Eastern delegates to the annual con on of Christian Churches, to be held in Portland from July 4 to 11, will travel to Portland on a special train, leaving Chicago Tuesday, June 27.

Portland's growth as a railroad terminal will be determined by the amount of traffic to be obtained here, and the degree of its availability and freedom of movement. 


