of Structure and Ease With Which It May Be Financed Discussed.

At a public meeting held last night at the Kenilworth Presbyterian Church, under the auspices of the Kenilworth Improvement Club, at which 50 taxpayers were present, the auditorium project was heartily indorsed and support-

ed. J. S. Tomlinson, vice-president, presided.

The resolution, which was passed, pointed out the benefits to be secured from the construction of this auditorium. There was no opposition to the measure, although a number of questions were asked and satisfactorily answered. C. C. Chapman was the principal speaker. He told of sentiment throughout the city in favor of a hall as possible, with such arrangements as would permit of reduction in size to meet the requirements of the entertainment. By making the hall large, he said, and satisfactory, the revenue derived more than paid the interest on the bonds and provided for a sinking fund.

D. O. Lively, in addressing the club members of the Woodlawn Improvement Club, argued that it was better

for the city to own the auditorium than for the building to be put in the hands of private owners, subject to their whims and will. If it were in the hands of the city authorities it could be devoted to all public purposes and no one could be shut out from its use.

Tom Richardson will address the Sellwood Commercial Club tonight in behalf of the auditorium. It is Mr. Richardson's opinion that 60 per cent of the prominent business people coming to the Coast are brought out here by means of conventions.

"It is a very serious task to start in to get a man from the East out to the Coast," said Mr. Richardson, "but when you get hold of him and tell him his church, society or business association is going to hold its next convention on the Coast, he pricks up his ear and begins to inquire for rates and usually makes the trip. It is his first journey, and he often returns."
