Adams Elected Treasurer.

William Adams was elected City Treasurer to succeed J. B. Werlein, incumbent of the office. He also was opposed by nomination on the Socialist and Prohibitionist tickets.

Partial returns at 2:30 o'clock this morning showed the defeat of Councilman Concanon, who was seeking re-election as an Independent, by Tom N. Monks, regular Democratic nominee. Jordan V. Zan, Republican, was running second. The vote as far as counted at that hour was: Concanon, 54; Monks, 167; Jordan, 95; Burke, 50.

Belding and Kuhl May Lose.

Councilman Belding, in the Sixth, and Kuhl, in the Eighth, evidently have been defeated for re-election. John Montag, Democrat, appears to have defeated Belding, and Kuhl has probably been retired by William Schmeer, Republican, who ran as an Independent. Taft Denounces RACE PREJUDICE

Army Officer Severely Condemned for Showing It Against Jew.

SECOND CHANCE IS GIVEN

Frank Bloom's Failure to Secure Commission Attributed to Colonel Garrard's Objection to Jews as Social Associates.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—President Taft today rebuked Colonel Joseph Garrard, commanding the cavalry post at Fort Meyer, for disapproving Private Frank Bloom's effort for promotion because of Bloom's Jewish parentage. Colonel Garrard's indorsement characterized Jews as not "desirable social associates" and the President immediately directed the Secretary of War to investigate the matter. The President stamped the expression as that of narrow race prejudice. The War Department pointed out that there have been many Jews among the Army officers. Notwithstanding the President's inquiry as to what should be done to discipline Colonel Garrard, the incident has been practically closed with the remark that the department decided there was no ground for a court-martial, an officer being at liberty to express his actual belief as to the availability of any candidate from the ranks.

New Examination Ordered.

It was concluded that the President's desire would be best served by the publication of the correspondence and the delivery of a copy to Colonel Garrard with a letter from the Secretary of War duly admonishing him not to repeat the indorsement.

Private Bloom's next examination will be held in September, but just where it will depend on his company's station at the time. The total vote, only 50 per cent of the registration, was 478 for the change and 269 against.

Considerable opposition to the change developed in the last few days of the campaign, which was carried on largely under the leadership of the Twenty-five Thousand Club, and a strenuous fight was made against it today. The chief opposition came from old line politicians, and from elective officials, who will be displaced under the change in government, and from certain big interests.

Hoquiam's commission will consist of a Mayor and two Commissioners, the former drawing a salary of \$2000 per year and the latter \$1800 each. The election to select nominees will be held within 60 days and the regular election two weeks afterward.

Considerable election was expressed on all sides tonight, when the returns of the election were known. There has been a strong condemnation of the councilmanic form of government. The latter part of March Mayor P. J. Mourant caused the bad lands to be raised by the police, the women being arrested on charges of selling liquor without licenses. This raid was carried out while the Council was in session and followed an effort by one of the Councilmen to have the women of the district fined regularly.

When the raid was made Mayor Mourant announced that this had been done to close the district and following a caustic address to the Council, announced that he would resign. He immediately came out for commission government and was prevailed upon to remain in office until an election was held.

SMUGGLING INQUIRY ON

Captain and Crew of Steamer America Are Questioned.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—Special Agents Bean, Smith and Tidwell, of the United States Customs Service, began an examination today of the officers and crew of the steamship America, from which \$25,000 worth of contraband opium was taken by Government officials Thursday.

The captain of the vessel, A. S. Stevens, was questioned at length, but the agents secured no information other than the statement of the captain that he had known nothing of the presence of the opium. The investigation yielded little, as the crew, with the exception of stewards and pantry-men, are Japanese, and each man declared he knew nothing of the affair.

Under a ruling of the Treasury Department, made last week, sustaining the finding of two captains under an old law, captains on whose vessels opium is found may now be fined a sum equal to the appraised value of the articles.

SCIENCE CHURCH GROWING

Last Year's Gain of Members Exceeds All-Creed Gains Abroad.

BOSTON, June 5.—At the annual business meeting of the Christian Science church today, the report showed that the growth in members during the last year had exceeded all previous years in the history of the church.

The treasurer's report showed the church's finances to be in a satisfactory condition, with ample funds on hand. Reports were given showing the growth of Christian Science during the year in the United States and foreign countries, including Mexico, England, Australia and South Africa.

Right to Bar Jews Denied.

Word of the reprimand issued from the White House today, was as follows:

"The President directs the Secretary of War to inform Colonel Garrard that his attitude on this matter is strongly disapproved as contrary to the ideals and principles of this country."

"Colonel Garrard has been told that he has not the moral right to exert influence in his official position to bar the advancement of a courageous and efficient young man simply because that man was of the Jewish race; that such procedure indicates not only prejudice that should not be found in an officer of his position and importance, but amounts to a failure to justly and fairly consider the merits and claims of the applicant as shown by his efficient service and excellent standing in the mental examinations."

"Colonel Garrard has been admonished to avoid a repetition of the action taken in this case."

GRADUATE WILL GOVERN

OREGON STUDENT AFFAIRS TO BE IN CHARGE OF ONE.

Change Made to Obviate Inharmonious Resulting From Rivalry—Honor "Os" Are Bestowed.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., June 5.—(Special.)—The handling of the business side of all student activities in the University of Oregon with the exception of the two student publications, will hereafter be in the hands of a graduate manager who will be appointed by the executive committee and the athletic council of the student body.

An amendment to the constitution of the associated students of the University of Oregon, creating the office of graduate manager and designating his method of election and duties in office, was passed in the assembly held in Willard Hall this afternoon.

In the past football, basketball and other athletic branches, oratory and debate have been the mainstay of the student body. The University of Oregon Glee Club have been in the hands of different managers for advantageous dates and other things favorable to their own branches regardless of the others, had long acted to injure the different student activities and reduce their power of earning for the student body. To remedy this condition the new amendment was introduced and passed.

The graduate manager for the coming year will be selected from the alumni of the University of Oregon some time during the present week by the retiring athletic and executive committees.

At the close of the assembly this afternoon the varsity "Os" were bestowed upon those who represented Oregon in oratory and debate this season. Those granted trophies for debate were: Miss Carm Degermeyer, Lillian Clarke, of Portland, and Birdie Wine, of Astoria, for co-ed debate; Leon Ray and P. M. Collier, of Eugene; Howard Zimmerman, of Salem, and M. Moteschenbacher, of Klamath Falls, for inter-collegiate debate. C. W. Robinson, of Portland, received an "O" as winner of the Northwest championship for oratory, and C. E. Spencer, of Astoria, for the championship. The "Os" for track, tennis and baseball will not be given out this week.

MAILCLERKS ARE DIVIDED

Question Joining Labor Federation Will Stir Up Convention.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., June 5.—The future of the National Association of Railway Mail Clerks depends on the outcome of the convention of the order, which opens here tomorrow. The question to be considered is whether or not the association should become affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

James T. Canfield, of this city, National president of the order, is against the plan, and will lead the fight against it in the convention. Richard O. Walter, of Denver, Colo., will lead the faction in favor of affiliation.

SUGAR COMBINE IS NEXT

Taft Will Place Government's Information With House Committee.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—President Taft today promised Representative Hardwick, of Georgia, chairman of the special House committee investigating the Sugar Trust, that all information regarding the trust now in the possession of the Executive Department of the Government would be put at the disposal of the committee. Mr. Hardwick said the investigation would begin next week.

The committee, he said, intended to dispose of the cash settlement made by the Government with the sugar trust.

Mine Inspection Bill Vetted.

DENVER, June 5.—The coal mine inspection bill passed by the recent Legislature, which was intended to pre-

vent further accidents in the coal mines of Colorado, was vetoed last night by Governor Shafroth at the request of representatives of the Miners' Union. Their chief objection was occasioned by a Senate amendment requiring coal miners to pay the costs of "shot firing." It was estimated that this would have taken \$168,000 yearly from the wages of the miners.
