BOISE, Idaho, May 22 .- (Special.)-A duel resulting in what may be death for W. H. Connor, who was brought into Twin Falls today with his face and head filled with buckshot occurred in Jarbidge, the ne wildaho-Nevada mining camp. Sunday, between Con-nor and Jack Flynn, also a miner, be-cause the camp was not large enough

for both. That Conner's sight is not destroyed That Connar's sight is not destroyed is miraculous for he received a full charge of No. 6 shot squarely in the face at close range. Physicians are hopeful of saving his life. The trouble between the two men had been brewing for some time and Flyns had openly announced that the the camp was not large enough for both. When the shooting occurred Connor was returning from a prospecting trip to Jarbidge. Flynn is charged with having opened the duel by firing first at Conner when the latter's back was turned.

Connor immediately ran into a nearby tent, and, drawing his revolver, opened fire on Flyns. For several min-utes the shooting continued until Flynh closed in and discharged the load of shot into Connor's face.

"It is the sense of the congress that the wideat possible trade publicity be given for the purpose of making known irresponsible, unethical and unscrupulous manufacturers, wholesalers and dealers." A resolution was submitted by George F. Merill, of Salt Lake City, to take the place of the articles. The new sec-tions read: "It should be recognized by lumber manufacturers and wholesalers that the retail distributors of lumber are a nec-essary factor in the trade and a use-fit servant of the public and as such should be recognized as the logical chan-nel through which to market their prod-ucts."
