AUDITORIUM WITH NO STAIR-WAYS MEETS FAVOR.

Dr. Wetherbee, on Tour of Inspection Finds Enterprises Pay Profit to Cities.

After traveling across the continent wisiting nearly all the principal cities which have public auditoriums, Dr. J. R. Wetherbee in a letter received by Postmaster Merrick yesterday expressed himself in favor of the Collseum recently built by the city government of Milwaukee. Dr. Wetherbee has inspected the Auditorium at Denver, the Convention Hall at Kansas City, the Auditorium at Cincinnati, the one at St. Louis and Madison Square Garden in New York, as well as the halls at St. Paul and Milwaukee. He is now at Des Moines, la., where he is inspecting the Collseum. visiting nearly all the principal cities

ing the Collseum.

In his letter he describes the city-owned building at Milwaukee as being ideal in size and form. There are no stateways and all entrances are by inclined planes. This enables an automobile to be driven into the balcomy or gallery and the exits are so large that four can be driven in abreast. He compares it with the Auditorium of St. Paul and finds the latter one to be deficient in many respects. One noteworthy feature in Milwaukee was an indicated net profit last year of \$16,000, over every expense, including bond interest and a sinking fund. Dr. Wetherbee has discovered that without exception the suditorium projects have been profit-paying institutions. Financial reports indicate the following annual profits. Denver. \$13,000; Des Moines, 14,000; St. Paul, \$4000; Kanwaukee, \$16,000; St. Paul, \$4000; Chicago, \$30,000.

Pittsburg and Chicago are not included in Dr. Wetherbee's report and the figures have been obtained from other sources.
