SHIPPERS ARE BENEFITED ACTION OF NORTH BANK IMPROVES CITY TERMINAL Switching Charges Will Be Materially Reduced—Manufacturers See Development. More far-reaching than was at first realized is the announcement made a few days ago that the switching charge of 5c a car on goods delivered along the line of the United Railways Front-street loop will be absorbed by the North Bank line. This arrangement applies not only to business handled to and from competitive points, but on all shipments in non-competitive territory as well. "In other words," said W. E. Coman, general freight and passenger agent of the North Bank and electric lines, yesterday, "the tracks of the North Bank, the United Railways and the Oregon Electric within the city limits of Portland have been made common terminals for all three lines, and under this arrangement a carload shipment to or from any point on the North Bank outside of our switching limits will be handled to or from any point on the North Bank from points on all lines reached via the North Bank without the present switching charge. "The two electric lines have had use of the North Bank terminals in this manner for the past several months. "This will result not only in the saving of a large amount in switching charges, which heretofore have been paid by the shippers on Front street, South Portland and North Portland, but should prove an important factor in the development of Portland as a distributing and manufacturing center, for the reason that a large area accessible to truckage for shipping facilities has now been placed on a common rate basis. NURSES' WORK SHOWN CONDITIONS AMONG POOR OF CITY INVESTIGATED. One Family Found to Be Living in Poorly Lighted Basement—Tubercular Patients Menace. The visiting nurses reported 112 patients for May at the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors. Of this number 41 were in the tuberculous division. A total of 475 visits were made by the nurses, of whom there are now four on the staff. The association and Multnomah Hospital have completed arrangements whereby a nurse in the graduating class of the training school will be given six weeks' work with the visiting nurses, as part of her regular training. Under the careful direction of Miss Crittmer, the supervisory nurse of the association, the probationer is assigned to the various divisions of the work in a systematic manner, so that she has her experience in the maternity, tubercular, surgical and general work. In the reports of the work among the poor of the city is emphasized the need of better living quarters. A case was reported of a family of four living in a two-room basement, lighted by two tiny windows, the floor damp and cold and the place most unsanitary. The discovery of tubercular patients in rooming houses is voiced by the nurses as a menace to the health of the community and a most prolific source of contagion. The committee on tuberculosis has in hand plans for the isolation of such cases, as far as it can be managed. This class of patients is made up largely of the drifting element. SELLWOOD IS THIRSTY WATER FAMINE CAUSES RESIDENTS TO PROTEST. Meeting of Commercial Club Will Be Held to Decide on Action to Bring About Remedy. Residents of Sellwood are experiencing their annual water famine, and according to reports yesterday from many sources the shortage is worse than in former years. There will be a meeting of the Sellwood Commercial Club tonight at the clubhouse to see what can be done. Since last year many new buildings have been erected in Westmoreland and elsewhere in the district tributary to the ten-inch main on Milwaukee street, and the draw on this source is much greater than last year. Dr. H. C. Fixott, president of the club, said yesterday: "There has been a general water famine all over Sellwood during the past few hot days. This morning I had no water in my office on the second floor. The same experience is reported from all the buildings and the people of Sellwood are highly indignant over the situation. We think that the Water Board should have laid the reinforcing water main in time to have prevented what was inevitable, a water shortage for 100 or more people. It was proposed a year ago that we would get this reinforcing water main, but the hot season is upon us and it is not laid and our people are suffering intolerable hardships. The Water Board provided a 16-inch reinforcing water main for Sellwood, Eastworth and Westmoreland and the territory tributary to the present ten-inch main on Milwaukee street, and the sections of the pipe were distributed preparatory to being laid, but the opposition of certain property-owners on East Twenty-sixth street, between Division and Powell, to the widening of that street has delayed the laying of the main. The pipe is lying along the streets now. This is the reason that the main has not been laid and the cause of the water famine in Sellwood. The Sellwood Commercial Club will urge that another street be selected for the main. Astoria to Improve Street. ASTORIA, Or., June 12.—(Special.)—The street committee of the City Council awarded a contract this afternoon to Alexander Frederickson for the improvement of Commercial street leading to the depot, a distance of five blocks. The specifications call for an expenditure of \$22,740.
