BAR WANTED FOR **ALL HOTEL ROOMS**

Tacoma Comes Forward With Latest Kind of Freak Legislation.

BIGGEST HOTELS TO CLOSE

New Ordinance Is Roundly Scored by Leading Business Men of City, but Reformers Will Stand for New Law.

TACOMA, Wash., June 15 -- (Special.)-TACOMA. Wash. June 15.—(Special.)—
Business and professional men, the list
inviuding some of Tacoma's most promiment merchants, are up in arms over the
prospect of further freak legislation in
the way of new liquor laws proposed by
Commissioner of Public Safety Pettit,
who went into office on the recall wave
last month for a term which will expire
with the regular municipal elections the regular municipal elections mest April. Commissioner Pettit is a prominent churchman, a teacher in the Sixth-avenue Baptist Church, a business man himself of ability, and was elected on a platform of "enforce all the laws." Like many another equally good church-man, he has found theories about regulating the social evil and kindred fullings of the modern city to be one thing, and actual practice and working out those theories to be something entirely different. Commissioner Pettit has stated privately to some who know him that he ouldn't be handed the job on a silver

The anti-treating ordinance was Tacoma's first experience with freak legis-lation. It was upheld by the Sueprior Court this week on the grounds that the city had the right to enact legislation of this kind. From the Superior Court it is to be appealed to the State Supreme Court.

Bar Wanted for All Rooms.

The next experience in prospect with frenk legislation is what is known as freax legislation is what is known as the Petiti liquor ordinance. This meas-ure was designed by Commissioner Petiti to regulate the sale of liquor. Among other things it would prohibit the sale of liquor in hotels, except in the exact room where the licensed tar is located. It would prohibit the sale of drinks of any kind in rathskellers, cafes, restaurants or any eating house. It would provide that applicants for liquor censes must have the signed consent of the majority of resident property ownlooms in basements or in any room not open on a public street where passersby could look in and see all that was going on, all screens and boxes being also pro-

hibited.

Last week when the ordinance was introduced and the extent of it became known a storm of protest arose among the business men. Within the following few days the new Commissioner of Public Safety received a call from a delegation of about 100 prominent business men, who protested emphatically against the damage that would be done the city by any more freak legislation. They pointed out the updessness of spending thousands of dollars to attract the tourthousands of dollars to attract the tour-ist and then hedging him about by such measures as the anti-treating law and restrictions imposed by the ordinance

ed by Pettit. ment of a committee of five well-known men to confer with the commission last Tuesday night and discuss the Petili ordinance, as the commissioner said be proposed redrafting it.

Useless Talk Indulged.

When the business men's committee met with the commission Tuesday night, fully 500 persons were crowded into the Council chamber, including a large representation of Petit's congregation; some suffragettes and many others who argued that more stringent regulation of saloons was a thing to be desired rather than opposed and that business would not be injured thereby. For two or three ours the Pettif measure was discussed from all viewpoints and the meeting ended . ithout action.

Mayor Seymour is the man who will probably decide the fate of the latest freak ordinance when it comes to final vote. Commissioner of Finance Freeland will likely vote with Petilt. Commissioners Owen Woods and Ben J. Weeks, Woods especially, are pretty certain to take the same view of the measure that the business men of the city do. The Mayor will then have the deciding vote. and it is quite within the range of possi dilties that he will vote with the ultra-

tions Tacoma has had notoriety that tions racoma has had hotoriety that she will be a long time overcoming, and we want no more of it." is the way one prominent business man argued today: "The Commercial Club is now raising a publicity fund of \$50,000, and business men are subscribing liberally, but Ta-coma might as well dump the \$50,000 in the bay if this freak legislation is to continue. Business men may be opposed to the liquor evil, but it is licensed by city, state and Federal law, and there is no use in Tacoma being a freak city, standing out distinctly from all the other cities. If the Pettit measure passes, restricting hotels along the lines he first indicated, the Tacoma has anced it will close its doors. It would take some publicity fund to overcome a knock like that, especially if some of the other large hotels follow suit."

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 15.—Richard N. ("Dick") Ferris, the Los Angeles promoter, was arrested shortly before noon today on a charge of conspiracy to hire and retain persons in the United States to enter the service of a foreign power as soldiers, in violation of the United States neutrality laws. The arrest was the result of an indictment voted by the United States grand jury at Los Angeles.

The arrest, it is believed, is in connection with the arrest of the members of the Mexican liberal party's junta in Los Angeles, and Ferris, it is believed, will be tried for his alleged part in promoting the rebellion in Lower California.

Ferris made no secret of his connection with the rebel movement in Lower California, and as early as last February sent a personal telegram to President Diaz, telling him what had transpired in Lower California and offering to establish a new republic, Diaz in a brief reply declined to recognize him.




