

OHIO BRIBE-TAKER WILL "TELL ALL"

New Indictments Are Expected to Follow Legislator's Confession.

EVANS PROMINENT FIGURE

Lawmaker Who Will Make Clean Breast of Knowledge of Corruption at Columbus Member of Important Committee.

COLUMBUS, O., June 5.—What Prosecuting Attorney Turner and Attorney-General Hogan have been hoping for happened today when a member of the Legislature confessed in open court that he had accepted a bribe and declared his willingness to go before the grand jury and make a clean breast of all his knowledge concerning legislative corruption.

The legislator is Owen J. Evans, Representative from Stark County and a member of the House calendar committee which was the object of much criticism immediately preceding the bribery disclosure.

Evans spent the day before the grand jury and will be a witness tomorrow. A new and large list of indictments is predicted as a result of his confession.

Evans is indicted.

Evans was arrested three weeks ago for soliciting a bribe and was indicted today for soliciting and accepting bribes. To one indictment he pleaded guilty and at the suggestion of Prosecuting Attorney Turner, the court imposed only a fine of \$500, instead of a penitentiary sentence. The other two indictments were laid away temporarily.

For Evans, his counsel, Thomas B. Clark, said:

"We could have had all the money we wanted to conduct this man's defense, but we could not afford to conduct it on what we considered perjured testimony; we therefore advised him to plead guilty."

Pomeroy Gave Counsel.

At the instance of Attorney-General Hogan, United States Senator Pomeroy came to Columbus three weeks ago in the vain hope that his friendly counsel would induce Evans to confess at that time.

Evans created one of the biggest sensations of the bribery scandal by appearing before Judge Kinkead, of the Criminal Court, and pleading guilty to the charge of receiving a bribe of \$100 on the salary loan bill. He said he received the money from L. C. Miller, of Akron, a loan agent.

Evans was a member of the steering committee of the House, of which Representative Nye, of Pike County, also was a member. Nye was acquitted last week after a trial on the charge of soliciting a bribe of \$500 from State Printer Crawford.

Two other indictments are still pending against Evans, one on the charge of receiving a bribe of \$500 from J. F. Weiss, connected with a brewing company at Canton, and another returned today with the one to which he pleaded guilty, which charges the receipt of a bribe of \$500 from J. C. Sharer.

The grand jury has reported eight indictments. It is not known how many are against members of the Legislature.

MYERS' MILLIONS DIVIDED

Three Daughters of Tobacco King Share His Estate.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., June 5.—Judge Foster, of the Superior Court, issued an order today directing that the remainder of the estate left by George S. Myers, the St. Louis tobacco manufacturer, who died here, be distributed among his heirs at once.

The total value of the estate is estimated at \$1,200,000, and will be divided equally among Mrs. Georgia Myers Coe, of Paris, France; Mrs. Mildred Myers Craven, of Pasadena, Cal.; and Mrs. Bob Myers Babcock, of Colorado Springs, Colo.

The claim of George Myers Church, grandson of the millionaire, amounting to \$300,000, has been met under agreement by his aunt, John S. Craven, of Pasadena, co-administrator of Myers, is administrator of the estate.

SCHEIB'S CHECK TURNS UP

Returned "No Account" in 1903. Bathing Murder Inquiry Is Ou.

NEW YORK, June 5.—Mayor Gaynor today received from F. J. Switzer, of Chicago, a check for \$48, signed "F. M. Blaine," and indorsed "H. A. Scheib." Mr. Switzer writes that he cashed this check in October, 1903, for a man who gave his name as H. A. Scheib, and that the check came back from the bank marked "no account."

The check and letter were turned over to the police here, who are investigating the record of Harry A. Scheib, charged with the murder of his wife. Scheib's case was submitted to the June grand jury today. Several detectives who have been working on the mystery gave their evidence.

SPANISH DIPLOMAT DEAD

Marquis de Ojeda, Formerly Ambassador at Washington, Gone.

HEARITZ, June 5.—Marquis Emilio de Ojeda, the Spanish Ambassador to the Vatican at the time of the rupture of diplomatic relations between the Madrid government and the Holy See, and formerly minister at Washington, died here today.

Marquis Ojeda, who occupied the Spanish legation in Washington from June, 1902, until late in 1906, was one of the most brilliant diplomats in the Spanish foreign service. He began his career at the age of 18 as attaché in the Spanish legation in Berlin. While representing his country at Tangier in 1898, he was appointed secretary of the Paris conference for the treaty of peace with the United States.

28 ARE EXECUTED

Liberals Charged by Madero as Outlaws, Put to Death.

DEATHS FOLLOW BATTLE

Insurrecto Leader Is Determined to Rid Mexico of Outlaw Bands.

Body Shows Order to Pillage and Devastate Land.

TUCSON, Ariz., June 5.—Twenty-eight Magonistas (Mexican Liberals) who are opposed to Madero, were summarily executed on Saturday and Sunday in the Altar district, near Compaña and Altar, according to refugees who arrived from there today. The district has been cleared of Magonistas who are classed by the provisional government as bandits, and further depredations are improbable.

The 28 executed had been captured after a skirmish in which there were a number of casualties on both sides. It is said that the Maderista troops have orders to put all captured outlaws to death.

One Magonista killed in the skirmish had attached to his saddle a note signed ostensibly by Magon in Los Angeles, instructing his men to "plunder, rob and devastate the country of the Maderistas."

SOCIALISTS GET MORE MEN

War to Continue for Republic of Lower California.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 5.—Captain Louis James, of the rebel army, at Tia Juana this morning returned from Los Angeles, where he had a conference with General C. R. Frye, commander of the Tia Juana forces. He went to Tia Juana this morning in an automobile, carrying with him a new flag for the rebels to take the place of the red flag.

He stated that the mission which caused the disappearance recently of Frye from Tia Juana has been accomplished and by this time there will have remained the east near Tia Juana an expedition consisting of 200 men, two breech-loading field pieces and 20,000 rounds of ammunition sent from Los Angeles. OVATION AWAILS REBEL CONQUEROR

Mexico City Will Marshal Army Madero Defeated in His Honor.

REBEL TROOPS KEPT OUT

Soldiers He Has Been Fighting for Six Months Will Line Streets While People Acclaim Him. His Own Army Excluded.

MEXICO CITY, Mex., June 5.—No citizen of Mexico was ever given a more enthusiastic reception than that which is planned for Francisco I. Madero, when he enters the capital Wednesday. Soldiers of the army, which he has been fighting since November 23, 1910, will line the streets. In his honor military bands will play and the police, whose duty it once was to arrest those who cried "viva Madero," will join in the ovation.

The revolutionists in Guernavaca are to have no part in the celebration. This was decided today, for, fearing that the presence of the discipline of the regular army might result in trouble, the government officials have deemed it wise to refuse their plea for participation.

Throughout the city troops will be placed, but in this disposition of armed men there is a double significance. It is not altogether certain the throng which will welcome the people's idol will preserve complete order throughout the day, and the authorities are determined the celebration will not be marred by an over-indulgence in enthusiasm.

EX-GOVERNOR NOT EXECUTED

Messages Show Deposed Official in Sinaloa Is Alive.

TUCSON, Ariz., June 5.—That ex-Governor Diego Redo, of Sinaloa, has neither been assassinated nor summarily executed is the substance of a telegram received today direct from Culiacan, the capital of Sinaloa, at the office of the Southern Pacific Railroad of Mexico. The dispatch adds Madero, ex-Governor of the State of Sinaloa, asking him to use his influence to secure the personal safety of the prisoners taken by the revolutionists during the time of the capture of Culiacan. Redo is the man reported to have been executed by the insurgents. Dominguez forwarded the message to Madero.

HIGH OFFICIALS IMPLICATED

Viljoen Says Letters Prove Their Complicity in Plot.

EL PASO, Tex., June 5.—Daniel De Villiers, charged with complicity in a plot against Francisco I. Madero, today was released from custody upon furnishing bond in the sum of \$1000.

General B. J. Viljoen, who is pushing the case against De Villiers, said today that letters from Monterey in his possession indicated some former high Mexican officials were implicated in the alleged plot.

VIDART ARRIVES AT ROME

Fourth Contestant in Turin Race Has Mishap With Machine.

ROME, June 5.—Vidart, the fourth contestant to reach Rome, the end of the second stage of the 1200-mile Paris-Rome-Turin air race, arrived at 9:15 o'clock this morning.
