CHICAGO POLICE DOUBT TALE

Declare Reference to Blowing Up of Viaduct Not Verified. CHICAGO, June 4.—Chicago police discredit the purported confession of John Delaney in Muskoges, Okla., Sat-urday, in which he said he had, at the direction of John J. McNamara, secre-tary and treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Ironworkers, selected buildings in different cities for destruction by dynamite, among them being a viaduct in Chicago, which was, he said, blown up in February, 1907. Inspection of police records discloses no record of such an explosion in that year.




