

\$100,000 ACCOUNT IS BEFORE COURT

W. H. Hurlburt Sues Morris
Brothers for Share in
Profits of Concern.

RAILWAY SALE INVOLVED

Plaintiff Alleges That Transfer of
Oregon Water Power Company
Included Salary Offer and
Interest in Firm.

W. H. Hurlburt is suing Morris Brothers, financial brokers and promoters, for an accounting for services said to have been rendered and for an interest in the firm's profits arising from the sale of the Oregon Water Power Company to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, involving a total of more than \$100,000. The suit is being tried in Judge Kavanaugh's department of the State Circuit Court. The plaintiff is represented by W. D. Fenton, James E. Fenton and R. E. Moody. Wirt Minor is appearing for the defendants.

According to testimony given for the plaintiff, the defendants agreed to give Mr. Hurlburt, in addition to his salary, an interest in the stock of the Oregon Water Power Company and to become affiliated with Morris Brothers. A short time afterward the concern took over the East Side Railroad Company's buildings and organized the Oregon Water Power Company and developed this property.

Payment Not Made, Alleged.

According to the testimony for the plaintiff, Mr. Hurlburt was made president of the company. He was given one share of stock when the company was organized and later 1999 shares were issued to him. When Morris Brothers sold the holdings to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company at the rate of \$45 a share, Mr. Hurlburt turned over his stock, after deducting it, so that delivery of all the outstanding stock could be made. Mr. Hurlburt's block was worth \$89,955. Instead of allowing him his full profit in the deal, according to the evidence that has been submitted, Mr. Hurlburt was given credit for only \$10,000, but at no time since the transaction has he received any of the money. William T. Muir, formerly attorney for Morris Brothers, testified yesterday that the defendants had told him that Mr. Hurlburt and J. Brown, engineer for the firm, had been given 1999 shares each. In support of this testimony the stock books and indorsed certificates were introduced as evidence, showing that both Mr. Hurlburt and Mr. Brown had owned the stock.

Profit Agreement Denied.

The defendants deny that the certificates had ever been delivered. The minute book, also introduced as evidence, shows that at the first meeting of the stockholders of the company, Mr. Hurlburt was present and that he had 1999 shares of stock as well as the original share which he had received from the company. He is still in the employ of Morris Bros., testified that he received \$65,000 for his block of 1999 shares. James H. Morris, who was on the stand at the close of yesterday's session, made denial of any agreement that Mr. Hurlburt alleged had been made between the firm and Mr. Hurlburt in regard to participating in the profits of the company. The plaintiff also alleges that he turned 50 shares of land at Deschutes to the company and that the company standing that he had received a reasonable valuation for it in the event the company sold out. It was declared that the company received \$110,000 for this property after it had done considerable development work on it through the supervision of Mr. Hurlburt. The plaintiff alleges that he received a credit of only \$10,000 for this property but never received any cash.

LIEN PIONEER OF '47 DIES

James B. Keeney, Resident of Calapooia Valley Nearly 64 Years.

ALBANY, Or., June 12.—(Special.)—James B. Keeney, one of Lin County's earliest pioneers, died today in St. Mary's Hospital, Albany, aged 63 years. He had lived in Lin County continuously for almost 64 years, a record which is equaled by only one or two other men.

Born in Missouri he crossed the plains to Oregon with his parents in 1847. The family settled in Calapooia Valley and Mr. Keeney has resided in Lin County ever since. He has lived most of the time between Brownsville and Sweet Home. He is survived by seven children: William, George W., Keeney and Jerry Keeney, of Junction City, and Jack Keeney, Henry Keeney, Mrs. Eugene Fisher and Mrs. Garger, of Lin County.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Strenuous Democratic efforts to secure Senate reconsideration of the direct Senatorial elections joint resolution on account of its inclusion of the Bristol amend-

Mr. Reed, of Missouri, moved to recall the resolution from the House for the purpose of reconsidering the vote by which it was adopted. The motion was lost, 33 to 33. Senator Clark, of Arkansas, voted with the Republicans. It was his vote yesterday which made possible the adoption of the Bristol amendment.

Today's debate was precipitated by Senator Bacon, of Georgia, who argued that Vice-President Sherman had no right to cast a deciding vote on the Bristol amendment yesterday, such a right being confined to ordinary legislative business.

Those opposing Mr. Bacon argued that the Vice-President's constitutional authority to cast his vote in case of a tie was absolute and unequivocal. Lodge, Gallinger, Heyburn, Shively, Gore, Bailey and others spoke.

Democratic leaders insist that the will refuse to accept the amendment. Representative Underwood, the Democratic leader, said the amendment was a "piece of legislation" providing for Federal supervision would have serious opposition in conference.
