

SIMON CONCEDED BEST CANDIDATE

Election Certain if Voters Are Not Misled, Associate Is Confident.

PAST RECORD IS PROOF

Party Lines Have Not Been Considered in Giving City Sound Administration—Influence for Good Powerful.

"If Joseph Simon should not be re-elected Mayor of Portland, a mislead electorate," said a business associate of Mayor Simon yesterday. "Or those who know his character for honesty, ability and industry, he will receive the great majority of ballots. It seems to be conceded by all who are in a position to know, excepting those who have interests to serve which are opposed to the three who are earnestly supported by Mr. Simon, or at least opposed to one or more of them, that Mr. Simon would make the best Mayor of any of the candidates."

Simon Is Mayor for All.

"Do we want a man for Mayor simply because he is marked with the political stamp of some party? Are we going to turn over the administration of our domestic affairs to some one who has been raised up by the North End to obscure the superior qualifications of another who in the exercise of sound business judgment we must necessarily prefer?"

Sacrifice Is Demanded.

"Under the new order of things, after 40 years of the greatest political activity, Mayor Simon receives unqualified the endorsement of a multitude, representing every walk of life, who demand of him what can only be a continued sacrifice of his personal interests for which the greatest returns, aside from the consciousness of the great good for the greatest number, will be the attack of the vicious, the slurs of those disappointed in their individual schemes, and the customary ingratitude of the careless and indifferent. Few men would make the sacrifice."

Opposition Is Selfish.

"Any man who goes through two years as chief executive of this city, having for his guiding star his sense of right, unshaken by demagogues, naturally raises up an opposition against himself composed of the very interests which are back of Mr. Rushlight—divine, the professional party, the ignorant, those who are subject to the influence of cheap whiskey and cheap talk."

ELECTION PASTOR'S THEME

Rev. J. Allen Lea Wants Good City Manager for Mayor.

"Religion in politics" was the subject of Rev. J. Allen Lea's sermon at St. James' English Lutheran Church last night. "When I vote for Mayor," he said, "I do not vote for a teacher in my Sunday school, or for a man to lead my prayer meeting, or attend a convention of my church. I vote for a man who knows how to manage the affairs of the city in such a way that the interests of the masses are conserved, that the dinner-pail may be kept full, the home of the poor protected against the marauder and the credit of the city kept intact."

LYRIC COMEDY SUCCESS

Fun and Music Prevail in Presentation of "Policemen's Ball."

The troubles growing out of a clandestine participation of two husbands in a policeman's ball, although why a policeman's ball should be worse than any other is a problem in the play, furnish a theme on which the clever humor of actors and actresses in the Lyric Company at the Bungalow strings a number

of funny situations leading through much excitement to a final happy ending. The ball is an early morning affair, and the diligent efforts of a photographer and his assistant to conceal from each other and their wives the fact of their participation bring into play much of the ability of William West, as the photographer, and Ernest Van Felt as George Proof, his assistant. Penn Wright (Frank Yack), another merry-maker, whose comical razz-dazz does not let him tell his wife of his attendance at the ball, makes a third of the trio of unhappy criminals, through whose efforts to conceal their guilt the funny situations arise. Following more as the action advances, the guilty trio are finally brought up against the facts and are forced to confess.

Several successful songs by the Lyric chorus add to the attraction of the frothy little piece. A specialty of more than usual merit is the singing of a Highland dance and the singing by Miss Jeanie Fletcher of Karl Heschka's "My Heart from the Choccolate under." A bit of the performance was the singing of a new song by a Portland author, "Portland, You're a Dear Old Town." Jack West sang it with abner, and the audience took to it at once. The melody is tuneful and the words are fairly good. Miss Fletcher, Miss Fisher and Miss Heschka, who furnished the music of the three guilty revellers, and provided a great deal of the fun of the play. Miss De Graaf, an actress whose presence in the photographic studio of Stephen Film, precipitates the trouble.

NEW RATE IN FORCE

California-Atlantic Meets That of American-Hawaiian.

FIRST CARGO DISPATCHED

Falcon Sails for San Francisco With Freight Under Reduced Tariff as Announced Recently by Big Companies.

Carrying the first cargo under the reduced rates from Portland to the Atlantic Coast, the American-Hawaiian steamer Falcon sailed yesterday morning for San Francisco, where her freight will be transferred to the other steamers of the company to be sent by way of the Isthmus.

Of the cargo of the Falcon, 200 tons were of New York, consisting of wool, salmon and hides, the tariff on which has been materially reduced, beginning with the departure of the Falcon.

While it has been generally known that the Pacific Mail and the American-Hawaiian companies would conform to the new rates established, it was not known in Portland until yesterday that the California-Atlantic Steamship Company also would conform to the new rates.
