Shooting of Patrolman Screnson, at the robbery of the Sellwood postoffice, over four years ago, will be considered by the grand jury next week, with a view to the indictment of Frank Wayne, one of the gang of robbers, who has admitted in open court that

he had a hand in the affair.

The motive for the belated action is that Wayne has been granted a new trial after having been convicted and sentenced to two years for the robbery of the Gresham bank on January 1. 1907. Wayne was convicted before Judge Morrow recently, and upor motion being made for a new tria

motion being made for a new trial it was granted.

Priar to being placed on trial for the Gresham affair. Wayne served a sentence at McNeil's Island for the robbery of the postoffice. An aggregate of ten years imprisonment had been given him, but he secured premature release upon the discovery that the trial court had not ordered that the sentences on four counts should not run concurrently. He was released last Fall and was at once re-arrested last Fall and was at once re-arrested on a state charge for the Greaham rob-bery.

Evidence of Real Estate Swindles Growing.

Conveyances Recently Exposed Are Connected With Deal by Which East Side Grocers Were Defrauded of Store.

Link by link, Deputy District Attorney Page is connecting evidence upon which he expects to be able to show that a gigantic conspiracy for the fraudulent conveyance of real estate has existed in Portland and that thou-sands of dollars have been lost by in-vestors through it.

Another step was taken yesterday, when the prosecutor was able to show that the frauds recently exposed are in that the frauda recently exposed are in train with the complaint issued on March 19 against J. F. Roth and George Sanborn, in which they were accused of swindling a firm of grocers out of their store. Sanborn appears in other trans-actions, and through him it is believed that the deal can be led back to the of-fice of Harry Viereck, with whom he was for a time associated.

Grocers Are Swindled.

J. A. Cobb and F. C. Dillingham were the proprietors of a grocery store on the East Side, which they traded to Roth for acreage in Josephine County. Roth for acreage in Josephine County. They found later that they had not acquired title. When it was sought to arrest Roth he could not be found and Sanborn convinced the District Attorney that he had acted merely as agent. A forged abstract, purporting to have been issued by J. E. Hare, of Grants Pass, accompanied the deed. Roth transferred the grocery to James Peters, receiving for it a deed to lots in Cliffs, Wash. Finding that the deed to the Josephine County land was a forgclims, Wash. Finding that the deed to the Josephine County land was a forg-ery, Cobb demanded restitution from Peters and received a deed to the same lots previously transferred to Roth. BANKS FULLY PROTECTED

Decision Holds Maker of Out-of-Town Check Liable.

According to a decision by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals at San Francisco yeaterday banks will be fully protected when cashing checks or when accepting for credit paper from outside

correspondents.

The case that brought forth the decision was that of the United States National Bank of Portland against the Amalgamated Sugar Company, which, after depositing a check with the Farmers & Traders' National Bank at La Grande, stopped payment following the failure of the La Grande institution. The Farmers & Traders' bank already had sent the check to the United States National and the Portland concern was unable to collect, as the account of the La Grande bank was too low to cover it.

The sugar company refused payment and suit was started. The bank won in the local courts and the suit was taken to the appellate court upon appeal.


