

M'CARTHY DENIES "OPEN TOWN" AIM

San Francisco Mayor, Replying to Attacks, Declares He Is For "Lid."

SEYMOUR CALLED TO COURT

Police Commission Is Fighting Writ That Prevents Installation of White as Chief Pending Disposition of Tangle.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—(Special.)—With the heavy guns of the legal brigade on either side of the engagement being waged over the position of Chief of Police John F. Seymour temporarily silenced under court orders the typewriter batteries of the administration forces got into action today.

Mayor McCarthy dictated two letters, Phillips in character, one directed at William Matson, president of the Board of Trustees of the Chamber of Commerce, and the other at the Brotherhood of Grace Methodist Church.

The action of the Mayor came after letters had been written both by Matson for the trustees and by the brotherhood, criticizing the conduct of the administration in police matters.

In the Matson letter the Mayor declares that he desires to refuse "imputations which are at once false in every particular and wholly unjustifiable."

McCarthy is indignant. The Mayor's letter to the Methodistists reads in part as follows:

"I am a churchman, and I can say without egotism that I am as consistent in my habits and morals and as fond of my good name as any member of your distinguished brotherhood. I am raising a family in this city and I owe it to my wife and my children to demonstrate to them that you that your imputations of my motives and character are unjustified in each and every particular. After that comes my obligation to the community and I feel that you gentlemen will not deny me the right to submit my side of the case before you finally go on record before the people."

"I ask the opportunity, since you have denounced me, of showing you that your brotherhood is wrong in its assumption that I am an advocate of vice and corruption, and am bent upon delivering San Francisco over to the forces of evil."

Platform Referred To.

"I desire to spread before you a copy of the platform upon which I was elected, explain my policies and aims, which the people once passed upon at an election and set aside in your minds the false arguments of politicians and embittered newspapers that I am corrupt, the agent of crime, and that my appointment in office is a shameful character, engaged in trying to pillage and ruin the city."

"I never stood for a wide-open town in my life, and never shall. I stand for law and order, decency, honesty and liberality. The real conspiracy that exists is one that you, gentlemen, ought to be aiding me to put down, and had you been disposed to seek me out and put me on record first-hand, instead of being misled by newspapers opposed to my principles and my industrial cause, I am satisfied you would not have uttered the denunciation to which I refer above."

Write Held Too Sweeping.

It will be argued by the administration counsel that the writ is too sweeping in that it restrains police subordinates as well as the Chief and the Commission.

Attorneys Hanton and Bell appeared before Judge Seawell this afternoon in behalf of the Police Commission and asked that Chief Seymour be required to give bond for \$5000 pending the hearing of the writ of review. The court held that Seymour could not be required to give such a large bond, as White had not assumed the responsibilities of office and could not be blamed for anything that might occur. He said that White had not been kept away from the headquarters, as alleged.

Lightning Takes Its Toll.

Storms Follow Intense Heat in the Middle West.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 5.—Three persons were killed by lightning in a storm that was general in Southern Indiana this afternoon. Mrs. O. C. Kelley, of Linton, was struck, while she was feeding chickens and John Gant was killed while he was mowing the lawn at his home near Rushville. James Parsons, a coal miner, climbing through a barbed-wire fence, near Linton, was electrocuted when lightning struck the fence.

MERCURY IS 105 IN KANSAS

Hot Weather Continues Throughout Southwestern States.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 5.—Hot weather continued throughout the southwestern today. Few Government weather stations reported the temperature to have been less than 90. At Junction City, Kan., the mark of 104 was recorded.

High temperatures at other points were: Muskogee 95, Topeka 97.2, Joplin and Wichita 94. Shortly after 4 o'clock the mercury climbed to 95 here.

Frostings were reported from Muskogee and Wichita, but there were no fatalities.

At Kirksville, Mo., the temperature reached 105 in the shade. The same degree of heat was recorded at Phillipsburg, Kan., where rain fell accompanied by hail.

WIND INJURES SIX GEORGIANS

Lightning Strikes Woman—Men Buried in Wrecked Garage.

BAXLEY, Ga., June 5.—Six persons were injured and considerable property damage done by a severe wind and rain storm which swept this section this afternoon.

Mrs. H. J. Parker was shocked by a bolt of lightning. The other victims were young men who were caught in a garage which was demolished by the storm.

COUNTERS DENY GUILT

21 TACOMA CENSUS ENUMERATORS ARRAIGNED.

Courtroom Crowded During Hearing—Five Others Are Arrested and as Many More Are Sought.

TACOMA, Wash., June 5.—(Special.)—The United States Court was crowded this afternoon when the arraignments in the census fraud cases were taken up by Judge Donworth. Twenty-one enumerators are out of the city and it may be a week or more before all of the arrests can be made.

The enumerators who were arraigned today each pleaded not guilty.

Additional arrests were made today on the indictments. Henry J. Jacobs, a former high school student, came from North Yakima this morning to surrender to the authorities. His district was in South Tacoma. It is alleged he turned in 1953 names and that only 711 of them were correct.

Thomas Garvey was also arrested. He had a district in the vicinity of South Fourth and J streets. On his list he had registered 1872 names. It is alleged, of which only 1025 were residents. Ervin A. Wroten, a downtown enumerator, is said to have sent in the names of 441 fictitious persons. Ernest C. Tanner, a negro, is accused of having registered 471 persons as living on vacant lots in South Tacoma.

The indictment against Elmer L. Amold, editor of a weekly paper in Port Townsend, and a former detective on the Tacoma police force, who was brought to Tacoma by a United States Deputy Marshal, alleges he failed to visit two rooming-houses and that he turned in 1194 names on his list of which only 2194 were correct.

"Regina" Supersedes "Rex" in River Pageant to Oaks.

BRIDGE TAXED BY THROG

Queen on Barge Dix Bows to Thousands Who Pay Festival Homage.

Pyrotechnical Display at Park Amazes Crowd.

HOME OWNERS CALLED ON TO KEEP HOUSE VISITORS TO FESTIVAL.

So great are the Rose Festival crowds already in the city that every hotel is filled. An appeal was made late last night in the Festival Association to assist the hotel men in getting rooms for the visitors.

General Manager Hutchins appeals to the home owners of Portland to throw open their rooms for the accommodation of visitors.

Three bureaus have been established where persons having rooms to rent may register. They are at the Imperial Hotel, at the Young Women's Christian Association, and in the office of J. H. Altken, in the Buchanan Building. Residents are urged to telephone or call in person early this morning, that all available rooms may be listed.

Visitors desiring rooms and unable to obtain them at any of the regular hotels, apply to one of these bureaus.

Preceded by the fireboat, George H. Williams, a brilliant pageant of river craft, moved slowly from a point near the Burnside-street bridge last evening to The Oaks, three miles up the river.

Although the procession was scheduled to start at 8 o'clock, it was nearly an hour later when it passed the Morrison-street bridge, where a multitude occupied every inch of the bridge walks, cheered as with one voice when the flotilla steamed under them.

Following the fireboat came the barge Dix which had served earlier in the day as the king's own conveyance. The throne remained and was occupied by a fair "queen," who acknowledged the plaudits of the throngs that paid her homage.

A fireboat, also well-lighted, occupied a prominent place in line, and from it vari-colored rockets and clusters of balls of fire were fired. This was easily the most dazzling feature of the procession.

A score of well-lighted boats took part in the trip. They moved at slow speed so that the people who lined the river banks and who occupied points of vantage on the docks, boats and bridges might obtain full view of them.

Officials of the Rose Festival Association and city officials rode on the barge Dix. The Rose City Band was on board and played stirring music that delighted the lively crowds.

Every conveyance traveling in the direction of the Oaks was well filled from early evening until late at night, when the revelers started to return. They traveled by stretcher, by boat, even walked, to witness the entertainment.

The display of fireworks, staged by W. H. Willson, at the Oaks, the most brilliant seen in Portland since the

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The profile of a city was shown. Above were an aeroplane and a balloon dropping shells which burst with deadly effect. The city was fast being reduced to ruins. So realistic was the production that spectators watched with nerves at high tension and with pulses rushing madly. Suddenly several automobiles mounted with rapid-fire guns whizzed into view to aid in the defense of the beleaguered city. The guns were trained on the air craft, shot and shell were exchanged with tremendous velocity and the maddening din which resulted ended in the destruction of the airships.

Musical shells, tentacle monsters in the sky, acres of jewels, walls of craft, clouds, rockets with parachutes, Jacob's-ladder shells, union-repeater shells in red, white and blue, thunder and lightning-shells and volleys of sobras and searchlight-shells lent their assistance in the unique programme.

The Noble Red Man was the title of a set piece which showed an Indian in war-paint and feathers, bringing down a bird from a distant tree with an arrow. Other pieces were, "The Dove Cote," "The Loop Wheel," "The Magnesium Wheel" and "Wireless Pyrotechny." An especially beautiful picture was that which depicted a reindeer drawing a sleigh through falling snow. The whole programme lasted more than an hour, and was replete with novelty.

Mount Scott in the Limelight.

The Rose Festival edition of the Mount Scott Herald, a new newspaper, has been received and the bid it makes for public favor ought to meet with a cordial response. The Herald says that it is an independent newspaper, published at Arleta, Or., by F. W. Jobelmann, and that the district it will serve comprises territory between Mount Tabor and Mount Scott, including Lenta, on the east, and Creston, on the west.

The leading editorial is a call that everybody should do for the Rose Festival, and the local news is handled with enterprise and good judgment. The number is well printed, and "boost" is written all over it.

FEE QUESTION PUZZLES

NATURALIZATION AND MARRIAGE RECEIPTS BOTHER.

County Court Asks District Attorney for Opinion Regarding Disposal of Money.

Responsibility of the enforcement of the law, which has been interpreted by the grand jury to require that the County Clerk pay into the county treasury the fees he collects for naturalization papers, and the Justices of the Peace to pay to the county fees for performing marriages, was passed up to District Attorney Cameron yesterday by the County Court. Mr. Cameron was asked in a letter written by the court to give his opinion in writing of the law, that the

County Court might be guided by it in collecting the fees.

County Commissioner Lightner said yesterday in regard to the letter sent to Mr. Cameron, that the latter had given a verbal opinion of the law in such a manner as to leave the court in doubt of what course to take.

After quoting the laws of Oregon, as reviewed by the grand jury in its report, and the Federal laws, which require that fees collected by clerks for naturalization dues, must be used in paying for assistance in such work, the County Court in its letter concludes:

We propose that the grand jury acted under your advice to a certain extent at least, and in order that we may know what your position in the matter is and how you construe the law, we ask you to give the court a written opinion concerning these matters. This present practice with reference to the naturalization fees has been accepted since 1906 and that of the Justices of the Peace since the fee system was abolished.

Section 3175 of Lord's Code provides that Justices of the Peace in this county shall receive a monthly salary of \$200, which shall be paid in full compensation for all services or duties performed by said Justices of the Peace, and no other fees, commissions or compensation whatever shall be allowed to or received by them or

either of them. Section 3203 of Lord's Code provides that a fee of \$5 shall be collected for performing a marriage ceremony and is in the same list as all other fees to be collected by the Justices of the Peace.

We would be pleased to get an early opinion on this matter.
