Olcott Likely to Start Capitol Ouster Suit This Week. SALEM, Or., May 28.—(Special)—While Secretary Olcott refuses to make any statement as to what will be done, it is understood that some time this week he will start an action toward compelling the State Printing plant to vacate its rooms in the Capitol. It is probable that Attorney-General Crawford, District Attorney McNary and W. C. Bristol, of Portland, will be the counsel retained by Olcott. Whether an action of forcible entry and detainer, or ejectment proceedings will be started has not been decided. It is also equally certain that the action will be contested by the State Printer and much interest is centering about the proposed fight at the Capitol, as it may possibly preclude other changes, should Secretary Olcott prove successful in his effort.
