

DESPERADO, TIRED, CAPTURED EASILY

Bill Byrd, Slayer of Three in Spokane, Seized in Farmhouse.

GUN IS LEFT OUTSIDE

Outlaw Cowed by Four Levelled Guns Does Not Resist—On Way to Jail Captive Rides in Carriage of Victim.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 12.—(Special.)—Weakened by the after-effects of a prolonged debauch which preceded his commission of three murders and about to collapse after four nights and three days of dodging the big posse that dogged his trail, Bill Byrd submitted to capture by Deputy Sheriffs at 5:45 o'clock this morning. Capture Made Easily. The fugitive had scarcely entered the house when Deputy L. O. Cain, A. H. Moore, of Dishman, J. G. Burley and Ivor Sorenson, who had been hiding close by, rushed upon the place. Cain seized the rifle and in an instant the man whose reputation as a bloodthirsty desperado had spread throughout the whole countryside turned to face four leveled rifles.

Wearily fought through the hills and dilled by the suddenness of his capture, Byrd could talk but little this morning after his capture. He smiled at the rapid fire of questions.

Victim's Funeral Seen. "I made up my mind that I wouldn't shoot any more persons until I was shot at," he said slowly. He was seated at the time on the knees of Deputy Sheriff Cain and Burley, in the back of a mountain cart, and, though handcuffed, was trying to smoke a cigar.

Coming down the foothills, handcuffed and guarded by deputy sheriffs, Byrd rode for a quarter of a mile in the funeral of the Andes for 15-peace C. W. Metzner, one of his victims. The straight road to Spokane by a queer track of fate led through the procession of sorrowing citizens.
