PIONEER TO BE BORN TO REST—The funeral of Thomas Howard Murphy, who died at Forest Grove, Or., June 17, will be held today from the chapel of the East Side Funeral Directors, at East Sixth and East Alder streets. Interment will be made in Greenwood Cemetery. Mr. Murphy was an old resident of Portland and was for many years connected with Lang & Company, but for the last two years had farmed near Gaston. He was a member of Hawthorne Lodge No. 111, A. F. and A. M., and funeral services will be conducted under the auspices of the Marston. Mr. Murphy is survived by his widow, two daughters and one son. The children are Mrs. May M. Neider, Mrs. Sophie J. Reynolds and Albert Murphy, of Portland.

PASTOR IS MINISTER 25 YEARS—Rev. James D. Corby, pastor of the First Universalist Church of Good Tidings, at Broadway and East Twenty-fourth streets, attained his 25th year as a minister yesterday. "Some Lessons 25 Years of Ministry" was the subject of his sermon. Rev. Mr. Corby came to Portland seven years ago. He and Mrs. Corby left last night for San Francisco to attend the International Sunday School Convention. On their return the congregation will celebrate the 25th anniversary of the pastor. A committee has been appointed to make arrangements for the function.

FARMERS BUILD DOCK AT CORBETT—Farmers near Corbett, east of the Sandy River, are building a dock at Corbett for their own use. The Corbett estate has furnished the site for the dock and is aiding in its construction. Manager Sings of the Sandy River estate, and R. P. Rasmussen are looking after the financial end of the enterprise. Shares in the dock are sold at \$10 each. At a recent meeting of farmers in Gresham, Oregon, arrangements were made to organize a joint stock company to handle the dock enterprise.

DISTRICT ASSESSMENT MADE—Property owners on East Eleventh and Milwaukee streets, between Holgate street and Hawthorne avenue, must pay \$35,145 for Hassam paving improvements made that amount being levied for the work. The assessment for improvement of East Washington street, between East Thirty-third and East Thirty-fifth streets, including several adjacent streets, is \$46,113. Assessment for the paving of Russell street, between Gantebain avenue and Ross street with stone blocks is \$14,655.

YOUNG MEN ATTEND CHURCH—Portland Star Homestead No. 42, Brotherhood of American Yeomen, attended services last night in Centenary Methodist Church, at East Ninth and East Pine streets. Rev. Delmar H. Trimble, pastor, spoke on "Why We Live Forever." Rev. Mr. Trimble also spoke on "Where to Locate the Auditorium," contending that it should be built on the East Side.

Miss Hanna, 21 years old, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Hanna.

LENTS TO HAVE NEW SCHOOL—The old 12-room schoolhouse which stood at Lents has been moved to make room for the addition to be built there this summer. An 8-room addition was built last year. A school building will be constructed near Woodmere, Mount Scott, this year, for pupils living between Lents and Arleta.

FOUR HORSES FOUND SHOT—Four horses were found dead with bullet holes in their heads near the Mount Hood automobile road, in the vicinity of Alder Creek, yesterday. They were valuable horses, two roans and two blacks. It has not been ascertained to whom the horses belonged. They were worth about \$400.

POMONA GRANGE TO MEET—Multnomah County Pomona Grange will hold its midsummer meeting next Wednesday with the Fairview Grange. The meeting will be held in the schoolhouse as the local Grange has no hall large enough for the assembly. Good roads and other questions will be discussed.

NEW PASTOR TAKES CHARGE—Rev. Howard Davis, of Spokane, new pastor of the First Church of Christ, Seventh and East Couch streets, presided over services in that church yesterday. He occupied the pulpit morning and evening. Large congregations attended.

SAVING ABILITY CAUSES ARREST—Out of a salary of \$20 a month, Tom Zalaski, an orderly at St. Vincent's Hospital, has saved \$240 in the past four months, as shown by his bank book. Detectives Hoffer and Moloney say that Zalaski's slender income was helped out by involuntary contributions from the uniformed patients in his ward, while Zalaski says that he received remittances from relatives. Complaints made by alien patients in the ward attended by Zalaski, led the hospital officials to call in the detectives, and they placed the orderly under arrest yesterday on a charge of larceny. It is alleged that he induced the patients to deposit their valuables with him and failed to make return of them.

VETERAN ODDFELLOW IS BURIED—The funeral of William Sheard, who died here Saturday, was held yesterday afternoon from the chapel of the East Side Funeral Directors, at East Sixth and East Alder streets. Interment was made in Rose City Cemetery. Mr. Sheard was a member of the Oddfellows for 55 years, his membership dating back far in the history of the order. He was a member of Calapuya Lodge No. 42, of Brownsville, O., and was 50 years old. Many members of the order attended the obsequies. The general relief committee of the city had charge of the funeral and all honors of the order were conferred on the departed veteran member.

HURLBURT CASE NEAR END

Suit Involving Thousands of Dollars in Progress Today.

Before Judge Kavanaugh, the case of W. H. Hurlburt against Morris Brothers, will be continued today, and probably will be brought to a close late this afternoon or some time tomorrow. The suit was filed by Mr. Hurlburt in an effort to recover from Morris Brothers \$55,000 he says is due him from the receipts of the sale of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company for 1000 shares of stock he declares was given to Morris Brothers, who owned the company.

It also involves a claim of \$55,000, Mr. Hurlburt says, is due him for profits in the sale of the Oregon Water Power & Electrical Transmission Company by Morris Brothers.

The cross examination of Fred S. Morris will probably be completed sometime today. Following him will be two or three other witnesses for the defense.

HENNESSY DEFIES DEATH
